Speaker Bio's

Margaret Chesney, Ph.D., was appointed Deputy Director of The National Center for Complementary and Alternative Medicine in 2003. As its first Deputy Director, Dr. Chesney assists in planning, directing, and managing the programs and resources of the Center. Prior to joining the Center, she was professor of medicine and epidemiology at the School of Medicine, University of California, San Francisco (UCSF), where she was co-director of the Center for AIDS Prevention Studies and director of the behavioral medicine and epidemiology core of the UCSF Center for AIDS Research. Most recently, she was a senior visiting scientist in the NIH Office of Women's Health in the Office of the Director. Throughout her career, Dr. Chesney has designed and conducted original research on the relationship between behavior and chronic illness.

Sherry Marts, Ph.D., was appointed Scientific Director of the Society for Women's Health Research in 1998. She directs scientific programs at the Society, including regional Scientific Advisory Meetings, the *Some Things Only a Woman Can Do* public education campaign, conferences on sex and gene expression, and the Isis Fund for Women's Health Research. Prior to joining the Society, Dr. Marts was a Senior Analyst at Abt Associates, where she served as scientific research administrator for the HIV Network for Prevention Trials under a contract with the National Institute of Allergy and Infectious Diseases. She also has served as Director of Research Grants at the American Health Assistance Foundation and worked in the office of the Vice President for Research and Development at the American Red Cross.

Sandy Worth has been affiliated with the University of Maryland's athletic program since 1973. She coordinates and directs the medical care for the Terrapins football program in addition to her responsibilities as the university's head athletic trainer. Ms. Worth supervises and schedules a professional staff of six fulltime assistants and approximately 25 student trainers who combine to provide medical assistance to the university's more than 600 student athletes. During her career at the University of Maryland, Ms. Worth has worked directly with five teams that have captured national championships—four in women's lacrosse and one in field hockey. In addition, she was the trainer for the women's basketball program when it won eight ACC titles and advanced to three NCAA final fours.

Yvonne Maddox, Ph.D., was appointed Deputy Director of the National Institute of Child Health and Human Development (NICHD) in 1995. She is responsible for overall management of a large and diverse extramural program that supports research on population issues, reproductive biology, contraception, pregnancy, child development, nutrition, developmental biology, AIDS, mental retardation, and medical rehabilitation. In addition, she plays a vital role in the identification of issues related to women as scientists and as participants in research studies. Dr. Maddox has been recognized as a champion of women's issues. She recently led a team of international scientists as part of a joint India-U.S. Reproductive Health Research Initiative and has a leadership role in several national initiatives including the National Strategy to Prevent Teen Pregnancy and the Race and Health Disparities Initiative.
