

## **SUPER SIZED NINE PATCH**

### **Variation by Terry Mowszowski**

#### Materials:

2 – 1 yard cuts of fabric that work well together

1 yard of batting.

Rotary cutting tools.

Sewing equipment.

Cut both fabrics exactly the same:

First fold with the 2 salvages together as it comes off the bolt.

Second fold with side raw edges together and all salvages together.

Place on cutting mat, the size should be 18 inches by 22 inches or trim to fit.

Measure 9 inches in from the raw edges sides and cut once along the top edge and once on the side edge.

This will give you 4 corner pieces 9”square, 2 short sides and 2 long sides and one center piece.

Mix and match these fabrics together and make up two quilts.

Place both quilts with the right sides together on top of a piece of a piece of batting.

Trim the batting to fit all around and pin all around.

With the Walking foot in your machine and a ¼ inch seam allowance stitch all around, leaving open one small part from the center of one short side.

Trim corners and turn right sides out with the batting inside.

Neaten edges by pinning again and pressing all around.

Remove pins and use to mark off or hold the quilt while you quilt it.

Stitch opening closed with a blind stitch.

#### Variations:

Pretty lace, trim or any other extensions can be added. Place the trim between the right sides of the two quilts and pinning or basting in place. Therefore. Sew all around the outside edges then un sew a portion of the seam between the center rectangle and one short side. And turn the quilt from there. Closing it with a blind stitch by hand.
