More Middle Age Americans Are Dying of Drug Overdose -Even as federal officials tout progress in cutting teen drug use, more middle-aged Americans are dying of drug overdoses, experts say. The <u>Psychiatric</u> <u>Times</u> reported in its April 2006 issue that the typical addict is likely to be in their mid-30s to

mid-50s, but that prevention programs often overlook Baby Boomers. The Drug Addiction Help Line reported that the typical overdose victim in 2005 was age 43, compared to 32 in 1985 and 22 in 1970. The Drug Warning Network Abuse (DAWN) reported that more than half of overdose deaths in 2003 were among 35-to-54-yearolds. Older drug users also predominate in emergencyprescription rooms. Potent painkillers like the widely abused OxyContin may be contributing to overdose deaths older Americans. among Cocaine and methamphetamines also are factors, although many overdose victims had used more than one substance. Middle-aged also have Americans been involved in more crimes nationally, a trend that may have its roots in drug addiction. (www.jointogether.or g/news/headlines/inthenews/200 6/addiction-increasinglyseen.html)

1 in 400 Students Lose Aid due to past drug offenses, according to data from the U.S. Department of Education. That's 189,065 students since the law went into effect during the 2000-01 school year. A majority of students were able to restore their eligibility by completing a drug rehabilitation program, an Education Department spokesperson said. Dangerous Pesticides Found in Cigarettes - Scientists identified the chemicals, two of which are classified as human carcinogens. They said the substances could negatively affect early development, reproduction, and hormonal processes. All of the pesticides have been approved by the Environmental Protection Agency for use on tobacco. The study found that the chemicals survived the burning of tobacco leaves to retain about 10 percent of their original potency. The research appears online in the journal Analytical Chemistry. www.iointogether.org/news/rese arch/summaries/2006/dangerouspesticides-found-in.html

Smoking Kills More Asian-Americans Than Thought -Researchers from the University of California found that Korean, Chinese. Japanese. and Vietnamese American men have three times the cancer death rate of South Asian women -- a disparity almost entirely attributable to smoking. The cancer death rate among Asian women is among the world's lowest, and researchers suggest that Asian men would enjoy similar health if they didn't smoke. The annual cancer mortality among South Asian women living in California is 58 100,000 per population, compared to a national average 193.5 per 100.000. of Meanwhile, lung-cancer rates doubled among South Asian men 1998 and between 2001 (www.iointogether.org/news/res earch/summaries/2006/smokingkills-more.html)

Area Updates and Trends:

> Durfee High School YRBS (Youth Risk Behavior Survey) data shows an increase in smoking. Student perception is that 80% are smokers, but in reality, only 10% smoke daily. Also, 87% of students want to date a non-smoker. SAC members wondered if the parents are smokers. teacher perceptions, student and

perception of how many teachers smoke.

- \triangleright Wareham/Carver Smoke Commission Free is applying for an EPA (Environmental Protection Agency) Smokefree Homes Campaign grant for a 2-year education program. Wareham has the state's highest rate of lung cancer and pregnancy/smoking rates.
- New Bedford High School 10th grade health classes will have a presentation in April by Bob Merman, who lost his voice due to cancer.
- Old Rochester High School had a presentation on Teen Brain Development and the impact of alcohol. The brain

is not fully developed until people are in their 20's.

Underage Drinking Town Meeting in New Bedford was well attended by a good cross-section of the community and media. It included group work and a perception activity.

Committee Budget – Prom Project costs were \$540. Currently, \$1460 is left.

GTHHSC/GATHER Planning Committee Update – A subgroup is working on building an Attleboro structure similar to the GTHHSC. The committee examined the 3 proposed structure models: 7 preferred that of GATHER being a central group in the hub of a wheel with independent area committees as spokes, and one abstained.

Safe Prom Project a Huge The Channel 5 Success – coverage of GATHER SAC project was shared with attendees. It included interviews Deb Brown. with Arlene Dickinson and a high school student, as well as a local liquor store owner who appreciated getting the heads up on dates and locations of area proms. The video may get parents thinking beyond what their kids are saying about everyone's doing it. They may also wonder what other parents are thinking of their decision to provide high risk environments for after-prom for their children. parties Channels 25 and 4 were also interested in doing a story, and several newspapers have already carried the message.

ProjectYELL(YouthEndorsingLegalLifestyles)–The grant award notice has beenreceived to restore funding thesocial norms project.

Timeline - Renewal applications deadline was mid March, but SAMHSA (Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration) will be flexible with the deadline, given the circumstances. The \$100,000 has to be spent by the end of September, but a no cost extension can be requested.

- Revision The application and budget need to be revised and submitted.
- Assistance CADCA (Community Anti-Drug Coalitions of America) has offered technical assistance with the process.
- > Staffing Funding can be used to do a needs assessment and for planning, but programming is lost for this school year. A grant writer and coordinator with a prevention strong background, experienced with federal grants, a selfstarter, who knows the ropes right from the beginning will need to be hired. Sabrina will begin to work on job descriptions to be sent out to websites and colleges such Boston University. as Details will have to be decided: Who approves the job descriptions? Who does the interviews and hiring? Shall the committee look at applications and select 3 names to go to Phil? Sabrina can be paid for consultation from the grant and send what

needs to be done, by when, as well as beginning work on a job description and consultation agreement.

Our Daily Bread provides about 180 meals per day. They are manv seeing new faces. especially voung males. Program does see some families but children are usually fed programs. through school Children will be seen during school vacation. Some individuals from travel Providence and Attleboro for a meal. Increase may be due to temporary court next door.

GATRA (Greater Attleboro Regional Taunton Transit Authority) is applying for MedWheel grant to provide elderly individuals with out of town medical transportation. Lord Cares Food Pantry is seeing more numbers. The Postal worker drive is May 13.

Taunton Housing Authority Transitional Housing Program serves 9 families. One family recently leased up. Referrals are being received through out the state.

Community Counseling of Bristol County (CCBC) provides the community with services from crisis intervention to general support. Most are Department of Mental Health eligible. They are seeing a lot of new faces, especially young males coming out from Taunton State Hospital.

CCBC Bridge House provides services to homeless individuals. They have increased beds to 10 for males and fewer for females. Presently male beds are full with one open female bed. Individuals in the program receive supportive services and can stay for a period of 2 years.

Board of Health is still working with 50 Washington Street residents. All residents must be out by Friday, April 7.

SouthShore Housing is an umbrella agency. Home modification program is available to homeowners. Also some Residential Assistance for Families in Transition (RAFT) funds are still available.
