He's written over 150 articles, including 15 on aviation hazards of airborne volcanic ash. He also teaches meteorology courses for future pilots at the University of Alaska Anchorage's Aviation Technology Center.

ACE AVIATION CAMP

Aviation Career Education (ACE) Camp

ACE Camps are summer educational programs for middle and high school students that can last from one day to one week. ACE Camps are co-sponsored by the Federal Aviation Administration (FAA) along with many other organizations.

The focus is on aviation career exploration with emphasis on opportunities for women and minorities. Students experience instruction in aviation history, the physics of flight, field trips to aviation sites and hands-on activities.

There is an Ace Aviation Camp planned for 7th and 8th grade students to be held **August 8, 9 & 10, 2006** at the UAA Aviation Technology Center at Merrill Field.

The FAA is looking for 99s participation and involvement in this year's camp. In particular they are hoping for 99s pilots with planes to offer demo flights to the camp participants

There are 16 students total, selected from applications and divided into 4 "crews." Demo flights will be on August 10 from approximately 10:00 a.m. to 2:15 p.m.

If local 99s are willing to participate and assist in this camp, the FAA will advertise it as the "99s ACE Aviation Camp."

They have developed a draft agenda shown at right—note that the 99s will not be responsible for" everything.

If you are willing and able to be involved please contact FAA representative Gabriel Mahns at 271-3665.

It is part of our mission as 99s to encourage young people to consider aviation as a career and for fun. I hope you will consider helping the FAA and UAA make this happen. The 99s will get some added publicity and exposure if we participate and it is billed as the "Ninety Nines ACE Camp."


At the stop sign, turn left onto Bogard Road. Drive ~1/4 mile. Turn right onto Engstrom Road (fire station on corner).
