

RESULTS AT MIDTERM

RIGHTS AND RESPONSIBILITIES:

- ♦ Facilitated writing 7 local conventions to manage natural resources on **1,600,000** hectares
- ♦ Assistance in writing local codes in 4 government forests and 2 community forests to manage forest resources on **191,000** hectares
- ♦ Training in **400** villages in techniques of reforestation, protection against grazing, and controlling bush fires

ECONOMIC BENEFITS:

- ♦ **959** meetings held in organization, administrative management, and value-adding techniques for small enterprises: 13,205 persons trained, of which 52% are women
- ♦ Mediation of the signing of **186** contracts between producer groups and product buyers
- ♦ **1,386** enterprises based on natural resources and agriculture have nearly tripled their revenues from the 2004 level, up to 148,500,000 CFA

POLICY:

- ♦ **12** barriers to sustainable management of natural resources have been reduced in the regulated hunting, migrant herding, and forestry financial accountability sectors
- ♦ **23** policy analyses and evaluations have been drafted
- ♦ **50** discussion forums for stakeholders in specific natural resource products have been held at the community, regional, and national levels

THE APPROACH OF WULA NAFAA (WN)

Wula Nafaa's activities are carried out with local communities, institutional partners, and other regional projects that work in natural resource (NR) management. Our mission is linked to the triad leading to sustainable development, identified by United States Agency for International Development USAID:

NATURE - WEALTH - POWER. NR management projects that integrate certain key concepts in each of these domains have historically been the most successful.

WEALTH

- ◆ WN does extensive training on controlled harvest of natural resources so that the capital on which producers depend is not destroyed

- ◆ WN negotiates buyer-producer contracts

NATURE

- ◆ WN supports communities practicing their rights to benefit from natural resources
- ◆ NR management plans are elaborated using the participatory approach
- ◆ WN works with communities so they understand existing laws
- ◆ WN assists forest communities to carry out their responsibilities for stewardship

KEY CONCEPTS FOR SUCCESS:

- ✓ Equitable access to NR benefits
- ✓ Governance that is just, democratic, and transparent

POWER

- ◆ WN facilitates negotiation between communities and government on NR exploitation /management issues, including those associated with migrant herders
- ◆ WN policy activity includes identification and reduction of barriers to sustainable NR exploitation by neighboring communities
- ◆ WN sponsors consultative forums for natural resource management partners in the region
- ◆ WN works with Forest Service to improve the NR revenue system
