NOTICE OF BOND RESOLUTION CLARENDON WATER DISTRICT NO. 9

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN that a bond resolution, a summary of which is published herewith, has been adopted by the Town Board of the Town of Clarendon, County of Orleans, on April 21, 2009 and the validity of the obligations authorized by such resolution may be hereafter contested only if: (1) (a) such obligations were authorized for an object or purpose for which the Town of Clarendon is not authorized to expend money or (b) the provisions of law which should be complied with at the date of publication of this resolution are not substantially complied with, and an action, suit or proceeding contesting such validity is commenced within twenty days after the date of such publication; or (2) such obligations were authorized in violation of the provisions of the Constitution of New York. **SUMMARY OF RESOLUTION:** The following is a summary of a bond resolution adopted by the Town Board of the Town of Clarendon on April 21, 2009 at a maximum estimated cost of \$124,376, said amount to be offset by any federal, state, county and/or local funds received including, but not limited to, grant and/or loan funds from USDA Rural Development Agency. Said resolution authorizes the issuance and sale of a serial bond or bonds and a bond anticipation note or notes in anticipation of the issuance and sale of said serial bonds, in an amount not to exceed \$124,376. The proceeds from the sale of the obligations authorized in said resolution shall be used for the specific purpose of financing the establishment of Water District No. 9 in the Town and the construction, restoration and installation of approximately 3,000 linear feet of DR-18 PVC water main running along a portion of Powerline Road, including land or rights in land, stream and road crossing, furnishings, valves, hydrants, fittings, connections, fill, services, appurtenances and related site work including preliminary costs and other improvements and costs incidental thereto for the foregoing purpose. The period of probable usefulness for said purpose is 40 years. 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FROM THE TOWN CLERK'S OFFICE - Susan C. Colby, Town Clerk/Tax Collector

Last month my deputy, Donna Goodrich and I attended the New York State Town Clerk's Annual Conference and Training which was held, this year, in Rochester, NY. The sessions were very informative and though some of the material was review, new things were learned and as always, networking with other Town Clerks in New York State seems to be the most educational experience of the conference.

Some of the bills proposed for legislation in the State of New York (as of April 27th) are as follows:

- A.3169/S.2754: Requires a public body that has the ability to do so, to conspicuously post the notice of the time and place of a meeting on their website. Passed both houses.
- A.2046-A/S.3543: Amends the Open Meetings Law to provide the following two options to a court when it determines that an action, substantial deliberation, or any part thereof, was taken or made in violation of the Open Meetings Law: 1) Declare the action null and void in whole or in part; or 2) Suspend implementation of the action and remand to public body for reconsideration. Passed both houses.
- S.4401/A.7732: Amends the domestic relations law to provide same-sex couples the opportunity to enter into civil marriages and prohibits differing governmental treatment on the basis of their being the same sex; Provides that no application for a marriage license shall be denied on the ground that the parties are of the same, or a different, sex. In Committee.
- S.2211(Diaz)/A.255(Perlata): This bill requires dog owners to microchip their dog before they may obtain a NYS license for the dog.
- A.991(Kavanagh): This bill authorizes the department of Ag & Markets to permit county shelters, pet dealers and others to issue and renew dog licenses and authorizes the issuance of dog licenses through the internet.
- S.2219(Diaz)/A.1540(Perlata): This bill requires dogs and their owners to undergo obedience training before they can receive a dog license from NYS.
- A.1893(Morelle): Notwithstanding the 24 hour waiting period, any military personnel whose scheduled military deployment is less than thirty days away, may get married within 24 hours of receiving a marriage license.

At this conference, I learned that the New York State Department of Environmental Conservation has already adopted increases for Hunting and Fishing licenses and that the age to obtain a Senior License will be raised from 65 years old to 70 years. I have not yet obtained the specifics from the DEC, but will pass them on as soon as they're available.

Your state representatives are listed on the back page of the Gazette. Let them know what you think.

WHAT DOES THE FLAG-DRAPED COFFIN MEAN?

Did you know that at military funerals, the 21-gun salute stands for the sum of the numbers in the year 1776? Have you ever noticed the honor guard pays meticulous attention to correctly folding the flag 13 times? You probably thought it was to symbolize the original 13 colonies, but we learn something new every day!

The 1st fold of the flag is a symbol of life. The 2nd fold is the symbol of the belief in eternal life. The 3rd fold is made in honor and remembrance of the veterans departing the ranks who gave a portion of their lives for the defense of the country to attain peace throughout the world. The 4th fold represents the weaker nature, for as American citizens trusting in God, it is to Him we turn in times of peace, as well as in time of war, for His divine guidance. The 5th fold is a tribute to the country. The 6th fold is for where people's hearts lie. It is with their heart that they pledge allegiance to the flag of the United States of America. The 7th fold is a tribute to its Armed Forces, for it is through the Armed Forces that we protect our country and flag against all her enemies, whether they be found within or without the boundaries of the republic. The 8th fold is a tribute to the one who entered into the valley of the shadow of death, that we might see the light of day. The 9th fold is a tribute to womanhood and mothers. 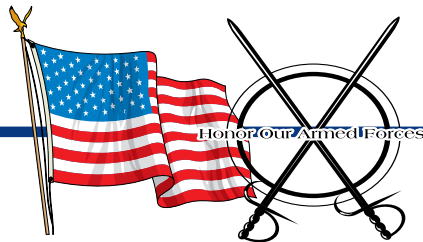

HOLLEY BOARD ADOPTS 2009-2010 BUDGET WITH ZERO PERCENT TAX LEVY INCREASE

During a special board meeting on April 13, the Holley Board of Education adopted a \$19,935,461 budget for the 2009-010 school year. The proposed spending plan is exactly the same amount as the current year's budget.

The proposed plan includes cutting two elementary teachers, one administrator, a half time guidance counselor, and not replacing one retiring special education teacher. The staff cuts are enrollment driven. Proposed program cuts were restored with the help of federal stimulus money.

"Since December the board and administrative team have been working very hard to produce a budget that is both educationally sound and that the community can afford," said Superintendent Robert D'Angelo. "I am pleased that the adopted budget carries with it a zero percent increase on the tax levy."

When Holley residents go to the polls on May 19, they will be asked to vote on three propositions. The first is the proposed budget of \$19,935,461. The second proposition authorizes the district to raise \$94,079 to be used in support of maintenance and operations of the Community Free Library. And the third proposition is for the purchase of two full-size school buses and two 19-passenger buses not to exceed a total of \$305,000, which, if approved, would result in a tax increase of two cents per thousand of assessed value.

Residents will also have the opportunity to vote on three board of education seats to fill the expired terms of Elaine Berg, Nicholas Penna, and Kellie Spychalski. The three candidates receiving the highest number of votes will serve three-year terms commencing July 1, 2009.

Holley residents will be receiving a budget newsletter in their mailboxes by the second week of May. Any group that is interested in hearing a budget presentation may contact District Clerk Connie Nenni at 638-6316, ext. 2003 to schedule a time.

Holley residents can vote on the school budget on Tuesday, May 19 from 6 a.m. to 9 p.m. in the High School foyer.

HOLLEY TEAM GETS CREATIVE AT ODYSSEY COMPETITION

The skit was about a hot dog vendor and his fortune, but the lesson was about creativity and teamwork. After working together since last fall, Holley's Division I team came in third place at the Odyssey of the Mind competition in Medina recently. Groups of students from surrounding schools use their creativity to compete in any of six "problems" before a panel of judges. The Holley team, coached by Brittany Leitten, fourth grade teacher, chose to tackle the superstitions problem, which required them to create and present a performance that included two documented superstitions, an original superstition created by the team, and the events that caused the original superstition to come true.

The students came up with the theme of a hot dog vendor and his dog traveling around trying to sell hot dogs. Along the way things started to turn for the worse and people stop buying his hot dogs. They incorporated the superstitions that if you pluck one gray hair out of your head 10 more will grow in its place, if you have red cheeks people are talking about you behind your back, and made up the superstition that pot holes are like black holes that create bad luck when you hit one. The team also had to incorporate a two-person costume, so they chose to make a two-person fortune teller from whom the hot dog vendor sought advice.

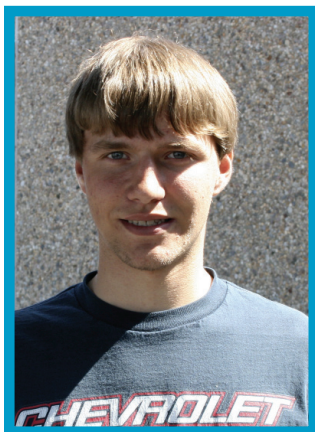

CLARENDON TOWN BOARD MEETING HIGHLIGHTS

April 2009

Supervisor Moy being in Mexico, Deputy Supervisor Allen Robinson filled-in on town business for the month and conducted the April board meeting.

Henry Hoak, Countyline Road Clarendon resident addressed the board and introduced Mark Scuderi, Regional Director of the All American Soapbox Derby Association. Mr. Scuderi explained the race divisions of the program and what is involved to earn a spot in the big Derby Race in Akron, Ohio. Mr. Scuderi introduced Rebekah Hoak of Clarendon, on of the 2008 Rochester Derby Race Champions, and credited her for racing in the big Ohio event. Mr. Hoak and Mr. Scuderi requested Town Board approval to hold a rally race on the Howard Road on May 23rd and stated they have contacted and gotten approval from Carolyn Bonter, whose property is where the race would be held. Mr. Scuderi has been volunteering for the Association for 15 years now and has brought four world champions home! He offered cars available for children who want to race on the 23rd, possibly with a community organization sponsorship. Mr. Scuderi informed that there are no vendors planned for this event; that after the rally, the participants will go to the Hoak home for a picnic, but offered food concession sales during the race to local community organizations that wished to do a fund-raiser. The Board gave approval to close Howard Road to through traffic from 7:00 AM until 4:00 PM as well as Countyline Road from Taylor Road to Howard Road. The race being held on Memorial Day Weekend, Superintendent Swanger informed that he will not be available and Mr. Scuderi will be responsible for physically blocking off the road and providing sufficient 'local traffic only' signage for the day in addition to submitting a certificate of liability insurance to the Town. Mr. Scuderi presented programs to the Board from the 2008 Rochester Race and left his phone number for contact (585) 266-8874. Mr. Scuderi thanked the Board for its consideration and offered to discuss an official race in Clarendon every year if the Board was interested in it.

Terrance Mosier, Powerline Road resident, addressed the board with a complaint that his mailbox had been taken

down by the plow earlier this year and the situation not taken care of to his satisfaction. Deputy Supervisor Robinson scheduled to meet Mr. Mosier at his home regarding the issue the following day.

HIGHWAY/WATER DEPARTMENT REPORT –

Superintendent Swanger

reported plowing and sanding one time. The highway crew has been repairing roads and picking up large items of garbage off the roadside. The winter equipment has been painted and stored for the season, dirt roads have been graded and trees have been cut down on LaDue Road with the help of the Orleans County Highway Department. Superintendent Swanger has scheduled a tire pick-up for May 4th and will attend the annual Water Conference/Training from May 11-14. Superintendent Swanger informed that there are multiple excavators scheduled to be auctioned off in Palmyra, and requested the item be put out for local bid instead. The Board agreed to advertise for local sealed bids on the following highway surplus equipment: 1978 DROTT Excavator (minimum bid \$4000); 1500 gallon water tank; 1000 gallon water tank; 1995 Karcher Pressure Washer 220 Volt. Superintendent Swanger will display the items in the highway garage parking lot.

PLANNING BOARD REPORT –

Planning Chairman Griggs

submitted the following written report: 03-24-09 (regular meeting) The Planning Board discussed an internal numbering error regarding application # SD 09-01, for a three (3) lot subdivision, LaDue & South Holley Roads, Doug Sutera. A motion was made, seconded and approved to correct the numbering error by reassigning a new number to this project; SD 09-03. • 04-14-09 (regular meeting) The Planning Board held a pre-conference for a Site Plan Review for building lot approval SD 09-04, Merrill Road, Michael Hicks... No issues were noted and applicant was informed he could waive the pre-conference and move to final approval if he so desired. Applicant indicated in the affirmative. A motion was made, seconded and approved to amend the agenda to a formal application. A motion was made, seconded and approved to approve the application for

building lot approval. The board continued a pre-conference for a Site Plan Review for building lot approval SD 08-03, Torrey Farms, Farm worker housing, Upper Holley Road, John Torrey. All issues previously identified have been corrected to the satisfaction of the Board. The applicant requested by written letter that the pre-conference be waived if no issues are present and the application proceeds to a final approval. HISTORICAL SOCIETY REPORT –

President Jim Moore

reported that the Orleans County Sheriff's Department is going to supply a crew and supervisor for them, to paint the schoolhouse this year. President Moore acknowledged that the Board has changed its festivities and meeting at the CHS from September to August this year and informed that the society will mulch the nature trail in spots again this year. They intend to put up permanent informational sign posts along the path in connection with the theme – 'Past, Present & Future'. The Society is looking at a grant to fund this project. President Moore will contact the school shop teacher to have students make blue bird houses for the area behind the schoolhouse. Programs at the CHS site this year will include two sit-down dinners with speakers and two pancake breakfasts. In connection with the Town Bicentennial in 2010, the CHS has started the preliminary work for a book, saleable at the Bicentennial Festival. Intention is to bridge the 1888 Copeland's Clarendon Book to present. The Society has oral histories that were done and would like to incorporate them in the book. Information and photos have to be gathered, put together and printed.

SUPERVISOR REPORT –

Deputy Supervisor Robinson

reported a busy month, thanked all town departments for their help in handling matters in the Supervisor's absence and credited Supervisor Moy as being a big asset to the Town! It was reported that the Orleans County Legislature is hosting a Legislative Town Hall Meeting on June 2, 2009 at 7:00 PM at the Orleans County 4-H Fairgrounds Trolley Building. Orleans County residents are encouraged to attend. Supervisor Moy has sent letters to Senator Maziarz and Assemblyman Hawley requesting their help in having natural gas run into Clarendon. The Joint Youth 2008 State Aid Claim Voucher will be filed for receipt of \$3000 in funding aid for the program. Account Clerk Swanger is looking into attendance at the 9th Annual Town Finance Schooling for her and Supervisor Moy. Correspondence has been received from Davie Kaplan, CPA firm, informing of NYS legislation that instituted significant changes regarding fire district and fire company audit requirements. Town Clerk confirmed that a copy of the letter has been sent to the Fire Company. Deputy Supervisor Robinson reported receipt of a spread sheet put together by a retired English teacher regarding wages of highway departments in the County and a summary for water billing is available, showing the gallons used per account. Deputy Supervisor Robinson will meet with a representative of the Census Bureau on April 28th regarding the town's roll in the upcoming Census. The County Youth Bureau will at no cost to the towns, host a two week tennis program with coaches as part of the Joint Youth Program.

CORRESPONDENCE –

A partial restitution payment for the

Munger Road Cemetery vandalism has been received. Dan Buongiorno has submitted application for a job at the Hillside Cemetery. The 2010 Census employees will be visiting every housing unit in the community between April and July of 2009. Census employees will wear official identification and carry hand-held computers to enter physical addresses and their GPS coordinates. The Office of the NYS Comptroller has sent notice of one-day seminar regarding the NYS & Local Retirement System on May 13, 2009 at the Ebenezer Watts Conference Center in Rochester. Account Clerk Swanger will attend as will the Supervisor or Deputy Supervisor. Tompkins Insurance Agencies, Inc. has sent a letter that outlines new rules and regulations of COBRA, effective March 1, 2009.

OLD BUSINESS –

The issue of non-conforming uses was generally discussed and board members determined another workshop should be scheduled; Attorney Schubel will attend. That will be done when Supervisor Moy returns. Non-Conforming Uses and Town Procurement Policy issues were both tabled to the May meeting agenda. Discussion was held regarding proposed Local Law #1 of 2009 regarding multi-family housing and the County Planning Board's report on the issue was explained by Attorney Schubel. Attorney Schubel suggested action on this matter be taken when the full board is present; item was tabled to the May meeting agenda. The Town Board authorized agreements for Water District No. 9 professional services; as follows: Webster, Schubel & Meier, LLP for Legal Services in the amount of \$3735.00 exclusive of recording fees and disbursements; Municipal Solutions, Inc. for Financial Advisory Services in an amount not to exceed \$19,250 including expenses; Chatfield Engineers, P.C. for Engineering Services

in an amount not to exceed \$10,688.59; Hodgson Russ, LLP for Bond Counsel Services at an amount per proceeding, according to their fee schedule. Attorney Schubel has revised and will forward to the Town of Barre for their review, an emergency water use agreement; item will be on the May meeting agenda.

NEW BUSINESS –

The Town Board approved a resident's request to pre-pay for burial services at Hillside Cemetery. A Resolution was adopted in opposition to any State Legislation that would allow a town board to make the Town Clerk, Receiver of Taxes and Highway Superintendent positions appointed instead of elected, without a mandatory referendum. Superintendent Swanger reported review of the NYSDOT Snow & Ice Agreement 2010/2011 year and the Town Board adopted said agreement; payment to the town for snow and ice road maintenance of 26.20 miles of NYS roads in the town for the 2010/2011 season was agreed at \$74,316.12, unless the rate is adjusted by future update.

At the recommendation of the Clarendon Zoning Board, the Town Board appointed James Sheffer, Powerline Road resident, to the vacant Full Member Seat on the Zoning Board; term to expire 12/31/2013. Marge Morse, East Lee Road resident, was appointed to the vacant one-year Alternate Member Seat. The Zoning Board also made a motion for Sheron Pedley to serve as Deputy Chairman. The Town Board adopted a Resolution in recognition and acceptance for a change in liability insurance coverage for the Joint Youth Recreation. This change increased the coverage from \$300,000 to One Million Dollars and reduced the cost to \$1677.13 through Dryden Mutual Insurance Company through Tompkins Insurance, agent. Expansion of the Business/Commercial Zoning District will be on the May meeting agenda.
