INTRODUCTION

Natural resources represent a significant potential for economic growth in Zambia. Almost two thirds of Zambia's natural resources occur on communal land. It is for this reason that Community Based Natural Resource Management (CBNRM) in these areas needed to be enhanced. Civil Societies could play an important role in strengthening the rural communities in CBNRM. Community Based Natural Resource Management and Sustainable Agriculture (CONASA) has recognized the need to work with Civil Society Institutions (CSIs) in achieving a more conducive atmosphere for CBNRM in Zambia. CONASA recognizes that the different CSIs have developed expertise in working with the community and are thus more equipped in dealing with certain aspects of the CONASA program objectives. It was in this view that it was deemed necessary to carry out the initial study of civil societies in Zambia to establish which were involved or had an interest in CBNRM. This was Activity 1 of sub-result 8.1: Identify NGOs and Private Sector bodies with CBNRM interests. CONASA could select CSIs to work with, based on their institutional strengths and potentials to contribute to CBNRM. This is Activity 2 of sub-result 8.1: Identify selected civil society groups for their institutional strengths and potential to contribute to CBNRM.

JUSTIFICATION

In order for the local communities to better manage their natural resources, their capacity to do so has to be increased. Civil Societies could effectively implement this by capacity building within these communities through formal mechanisms that recognize community division based on gender, wealth and livelihood. CSIs could also address grass root causes of unsustainable natural resources use. There is thus a need to identify Civil Societies strengths and potentials to contribute to CBNRM with whom CONASA can potentially work with, to help implement the CBNRM program in the pilot area. This is a follow-up of activity 1 of sub-result 8.1. This is important, as CONASA could use this in calling up the different CSIs based on their strengths and potentials to contribute to CBNRM.

OBJECTIVES

The objective of the survey was to identify the institutional strengths and potentials of the selected CSIs to contribute to CBNRM for the purpose of partnership with CONASA.

METHODOLOGY

A pre-designed questionnaire was administered to the selected CSIs.

- Appointments were made where possible with the contact person by telephone.
- The contact person/ interviewee was encouraged to give comments on the questionnaire, as well as general comments on the subject at hand.
- For the organizations that could not avail the time the questionnaire was left to be self-administered and a follow-up was made in case of ambiguous / vague statements.
- The organizations in Kabwe, Chisamba or Chipata; the questionnaire was sent by facsimile (fax) or electronic mail (e-mail).
- Questionnaires were not administered to organizations in the Southern Province. A trip will be made to the Southern Province to administer the questionnaire.
- Microsoft Access was used for the entry of the information collected in a Civil Society Database. The database consists of the following information:
 - Company/ Organization Profile
 - Activities
 - Institutional strengths and constraints
 - Potential to support CBNRM
 - Membership in forums/ associations
 - Specialist staff
 - Overall use to CONASA

CONSTRAINTS

- A number of organizations had telephone numbers that were disconnected, temporarily out of order, or had been listed wrongly.
- Some organizations had moved from their listed physical address at previously occupied premises. New physical addresses could not be obtained in the absence of a listed telephone number.
- In some cases, people to fill in the questionnaires complained that the questionnaire was too bulky and thus requested that the questionnaire be left over to be collected at an agreed date.
- Difficulty also arose in delivering and collecting questionnaires from persons that were operating in the Kafue National Park and only came to their Lusaka contact offices on an irregular basis.
- With respect to the questionnaires that were left at the visited organizations, there were instances where certain information was not filled in or was filled in wrongly. Where possible, this was rectified upon collecting the questionnaire.
- Certain information, especially concerning ‘institutional constraints’ was not readily given, in some cases (the organization was either too new, or the contact was unable to divulge the information due to the ‘right of privacy’ within the institution, etc.)
- Some of the questionnaires were not completed at the time of writing the report. Reason ranged from contact person being out of town, to them having a busy schedule.
- There were also instances where certain organizations were run as a joint venture or on lease. Difficulty in administering the questionnaires arose when parties tied to the organizations suggested that it was their partners who were supposed to give details of information requested and vice-versa.
- None of the organizations reached by fax or e-mail returned the questionnaire at the time of report writing.
- The late installation of software necessary to analyze the data collected, delayed the completion of the report.
- Delay in availing the enumerators with transport funds from the second week of the survey, hindered the collection of data.

- Non-availability of funds to complete data collection, from organizations in the Southern Province resulted in the delayed completion of the report.

RESULTS:

Of the 111 organizations, which were selected for the administration of the questionnaire from the baseline survey (phase 1), 62 organizations had completed the questionnaire. The following was the information collected:

1. Organization type:

From the results obtained, 41.3% of the organizations visited are local NGOs. International NGOs consisted of 20.6%, while commercial businesses represented 14.3%. 74.6% of these had their own independent governing bodies.

2. Organizational funding

There are ten types of funding sources that were highlighted in the survey. Of these, donor money was observed to be the most frequent source of funding at 54% whilst the Private sector represented only 1.6% at the lowest frequency. This is illustrated in Table 2 below.

3. Sectors and Activities

A large number of organizations interviewed are involved in the Environment Sector and this constitutes 93.7%. Activities in this sector include energy training, which is done by The Energy Environment Group, awareness campaigns, education, forestry management, natural resource management and soil conservation. Organizations involved in Tourism follows closely with 77.8%, whose activities include anti poaching, cultural conservation, eco-tourism, game ranching, infrastructure construction, safari hunting, tourism promotion, tour (viewing) safari, wildlife based development, wildlife entrepreneurship promotion, wildlife management and wildlife protection. Meanwhile 57.1% organizations are involved in the Agricultural sector with activities of agricultural development, beekeeping, fish farming, food security, out growers' scheme, and tree planting. Other sectors that may be of interest to CONASA include community development (47.6%), gender and development (1.6%) and indigenous knowledge systems (1.6%)-(refer to Appendices 21 and 22)

4. Community level of operation and involvement in advocacy:

87.30% (refer to appendix 8) of the organizations operate at community level while 68.25% (refer to appendix 9) were actively involved in advocacy work. Organizations operating at community levels areas are illustrated in Appendix 25.

5. Potential support categories:

There are four main categories under which organizations could bring strategic support to CBNRM. Table 5 outlines the 4 categories of support.

It is evident from the table that support was concentrated in wildlife conservation, followed by environmental conservation and rural development. The particular activities in terms of support under each category are illustrated in Appendix 12.

6. Organizational constraints and strengths:

Over half of the interviewed organizations stressed inadequate funding as their major constraint (55.6%). Inadequate transport represented 33.3%, while inadequate manpower accords for 28.6%. Table 6 below, illustrates the constraints faced by the 63 organizations visited.

Participatory methodologies ranked the highest (60.3%) amongst the 63 organization interviewed as the major strength; followed by information dissemination (58.7%). Information management was surprisingly bad, with only 38.1% of the organizations listing it as their strength and 33.3% listing Research Design as theirs. This information is illustrated in Appendix 15.

7. Areas of collaboration

Fifteen (15) areas of collaboration were identified. Of these community development was the most common, followed by community training, policy advocacy and media publications. Other notable areas of collaboration include, employment of community members, and trading with the communities, particularly organizations that have businesses within the community. This is illustrated in Table 7 below:

8. Forums and Association

19% (refer to appendix...) of interviewed organizations are involved in CBNRM forums, while 42.9% (refer to appendix...) are members of trade and non trade associations. However 47.6% (refer to appendix...) felt the need to form an association or forum in CBNRM.

From the results obtained, organizations particularly NGOs were willing to work with CONASA.

Organizations, such as the Commonwealth Forestry Association, Participatory Ecological Land Use Management (PELUM) and the Kafue Partners for Wetlands Project stressed the need to design programs aimed at reducing the misuse of ecological resources. This would bring about capacity building within the communities that depend on their available natural resources, such as forest and forest products.

Purity Agro-Forestry had empowered several rural communities in their areas of operation, through beekeeping, mushroom and fruit gathering, which allows for the useful management of their forests and at the same time generates income by the sale of these products.

Musungwa Lodge and Kasanka Wildlife Trust were of the opinion that the CBNRM should be issue- focused, where the financial resources should be utilized on the communities involved.

They felt that currently the overheads for most institutions dealing with natural resource management were too high. They are willing to give advice on cost-effective management of the natural resources.

Most of the safari/tour operators had the general opinion that there was need for improvement on infrastructure, especially the roads. They also complained about the non-availability of fuel and stressed that if this commodity were made available closer to areas of operation, it would result in the reduction of overhead.

Partnership Forum stressed the need to enhance the cooperation between communities, commercial businesses and NGOs. There can be no development in the rural setting as long as there was no partnership between the Government and the CSIs in community development on how to manage partnership in CBNRM.

The rural community have been sidelined on developmental issues for a long time and time has come for the rural communities to have a voice in dealing with the private sector that come to set-up businesses amongst them.

Government, rural communities and the private sector need not be antagonistic in their dealings. In most cases they can be necessary allies where there is mutual benefit to all the stakeholders. Thus most organizations felt that with the proper utilization of available natural resources, there is a real potential to alleviate poverty in the rural settings of Zambia.

Apart from involvement in the traditional sectors of CBNRM, it was discovered that some of the organizations visited were involved in novel ideas in the Zambian sense and were thus occupying a unique niche in the areas of interest.

It was interesting to note that some of organizations had published books on the environment (e.g. ECZ), had regular newsletters or at least had communicated through the media on issues concerning the environment (WECSZ). Apart from items on the television, radio etc, organizations such as YWCA had taken that one step further and made regular programs on the radio based on the fact that it is the most affordable medium of communication ('Voice Of Women' -Radio Mary, Eastern Province), that addressed environmental issues as they pertain to women of the communities in which they operated.

CONCLUSIONS

From the information collected it is clear that most of the organizations were willing to work with CONASA. In order to attain rural development, through natural resources management; civil societies, government and the communities themselves have to work closely together. For this to occur, the potentials and strengths of the Civil Societies, which enhances the link between government and the rural communities, need to be known. Thus it is important to collect the information from the organizations that could not be reached, as their information may well be relevant to CBNRM. The database should be regularly updated.
