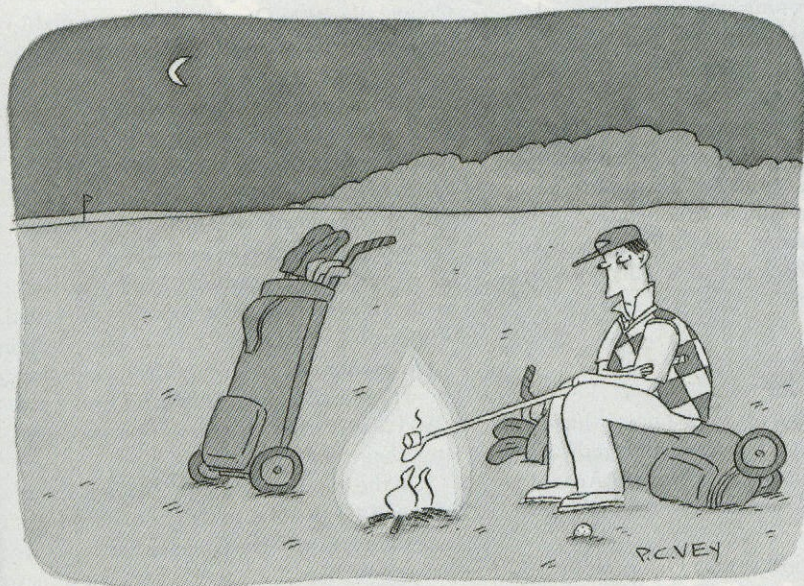


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Jack didn't mind that Ralph was always running off to 'go.'

*If you're taking a long time to go, maybe your going problem is a **growing** problem.*

If you not only have to go to the bathroom often, but find it's hard to start once you get there. Or see that you're starting and stopping, you may have an enlarging prostate. And you don't have to put up with it. Ask your doctor if *Avodart* is right for you. Most medicines only treat urinary symptoms. *Avodart*, with time, actually shrinks the prostate and reduces symptoms. So you stop coming up with ways to say "I have to go," and spend more time on the course.

Important Safety Information About Prescription AVODART® (dutasteride):

Avodart is used to treat urinary symptoms of Enlarging Prostate. Only your doctor can tell if your symptoms are from an enlarged prostate and not a more serious condition, such as prostate cancer. See your doctor for regular exams. Women and children should not take *Avodart*. Women who are or could become pregnant should not handle *Avodart* due to the potential risk of a specific birth defect. Do not donate blood until at least six months after stopping *Avodart*. Tell your doctor if you have liver disease. *Avodart* may not be right for you. Possible side effects, including sexual side effects and swelling or tenderness of the breast, occur infrequently.

- Getting up to urinate 2 or more times a night.

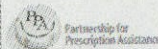

What is AVODART?

AVODART is a medication for the treatment of symptoms of benign prostatic hyperplasia (BPH) in men with an enlarged prostate to:

- Improve symptoms
- Reduce the risk of acute urinary retention (a complete blockage of urine flow)
- Reduce the risk of the need for BPH-related surgery

AVODART is not a treatment for prostate cancer.

Who should NOT take AVODART?

- Women and children should not take AVODART. A woman who is pregnant or capable of becoming pregnant should not handle AVODART capsules.

- If a woman who is pregnant with a male baby gets enough AVODART into her body after swallowing it or through her skin after handling it, the male baby may be born with abnormal sex organs.
- Do not take AVODART if you have had an allergic reaction to AVODART or any of its ingredients.

What are the special precautions about AVODART?

- Men treated with AVODART should not donate blood until at least 6 months after their final dose to prevent giving AVODART to a pregnant female through a blood transfusion.
- Tell your doctor if you have liver problems. AVODART may not be right for you.
- A blood test called PSA (prostate-specific antigen) is sometimes used to detect prostate cancer. AVODART will reduce the amount of PSA

measured in your blood. Your doctor is aware of this effect and can still use PSA to detect prostate cancer in you.

What are the possible side effects of AVODART?

Possible side effects are impotence (trouble getting or keeping an erection), a decrease in libido (sex drive), enlarged breasts, a decrease in the amount of semen released during sex, and allergic reactions such as rash, itching, hives, and swelling of the lips or face. These events occurred infrequently.

Talk with your doctor if you have questions about these and other side effects that you think may be related to taking AVODART.

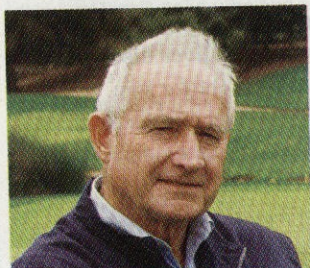

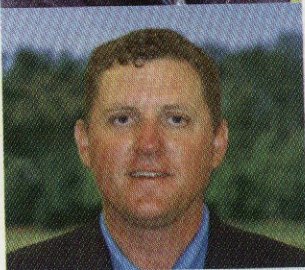

PGA PREVIEW

another day and a local-brewery beer bash on the Sunday evening after the final round. For this year's PGA Championship, Myers is bringing in several Golden Tee video golf games to entertain the troops.

During down time, some volunteers just sit and talk with one another about their jobs, getting tips, suggestions and ideas. Most never get to see the tournament to conclusion. After their Sunday-morning duties, they rush off to the airport to be back at their regular jobs on Monday morning.

THE PAYOFF

A successful major championship can be lucrative. His fraternity credits the senior Latshaw for being the Arnold Palmer of their profession, making today's big salaries possible.

Latshaw made \$30,000 at Oakmont in 1978 and took the Augusta job in 1983 for \$50,000, but as his reputation grew, so did his pay. He earned his first \$100,000 salary at Wilmington (Del.) Country Club in 1990, and signed for \$200,000 when he took over the Winged Foot job in 1999. But after organizing a massive tree-removal program, which resulted

in the USGA awarding Winged Foot's West Course the 2006 Open, Latshaw decided, at age 61, to leave the Open preparation to a younger generation.

Today, a superintendent at a major can earn a big salary and bigger bonus. One prominent superintendent on the East Coast received a bonus of \$250,000 after his major went off with no complications. The biggest bonus Latshaw ever received was \$30,000, after the U.S. Open at Congressional. "And they had to review everything first, to make sure it had been a successful Open," he says with a laugh.

Do volunteers resent that the man in charge gets a big payday for their labor? The ones we talked to don't, because they know, sooner or later, their time will come.

"On the Sunday night after the final round [of the 2003 PGA], I told my wife, 'I think it's time to move on,'" the younger Latshaw says. "Sure enough, within a week, I got the offer to take over Muirfield Village in Ohio. It was a bit more money, but honestly, I took it because I'd always wanted to work for Mr. Nicklaus."

Not every major has a happy ending. Ward says he received few thank-yous from his club's membership after the U.S. Open at Olympia Fields and was told he might want to look
