March is Desk and Derrick Awareness Month throughout our Association. I know most of our clubs are planning special programs or activities to promote their clubs and the Association thereby helping to build and retain a positive community image. I can hardly wait to hear about them all!

As many of you are aware, the ADDC Board met in Albuquerque, NM late in January for the annual Budget and Planning Meeting. Your Board worked diligently to sort through the committee reports and proposed budget items and put together a workable budget. All our committees worked very hard putting together a myriad of potential programs and had fabulous ideas for us to consider. In addition, we've listened to the members who have expressed a desire to bring ADDC's image into the 21st Century. Therefore, keeping in mind these economically challenging times our members and industry are currently experiencing, we were faced with several difficult decisions. The following paragraphs provide a synopsis of some of those decisions.

Upon the advice of our CPA and attorneys, the Board is proposing several amendments to the ADDC Bylaws, not the least of which will ask you to consider a change to our purpose. We're also proposing changes in our auditing procedures and including a possible Dissolution Clause. When the Rules committee releases the Proposed Bylaw Amendments, please read the reasoning for these proposed changes carefully. Feel free to contact me or anyone on the board with questions you may have.

Several projects were revamped, some were cut entirely, while others were relegated to the Specially Budgeted Items area in an effort to keep our current year's Operating Budget within reason. I'm sure everyone understands that none of these decisions was made easily or with disregard. One such decision concerns the Winning Image Photo Contest. The committee presented a proposal to expand the WIPC, enlarging its scope of photos and proposing added awards. After much discussion, the Board determined that expansion in this area was not feasible and did not help promote ADDC's purpose. We, therefore, have asked the committee to actually downsize WIPC to bring it more in line with the AIMEE awards and to limit its scope to items pertaining only to D&D and our industries. The committee will rework the contest guidelines and entry forms accordingly and more formally introduce the new, streamlined WIPC to the members soon.

An item I'm particularly excited about concerns the Public Relations Committee. In an effort to advance our overall image, we approved Specially Budgeted funds for ads placed by the committee and approved their request to research the expense and feasibility of hiring a small advertising firm to develop a marketing strategy to help ADDC market itself. They will also develop a Request for Proposal including a Scope of Work to be sent to small firms with a bid request.

We invite all ADDC members to participate in a little experiment for 2009. The idea for this experiment grew from a budgetary discussion into an imagery discussion and finally developed into a decision by the Board to try something a little different at the Regional Meetings and Convention this year. We've decided to dispense with name badge ribbons this year. Some of you might ask why...as I said, it began as a discussion concerning the cost of printing and maintaining an inventory of ribbons in ADO, but I believe our determining factor came about when discussing our professionalism and image within our own industry. When any of us attend other conferences within our industry scope, how many times do you see colored ribbons? Some will say that makes us unique, while others see it as a holdover from the era of Women's Clubs and Socials. Admittedly, this is only a small step we're

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taking toward a newer, more professional image, but it is, at the least, a first step.

We'd like to thank Ada Weeks, chairman, and the members of the Affiliated Review Committee. The committee took on the task of defining the term "affiliated" in relation to our membership requirements. Please read your B&P Highlights for exact wording. Now, when someone questions if one is eligible for membership although not employed directly in an energy industry, we have a definitive resource to consult.

Thanks also go to Immediate Past President Sheryl Minear. Sheryl has volunteered to examine all our ADDC and ADO forms and update them accordingly. She has already revised the Club Sales Approval Form and developed a request form for the new *Hard Hat Harry* costume donated to ADO last year by the Farmington Club.

Although a little more wordy this month than usual, I appreciate the opportunity to offer our members a glimpse at the processes your Board undertook on their behalf. We had to look at the situations we will all be facing during the upcoming years and try our best to keep ADDC on track to better serve all our members. Each Board faces unpopular or untried choices, but the 2009 Board feels we made the best decisions possible at the time and are confident the members will benefit.

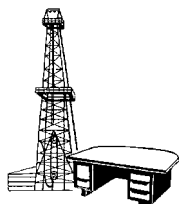

Conquer self-doubt to speak strongly

Don't let fear of speaking in public slow you down. Dig to the root of your fears by examining your beliefs. *Do you find yourself thinking anything like the following?*

- **"I have to be perfect."** No speech is flawless. Replace your unrealistic expectations with the desire to do the best you can.
- **"I will look foolish if I make a mistake."** Don't forget: The purpose of any presentation is to give the audience something—information, inspiration or motivation. If you concentrate on meeting the audience's needs instead of worrying about how you will look, you will feel more relaxed and energized.
- **"I am not good enough."** Most people are their own worst critics. But don't fall into the trap of projecting your self-criticism onto others. Do not picture your audience criticizing you or expecting you to fail. When you reject that belief, you dramatically reduce your stress and fear.

Manage workload to avoid burnout

These days, your budget may be tighter than ever, yet your staff clearly is feeling overburdened, and the pressure to do more with less keeps increasing. If you are not sure how much more your staffers can take, follow these suggestions to ease the strain:

- **Talk about the problem.** Don't assume that employees understand that you know how hard they are working and how they are feeling. Let them know that you are taking steps to improve the situation.
- **Ask them what they need.** Invite them to apply their creativity to suggest solutions. They may suggest efficiencies that you would never think of. Be sure to explain what budget, if any, you have to apply to the problem. If that number is zero, let them know upfront.
- **Discourage multitasking.** Teach employees to focus on one task at a time when they're suffering from work overload. They will make fewer mistakes and won't feel so overwhelmed. You may be able to take turns enjoying "interruption free" hours, or you might be able to volunteer to fill in to perform routine tasks so that employees can concentrate on high-focus projects.
- **Decide what matters most.** Meet with employees—every day, if necessary—to prioritize tasks. Drop or delay low-priority projects whenever possible. Tell them "I would rather see us do these three top-priority tasks, and do them well, than see 10 things half done or done poorly."

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February's Meeting in Review

SAFETY 24/7

Joyce Ryel, Desk and Derrick member and Safety manager of Complete Production Companies gave the Enid Desk and Derrick Club our February program.

The OSHA reports are showing a crisis in the Energy Industry. There have been 60 incidents, 33 inspections have been conducted and 32 fatalities have been reported. There have been 11 in the general industry, 8 in construction and 14 in oil and gas. There were 6 that were caught in the equipment, and 2 falls from elevators. Oklahoma oil and gas workers accounts for 45% of all fatalities and catastrophic events in the industry.

You create your own culture. Is it acceptable to smoke in church? What if our individual culture of safety was that strong? It depends on our own beliefs and behaviors. It is important to make a basic promise to yourself and your family every day. I promise that I will make it home safe everyday!

All organizations need a "culture of safety". "Safety 24/7" is a behavioral safety program but it must be a people based safety program.

Focus on behavior as a cause of incidents. Where is the behavior coming from? Safety is an integrated process – 24/7. It needs constant action. The core value is the most visible sign; over 5,000 people didn't fulfill that promise.

Incidents are preventable. Accidents are not in your control.

We create our own culture. It has to be company wide from operators, contractors and all locations of operation. Culture depends on what we demand personally and what is rewarded and tolerated from others. Safety is MY choice.

Make your own level commitment to safety:

Comply with conventional rules

Comply when made to; for example when you are driving and see a Highway patrol car, you slowdown.

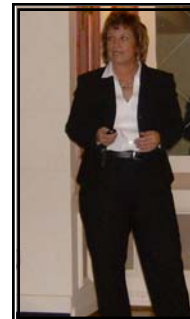
Believe in safety for yourself and your family; for example when you are boating, you make sure that the kids have their life jackets on as well as yourself.

Behavior for my family, my co-workers, and me is to be a safety champion! Have a strong safety culture.

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Safety leadership or LEAD

- L. Language – communication
Learning – Must be continual – why, when, where
Lift your voice – Share ideas – talk to yourself!
- E. Empowerment – ownership in safety culture – 24/7
Emotion – Do you care? Incidents happen to real people. It can happen to you.
Equity – Fairness; Actions speak louder than words
- A. Achievement – alarm clock vs. /opportunity clock
Audacity – Courage to speak up.
Authenticity – Show you really care by actively caring. How do you feel about yourself? Are you good at your job? Do you have personal control? Do you have a choice? Are you interdependent?
- D. Development – Safety practices are developed.
Decisiveness – Make good decisions quickly and stand by them.
Dedication – You must make a decision for yourself and others.



Be a safety leader, inspire a shared vision. Demonstrate integrity; talk the talk and walk the walk.

Effective communication is imperative. Make sure that everyone understands the goal. Be a safety leader, display enthusiasm but make sure that you express empathy. Ask the right questions and lead. If you lead, they will follow. Go beyond the call of duty for your own health, safety and welfare of others.

Most people care, but too few act on the caring. Remember, your life is like an hourglass. Once the sand has all gone to the other side you can't put it back in the glass.

Practice safety leadership. Ask yourself, if not me, then who? If not now, then when?

- Courage
- Compassion
- Caring

Make the promise and keep it – Safety 24/7.

Did you know....

Some fun Facts about Oklahoma in Oil History

The arrival of the Five Civilized Tribes brings written accounts of oil seeps in Oklahoma. The Plains Indians, already had been using the oil springs for centuries to treat rheumatism and other chronic illness.

April 15, 1897 - Oklahoma's first commercial oil well, Nellie Johnston No. 1 blows in Bartlesville.

June 25, 1901 - Drillers strike oil at Red Fork. Headlines proclaim "Geyser of Oil Spouts at Red Fork" and "Oil Well Gusher Fifteen Feet High," setting off a stampede to Oklahoma.

Nov. 22, 1905 - Oil discovered on Ida E. Glenn's farm, 10 miles south of Tulsa, ushering in the state's first major oil field and launching Oklahoma's petroleum industry.

August 1931 - Gov. William "Alfalfa Bill" Murray attempts to raise the price of crude by declaring martial law and calling out the National Guard to state oil fields to enforce a cutback in production.

The first Water well in Oklahoma was dug by a man from Pennsylvania
On December 4, 1928 oil was discovered in Oklahoma City.

All but five of the major oil fields were found before the end of World War II; the last was found in 1958 in Texas County

There have been 3 major Oil booms in Oklahoma

Formations have been named after where a rock out-crops (Red Fork, Glenpool, Etc).

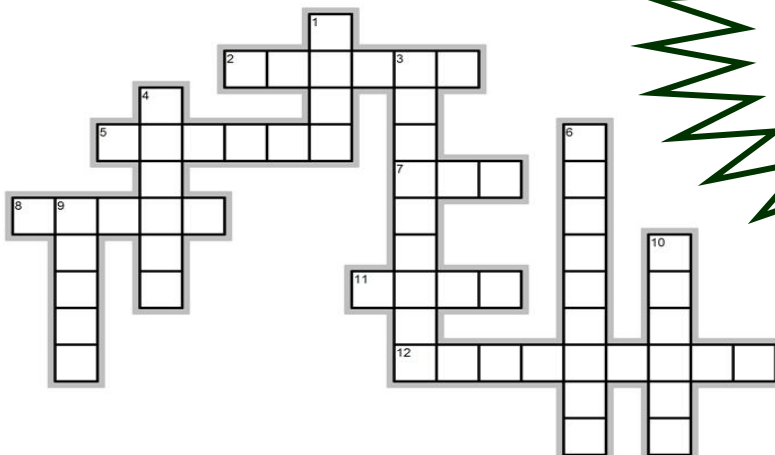
