### April's Meeting in Review

# Weirdos in the Workplace

When we first found out that Sean was going to come to speak to us on Weirdos at work, all kinds of ideas went through our heads. But, I don't think anyone expected to find out so much about their own personality.

Sean let us know right from the beginning that we would not learn about how to deal with what one might consider a "weirdo", but explained the differences in personalities that makes us unique. He began with a presentation on different characters from television and films that many consider weird.

Sean explained that the concept of personality type refers to the psychological classification of different types of individuals. Personality types can be distinguished from personality traits, which come in different levels or degrees. Types involve qualitative differences between people, whereas traits involve quantitative differences.

Sean explained some examples of early studies into personality types, beginning with the study of astrology, Hippocrates, and Carl Jung. Finally came Dr. David Keirsey, and his "True Color" communication system. As Sean went through each color, you could look around the room and see each member as they identified with one of the four colors; blue, green, gold or orange. The True Color system is based on the Meyers-Briggs Type Indicator, and offers a research-based approach to understanding human behavior and motivation. It uses a metaphor of colors (Gold, Orange, Blue, and Green) to identify four distinct perspectives and personalities. True Colors provides a clear, fundamental and universal way of translating complicated individual perspectives to help overcome the barriers to progress. This understanding improves collaboration, provides a way to strategize and organize work teams, helps increase individual and team productivity and recognition, and provides a way for decision-makers to utilize personality type in day-to-day management decisions.

Then Sean discussed the differences in generations and their attitude towards life and things in general. For the most part, the working people of today are from the Baby Boomers, X Generation, and the Millennial. Each generation has a unique way of thinking that contributes to their personality and how they interact with others from their own generation, and other generations.

Having Sean speak to us about this, opened our eyes and hopefully taught us that if we can see others as individuals we can more fully understand where "they may be coming from!"

Sean also spoke to us on the Youth and Family Services. He wanted to clarify that the children at this facility were not there because they were trouble makers but for various other reasons. He also wanted people to know that donations really are what keep the center going and thanked everyone for the donations that contributed to their new building. He invited us to come by and see their wonderful new center.

## Daily Introspective

### Or How Can I Bring More Meaning to My Work?

There is a daily five minute exercise to begin your day with on a positive note, first create a spreadsheet using two tabs. On the first tab list the following three points:

First ask yourself, "Whom do I serve?" You may serve clients outside of your own company but every single one of us have people that we work with every day inside our own companies. Are they counting on you to perform your job to the best of your ability that day? Do you count on them to provide you with good work? This helps you focus in on what is important that day.

Next ask yourself, "What are my strengths?" and "What do I do best?" Go deeper than the tasks you perform. Are you a good listener, a peacemaker, good data miner or are you better at multi-tasking? What are your unique qualities?

Third ask yourself, "What are my scores?" and "Am I doing what is really needed or am I just busy?" We can all fill our time at work and never accomplish anything worthwhile or we can choose to use our strengths to dig into the harder areas and make a difference. You need to know how you are doing in using your strengths.

Finally ask yourself, "What actions can I take today?" On Tab 2, make a list of all the tasks you have for the day. Try not to list more than you can accomplish in one day so that you can concentrate on today and not become overwhelmed. On the right side of the page you can list what tasks you can assign to others if you are in a group setting or a supervisor.



If you follow this format each morning, you should feel energized and organized for even the most stressful days!

### Dueling Geologists



Despite the name of the seminar, “Dueling Geologists”, the two Geologists who presented this seminar did not duel! The seminar was given by Devon Energy, Geologist’s Gayle Riggs, and Devin Dennie.

Gayle Riggs opened the seminar with a power point presentation showing the three different types of rocks (igneous, sedimentary, and metamorphic) that are found here on planet earth, how they are formed, and how they differ from each other. She also showed us the methods Geologists use to find oil and gas. Well logs, seismic data, and previous wells drilled in the area provide geologists with information needed to determine where to drill. Gayle showed us slides of various topographical land formations, rivers, and rock formations above ground that helped us understand what geologists are looking for in the earth’s formations underground. Gayle also showed us a fun side to geology, by showing us some slides from a few of the geological field trips she has taken.

Devin Dennie’s presentation began with Devin showing us portions of his short film, “Oklahoma Rocks”. This educational video documents Oklahoma’s geological history, through Devin’s travels throughout Oklahoma. Devin visits state parks, museums, and geological outcrops around Oklahoma, and interviews scientists, historians and Oklahoma residents to tell the story of Oklahoma’s geological history. His power point presentation showed how the earth’s land form and mass changed as the oceans receded and left deposits of silt, organic matter, and now extinct animals in the areas underground where we now drill for oil and gas. Oklahoma was under water on and off during the Paleozoic era and later during the Mesozoic era, when dinosaurs roamed the earth.

As Devin pointed out, Oklahoma has a very complex terrain, as we can see by the variety of ground formations found here. We have plains and mountainous terrain, waterfalls, and volcanoes. Devin explained that some of the oldest rocks in Oklahoma are found in the Arbuckle Mountains, and date to about 1.4 billion years ago. Some of the youngest rocks are in Black Mesa, and are tens of thousands of years old. The young rocks in Black Mesa are a result of volcanic activity in New Mexico where lava flowed over state lines into Oklahoma. Some Oklahoma rocks contain corals, and fossils of fish. Other types of fossils can be found also, such as trilobites, a prehistoric hard-shelled creature that has been extinct for millions of years.

The seminar was very educational, and gave us a better understanding of what geologists look for when determining where to drill for oil and gas.

2009 REGION VI MEETING

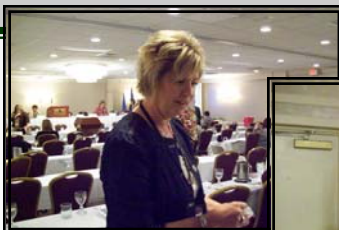

But ideology can’t trump the realities of the physics and economics....Facts still matter. “Magical thinking” comforts the idealist, but it’s not reality.

We need to stand up for our industry and our role in keeping the United States safe, well-fed and growing. Also we must respectfully disagree with the current policy direction on the Oil and Gas Industry. United we stand as Independent Driller’s. Restricting the growth of the U.S. oil and gas supplies will make us more dependent on foreign oil and will drive consumer costs higher. So as Harold Hamm would say: “It’s just common sense.”

Here is a story he told of in the 1870’s of the earlier farmer and his sons. Son and Father were out in the barn admiring the new steam –driven tractor they had purchased.
