

MASK DESCRIPTION- FINAL DRAFT
Due the day you return from Thanksgiving

As the final piece of your mask project, you will combine all of your work into a final draft description of your mask. As you already know, descriptive writing follows the same rules as any other writing in that you should have a topic sentence and supporting details. To make writing more descriptive, however, you should pay attention to bringing out details, using vivid descriptive adjectives, adverbs, and even more specific nouns and verbs.

Because writing should begin with prewriting and a collection of information, before you write, compile notes. Use the prompts below to collect information that will create a good description. Turn the notes into your paper, but use your own ideas and formatting; don't just vomit back the answers to the questions below. Make them into your placard to accompany that brilliant piece of art you are creating.

- What character or emotion does your mask represent?

- Describe the character. How do they look? Describe their personality.

- Describe your mask. What are the colors? What are the features?

- What does the mask represent? Why did you make the choices you did? What do the features and colors mean?

- How does your mask represent the character?

- How does your mask fulfill the assignment? How does it relate to the Greeks' use of masks in their drama?
