

**A Bill To Protect America Through Righteous Implications by Overturning
Terrorism with Tax**

1. Be it enacted by this Student Congress here assembled that:
2. Article 1: The United States government shall institute 5% inclusive tax on all
3. gasoline. Any and all additional funds gained from this tax will be
4. evenly distributed between alternative energy research and the War on
5. Terror.
6. Article 2: The gasoline affected by this legislation is any sale or distribution of
7. gasoline or diesel used towards powering cars and/or any other type of
8. vehicle such as motorcycles, trucks, lawnmowers, and heavy
9. equipment. The War on Terror is the U.S. global fight against terrorism.
10. Article 3: This bill shall take effect immediately after passage through the
11. Congress.
12. Article 4: The Internal Revenue Service shall oversee the provisions of this
13. legislation.
14. Article 5: All previous laws or portions of laws in conflict shall hereby be
15. declared null and void.

A Bill to Create a Border Wall on the U.S.-Mexico Border

1. Be it enacted by this Student Congress here assembled that:
2. Section I: The U.S. will build a wall on the U.S.-Mexico boarder, which

**A Bill to Mandate the Transition from Gasoline Powered Vehicles to Biodiesel
Powered Vehicles
“The Declaration of Independence from Foreign Oil Act of 2006”**

1. Be it enacted by this FFL Student Congress here assembled that:
2. Section I: The United States government shall institute a ten-year plan mandating
3. the orderly transition from gasoline powered vehicles to Biodiesel-85 powered
4. vehicles.
5. Section II: The following terms and provisions shall apply:
6. (A) Biodiesel-85 is defined as a fuel composed of 85% vegetable oil and 15%
7. petroleum distillates. A Biodiesel-85 vehicle is defined as a vehicle which has a diesel
8. engine.
9. (B) The orderly transition from gasoline powered vehicles to Biodiesel-85
10. powered vehicles shall take place over a ten- year period. 10% of all vehicles
11. manufactured for the US market must be Biodiesel-85 powered vehicles in the first
12. year of enactment. Every subsequent year the percentage of all vehicles powered by
13. Biodiesel-85 must increase by an additional 10% each year.
14. Section III: This bill shall go into effect 24 months after passage by this
15. legislative body.
16. Section IV: Jointly, The Department of Energy and Department of
17. Transportation shall exercise oversight of this process. American manufacturers that
18. fail to comply with the provisions of this legislation shall be fined up to 10% of gross
19. revenues for the fiscal year not in compliance at the discretion of the Secretary of
20. Energy.
21. Section V: All laws or portions of laws in conflict with the provisions of this
22. bill shall hereby be declared null or void.

A Bill to Uphold Really Great Eaters' Rights
("The BURGER Act")

1. Be it enacted by this FFL Timacuan Student Congress here assembled that:
2. Section I: Consumers of fast food shall waive liability of quick service
3. restaurants for any damages suffered as a result of consumption.
4. Section II: A. "Quick service restaurants", or QSRs, shall be defined as any
5. dining establishment characterized by food which is supplied quickly after ordering,
6. and by minimal service; the term shall be synonymous with "fast food restaurants".
7. B. "Fast food" shall be defined as any product produced by an
8. establishment as defined in subsection (A) of this article.
9. C. "Damages" shall be defined as any/all obesity-related health
10. problems.
11. Section III: This bill shall take effect within ninety (90) days of its passage.
12. Section IV: A. Any/all state and federal courts of law in the United States shall
13. be directed to dismiss suits at law involving the failure of QSRs to inform consumers
14. of the risks involved in product consumption.
15. B. QSRs that do not clearly post notice of the consumer's waiver
16. of liability as a result of the purchase and consumption of such products shall not be
17. entitled to the protection of this bill.
18. Section V: All laws in conflict with this bill shall be declared null and void.
