2. All information in this document is current as of Friday, February 2, 2007. A final update with information about any changes to this packet will be sent via email to all schools during the week of February 12.
3. 4. **All changes to Congress contestants and Congress judges must be registered on the Harvard Debate website and also sent via email to the addresses listed above. Failure to report changes to both places will result in problems that will be difficult to remedy on-site.**
5. HNC staff will be available during on-site registration Friday evening, February 16 to answer any final questions. **No new information about Student Congress will be provided at registration; we encourage all schools to use the convenient e-registration option.**

### **PLEASE DO THE FOLLOWING IMMEDIATELY:**

1. **Confirm that all information pertaining to your school's entry is accurate.** Please make sure that all entries from your school have been assigned to a chamber. Also, please check to see that any legislation submitted by your school is included in the **LEGISLATION BOOK** in the same chamber as its author. If you believe there has been an error, email the possible discrepancy to HNC Director Brent Pesola ([brentp@ccaeagles.org](mailto:brentp@ccaeagles.org)) **AND** to HNC Director of Operations Jason Wysong ([wysongj@trinityprep.org](mailto:wysongj@trinityprep.org)). If there has been a legitimate mistake on our part, we will promptly notify you of any necessary corrections. To maintain the integrity of our set-up process, we are unable to entertain requests for "mutual chamber swaps," legislation changes, etc.

2. **Read the information on pages 3-8.** This is an invaluable document for schools that have never been to the HNC. It contains information about the tournament's procedures, rules, and traditions. "Veterans" may also want to review this information because there are some changes to this year's format. HNC parliamentary procedural rules are also included in this section. All contestants—especially those attending their first HNC—should carefully review the procedural rules.
3. **Review the "Chamber Assignments" section.** Chamber assignments were made randomly after following special formulas designed to balance the chambers by school, number, state, region, and legislation topic areas. This year's HNC includes a total of fourteen preliminary chambers. Some chambers are labeled as a "Senate," while others are labeled as a "House." **There is no difference between a Senate and a House, except for purposes of decorum.** The entries in each chamber are in alphabetical order by contestant last name. Each school has a two or three digit numerical code. All contestants must memorize their school's code. It will be used throughout the HNC. Accurate use of the school code will ensure that all ballots are properly recorded and returned.
4. **Download the HNC LEGISLATION BOOK (a separate file) and follow the directions for printing the legislation from those chambers where students from your school were placed.** All of the legislation used for the Preliminary Competition can be found in the Legislation Book file. **No extra copies of legislation will be available at the tournament—contestants are responsible for bringing a personal copy of the legislation for their chambers with them to Cambridge.**

### TOURNAMENT FORMAT

#### Preliminary Competition

This year's Harvard National Congress will be among the largest in HNC history and one of the largest in all of Student Congress history! The tournament features 407 contestants in fourteen chambers (7 Senates; 7 Houses). All legislatures meet for three sessions of varying length. The first two sessions are on Saturday and the third is on Sunday morning. Each session constitutes a legislative day, so speaking order resets after each session.

Any student at the HNC may run for the position of Presiding Officer. Each chamber elects one Presiding Officer per session. Serving as P.O. counts two speeches (the P.O. can receive up to 12 points). No legislator may serve as P.O. more than once during the preliminary sessions.

The same Parliamentarian supervises each chamber for all three sessions. The Parliamentarian evaluates the overall performance of legislators, scores the performance of the P.O., maintains order, and ensures fairness in the chamber. One Scorer also evaluates each session. Scorers rotate to a different chamber after each session. The Scorer evaluates each floor speech in writing and holistically judges the performance of the P.O.

At the end of each session, the Scorer nominates 3 contestants for Best Legislator. The Parliamentarian makes 3 additional nominations for a total of 6. The P.O. may be nominated by either official, and officials may take factors other than quality of floor speeches (e.g.: number of speeches, questions, procedural debate, professionalism, decorum, etc.) into consideration when they make nominations.

The 6 nominations are announced to the chamber during *Orders of the Day*. A preferential ballot election takes place immediately thereafter. Each legislator's ballot counts for 1 vote. The officials also cast ballots that are weighted as follows: 3 votes for the Scorer and 2 votes for the Parliamentarian. If ties occur, the Parliamentarian's ballot counts 1 additional vote. The top 2 legislators in each election will advance to Semi-Finals. **The HNC does not provide its judges with a "do not nominate" list. Contestants will not be able to determine whether they advanced in an early session on the basis of which legislators are nominated in future sessions.**

Two more legislators advance from each chamber to Semi-Finals as Wild Card selections. After Session III has concluded, the Parliamentarian selects two Wild Card legislators on the basis of overall performance during the tournament.

#### Semi-Finals Session

**ALL SEMI-FINALISTS AT THE HARVARD NATIONAL CONGRESS AUTOMATICALLY EARN ONE LEG TOWARD QUALIFICATION FOR THE CONGRESS TOURNAMENT OF CHAMPIONS IN MAY!**

The above method of advancement yields a total of 112 legislators in the Semi-Super competition. This year's HNC will feature 6 Semi-Final chambers with 18 or 19 legislators per chamber. Assignments to these chambers occur in a manner similar to the method used in the Preliminary Competition. The Semi-Final consists of one session, which takes place on Sunday afternoon. One elected P.O. serves for the entire session.

One Parliamentarian and two Scorers (A & B) evaluate the session. At the end of the Semi-Final session, the Parliamentarian and Scorer A nominate 6 contestants for Best Legislator in the same manner as in the Preliminary Competition. A preferential election is used to determine the top 2 legislators from this list. In the election, each student's ballot counts 1 vote, Scorer A receives 3 votes, and the Parliamentarian receives 2 votes (plus the tie-breaker). The top 2 legislators in this election advance to the Super Congress. Scorer B directly advances 1 additional legislator on the basis of overall performance. Finally, the legislator with the highest speaker point average also advances (ties are broken by dropping high and low scores and/or incorporating points averages from the Preliminary Competition). Thus, a total of 4 contestants from each Semi-Final chamber advance to the Super Session.

### Super Session

The Super Congress at the HNC convenes on Monday morning. It consists of the top 24 legislators in a single chamber. One elected P.O. serves for the entire Super Session. Seven judges, including a Parliamentarian and 2 separate panels (A & B) of 3 Scorers each, evaluate the Super Session. All Scorers evaluate each speech in writing, while the Parliamentarian holistically judges the performance of all legislators. The P.O. receives scored and written evaluations from all 7 officials.

At the end of the session, each member of Scorer Panel A designates one competitor as the *Best Legislator* of the session. Meanwhile, the Parliamentarian assigns an overall participation score (on a scale of 1-6) to each competitor.

The top selection from each member of Scoring Panel A earns a space on the slate of "Best Legislator" nominees for the Super Session. Additionally, the scores given by each official to the Presiding Officer are added (with the highest and lowest score dropped) to determine whether he or she makes the *Best Legislator* slate. Nomination as P.O. requires a minimum benchmark score, which the HNC Executive Committee selects before the start of the Super Session. If the P.O. meets or exceeds the benchmark, he or she earns a space on the slate; if not, he or she is ineligible. The tournament staff fills the remaining slots on the slate (enough to bring the total number of nominees to 6) using the *Points Average Computation* (PAC), a mathematical formula similar to the NFL's base system except that averaged speech scores are weighted 80%, and the Parliamentarian's score is weighted 20%.

The actual slate of nominees remains secret. All legislators and all three members of Scorer Panel B rank the 24 competitors in the chamber on a preferential ballot, which the tab staff adjusts to coincide with the actual slate of nominees. Each voting Scorer receives a weighted ballot worth 3 votes, and the Parliamentarian votes to break any ties. This preferential ballot election determines the final rank-order of the six nominees.

From 1995-2005, all students in attendance at the HNC earned sweepstakes points for their school and points were added to each school's total from one year to the next. At the end of each HNC, the school with the highest cumulative total earned *The HNC Cup*, a traveling trophy bearing the names of all previous winning schools. The traveling cup was returned the following year, and a permanent plaque was awarded to that school. After winning the HNC Cup, a school's total returned to zero.

As of the 12<sup>th</sup> HNC in 2006, all schools were reset to zero points. From then on, only the scores of each delegation's best 5 entries count toward sweepstakes. For the 12<sup>th</sup>, 13<sup>th</sup>, and 14<sup>th</sup> editions of the tournament, the new system will be used to recognize an annual winner. That school will keep the HNC Cup for one year. Beginning with the 15<sup>th</sup> HNC in 2009, the sweepstakes will revert back to a cumulative format using data from 2006 onward.

The HNC also presents a *New School Award* to the delegation that earns the most number of sweepstakes points from among all schools participating in their first Harvard National Congress.

## OFFICIAL PROCEDURAL RULES

The following rules are designed to promote procedural unity among the chambers. They cannot be altered or ignored by a chamber through the use of a motion to suspend the rules.

1. **DECORUM:** Each chamber is designated as either a SENATE or a HOUSE. A member of a Senate is always referred to as *Senator*, while a member of a House of Representatives is always referred to as *Representative*. The Presiding Officer of a Senate is addressed as *Mister/Madame President*, while the Presiding Officer of a House of Representatives is addressed as *Mister/Madame Speaker*. The Presiding Officer is responsible for enforcing proper decorum. By tournament tradition, the PLEDGE OF ALLEGIANCE shall be led by the Presiding Officer at the start of EVERY session. **The use of an "open chamber" is absolutely prohibited at the Harvard National Congress.**
  2. **LEGISLATIVE DAY:** Each session constitutes a single legislative day. Speaking order resets at the end of each session.
  3. **RECOGNITION OF SPEAKERS:** The INDIVIDUAL RECENCY system is the required method for recognizing speakers at the HNC.
  4. **QUESTIONING:** A MANDATORY two minute questioning period follows all AUTHORSHIP, SPONSORSHIP, and SPONSORSHIP ON AMENDMENT speeches. **There are no other mandatory questioning periods.** The Presiding Officer recognizes legislators who wish to ask a question of a speaker; the speaker MAY NOT perform this function him/herself. Suspensions of the rules to create a PERMANENT questioning period or to ABOLISH all questioning periods are not permitted. Speakers have a right to refuse to yield to questions, except in the cases of AUTHORSHIP and SPONSORSHIP speeches. The PO has an obligation to rule that "two-part," misleading, or irrelevant questions are OUT-OF-ORDER.
  5. **AGENDA ORDER:** Each chamber sets its own agenda order for the Preliminary Competition and Semi-Final Session through informal caucus. The proposed agenda order must receive approval by a simple majority vote of the chamber.
  6. **LEGISLATION WITHOUT AN AUTHOR:** If the author of a bill or resolution is not present in the chamber, withdraws from the tournament, or relinquishes authorship rights, then a SPONSORSHIP speech is in order.
  7. **VOTING:** The PO determines the method of voting on each question that comes before the chamber. Notes on voting:
    - Final votes on legislation, amendments, and motions to appeal the chair require a recorded vote.
    - Voice voting is acceptable for all other votes, but a recorded vote must be taken if any one legislator calls for a division of the chamber.
    - A roll call vote is permitted if such a request is agreed to by 1/5 of the chamber.
- ALL simple majority votes are based upon the number of legislators PRESENT and VOTING in the chamber; therefore, the PO does not need to call for or count abstentions. For all votes requiring a fraction of the chamber to agree to a motion or question (2/3, 1/3, 1/5, etc.), the chair determines whether the chamber agrees with the motion/question using the number of legislators PRESENT in the chamber. Because of this system, the PO must track the number of legislators in the chamber at all times.
8. **AMENDMENTS:** Legislators submit amendments to the PO in writing. A motion to amend is necessary to consider the written amendment; such a motion is in order anytime after the AUTHORSHIP SPEECH. Once the motion is made, the PO decides if the amendment is germane. The PO may consult with the Parliamentarian to make this decision. If the amendment is deemed to be NOT germane, the chair rules it OUT OF ORDER and the amendment process stops. If the chair rules the amendment germane, he/she should read the contents of the amendment to the chamber. A 1/3 second of the members PRESENT in the chamber is required to debate the amendment. If the chamber votes a second, debate on the amendment commences immediately. Legislators may make a motion to table or call the previous question on the amendment at any time. The first speech on the amendment is a SPONSORSHIP speech. The chair determines speaker recognition for the SPONSORSHIP speech on the basis of recency; the author of the amendment is NOT guaranteed the sponsorship speech. The sponsor accepts responsibility for the mechanics of the amendment and yields to two minutes of questioning. All amendment speeches receive a score and count towards recency. A majority vote is necessary for the chamber to adopt the amendment.
  9. **OVERTIME SPEECHES:** Any regular floor speech that extends more than ten (10) seconds beyond the maximum speaking time of three minutes shall be penalized one (1) full point by the Scorer(s) evaluating the session. The Presiding Officer is required to keep accurate time of each speech and report it to the Scorer(s) when the speaker has finished. The Parliamentarian/Scorer(s) shall heavily penalize a Presiding Officer for inaccurate timing and/or reporting.

**LEGISLATION INFORMATION**

**THE PRELIMINARY COMPETITION**

Please see the LEGISLATION BOOK (a separate document) for full text of all bills and resolutions that will be used at this tournament during the Preliminary Competition. Each contestant should have a printed copy of the section of the book that applies to his/her chamber. It is not necessary to print the full book for each contestant.

To maximize student preparation time, each of the fourteen chambers has its own agenda. Legislation has been assigned to the chamber in which the author was placed. Those items comprise the PRIMARY CALENDAR. The actual agenda order will be determined by an informal caucus of the chamber prior to the start of Session One.

If a chamber exhausts the legislation on its PRIMARY CALENDAR, then it will debate the agenda of its TWIN CHAMBER (House 1 & Senate 1 are twins, House 2 & Senate 2 are twins...House 7 & Senate 7 are twins). Legislation from the twin chamber is included with the chamber's PRIMARY CALENDAR. Debate on these bills will begin with a sponsorship speech. Sponsors will be selected on the basis of recency, assume responsibility for mechanics, and must yield to two (2) minutes of questioning after the speech.

**SEMI-SUPER SESSION: LEGISLATION TOPIC AREAS**

Contestants who are invited to participate in the Semi-Super Session on Sunday afternoon will debate a set of new legislation. The legislation will come from the following topic areas:

1. Russia
2. Higher Education
3. Identity & Personal Privacy
4. First Amendment
5. Presidential Succession
6. CAFTA

The tournament staff will announce the actual legislation titles during the Preliminary Competition. All members of Congress are encouraged to compile research on these topics.

**HARVARD NATIONAL CONGRESS SUPER SESSION**

Contestants who are invited to participate in the 2007 HNC Super Session on Monday, Feb. 19 will debate new legislation. Information regarding the legislation for debate in the Super Session will be announced during the course of the tournament.
