DR. MOSCHEROSCH WINS 2020 MASS CHALLENGE WITH CHAIN OF DEAD ANIMAL PARTS

Dr. Michael Moscherosch won his first Landgraf Medal in 2003 and on March 13, 2021, in the thirty-third Mass Challenge competition, he chalked up his second victory and earned the right to a silver medal.

Though held this year, the March meeting was the COVID-delayed 2020 Mass Challenge, which was to produce a chain of an unusual substance.

Jordan Goretti was elected a member of the Lair that evening and entered the competition as a Postulate.

The winning entry was a hand-crafted chain consisting of 10 links of animal parts.

Three links were carved, using a Dremel tool, from a single piece of mammoth ivory.

Yes, the winning chain contained ivory from the extinct wooly mammoth of Ice Age fame.

Attached to that trio of prehistoric links were single links of the following animal substances: water buffalo horn, mammoth tusk bark, white-tailed deer antler, Steller's sea cow rib bone, pearl oyster mother-of-pearl, cow shin bone, and snapping turtle upper shell. The single links were joined to each other via

knotted elephant tail hair using a Zeppelin bend knot fixed with super glue.

To each link, Moscherosch then attached a decorative and descriptive tag bearing the names of and pictures of the animal from which it was taken.

It was a frigid night when 14 men met under the hood of the Huntingdon Valley Presbyterian Church barn in a barren space wrapped in tarps and warmed by propane heaters.

Lewis, Bryan Loudermilk, and Peter Marino joined online from what surely were more comfortable and civilized quarters.

The other entrants were

with a chain of recording
technology from an Edison
cylinder to a CD; Charles
George, zooming in from

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Pittsburgh, with a chain of coffee cups that dangled and clanged like a Buddhist windchime; Raymond Hull III with a stylish LED bling chain sure to take the gangsta world by storm; Roger Hull with a mathematically mysterious chain of Mobius strips from which each attendee got his own strip as a souvenir of the evening; Jordan Goretti, the newest Rascal, with an appetizing oven-roasted orange chain; Hayes Lewis, calling in from Texas, with a chain of water ice; Director Calvin Morrison with a chain of 3D printed links; Dan Morrison with a chain of past Rascal personalities that he dubbed "Rascal Pantheonists;" Leon Moscherosch with a verbally clever but dangerous-looking saw chain; and David Rowland, RR&R visitor and president of the Old York Road Historical

Society, with a chain of title reaching back to William Penn for Alverthorpe Manor, where the OYRHS keeps its offices and collection.

Present but not competing were Jon Haines, George Hindley, Rascal Sean McVan, and Noel Wolfe.

The night's competition was perhaps the

keenest seen in Rascal history and all 11 entries were worthy of a win.

But when votes were tallied, **Moscherosch** emerged the clear winner, which was a relief to him as Moscherosch has twice lost out on a Mass

Challenge win when tied votes were settled by brutish arm wrestling matches: first in 2008 against **Dan Morrison** and then in 2014 against **Roger Hull.**

Friends of the good doctor had suggested that he work on his biceps as well as his





research, but his strategy this year was to shock and awe the group with dead animal parts, including those harvested from an extinct species.

"The animal chain is the most obscure and elaborate contribution to a Mass Challenge I've ever made," Moscherosch said with great satisfaction. "But it was worth it to win the Challenge the second time in 17 years."

As a two-time winner of the Mass Challenge, Moscherosch's Jon Landgraf medal will be silver plated and engraved with the date of his second win.

The 2021 Mass Challenge, which will be competed on December 11 of this year, is to write and declaim a poem. The entries to the competition will be gathered and published in a commercially-available volume.

Calvin Morrison handled the technology: a laptop, separate webcam and speakers, a large screen television, and cellular internet connection. It was a lot of gear to manage but we saw many long-lost Rascals, some for the first time in more

than a decade.

In light of the Zoom revolution, Lair No. 3 amended its bylaws to accommodate non-resident members. **Tim Esaias**, of Pittsburgh, and **Hayes Lewis**, of Fort Worth, were the first two to take advantage of this option.

Running a hybrid live-virtual meeting is a challenge. Managing the online technology while trying to be part of the in-person gathering is demanding. And virtual participants are more peripheral to the meeting than those at the table.

But bad is better than nothing.

It would be good if we had a dedicated Zoom jockey responsible for the technology and the online experience of the distant Rascals. Certainly Zoom is here to stay and in the future we may do well to conduct our business meetings via Zoom.

The View from Pittsburgh

Having attended the November 2000 meeting of Lair no. 3, I had been intending to come to a twentieth anniversary meeting. Then, alas, pandemic. So I appreciate all the efforts that allowed several of us (including **Charles George**, who also attended that long-ago event) to attend the December 2020 meeting virtually, if not (being Rascals) virtuously.

The fun of Rascal meetings is always the wide-ranging discussions. That makes a Research Report session an especially rich experience. How often do you get the high points of so many personal quests by people who are actively in search of the Interesting Thing?

I benefitted from this event by getting a name for a fictional character: Tori (or perhaps it will be Tory) Gates.

Pride of place surely goes to "When the Evening Gets Down to Cigars," an occasional poem written for the Rascals in 1993 by **Prof. Dr. Samuel Hazo**, then Pennsylvania Poet Laureate.

The most recent bit of Rascal verse was heard at the fourth quarter 2020 meeting. Attached here, the poem was read (a good poem, it must read well) by **Peter Marino**, via Zoom, all the way from Atlanta, as part of the twentieth anniversary celebration.

Bill Baierl contributed some spicy lines to a past issue of *The Megaphone*.

Tim Esaias actually makes money writing poems. Hard to believe, but people pay for the stuff. He has read poems at Rascal meetings and wrote a few lines in response to a past Mass Challenge. His verses are always erudite and amusing.

Hayes Lewis reports the summer doldrums have arrived in Fort Worth, Texas.


Peter Marino is hoping to buy a house in Todi, Italy.

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Rascals in the Press Again: Long PR Dry Spell Finally Broken

The Enterprise, the weekly newspaper from Burgettstown, Penna., has the distinction of being the first publication to mention the Rascals, Rogues, and Rapscallions. The date was June 8, 1994 and the occasion was the screening of a film by Greg Scheer. That made-for-community-television video documentary featured a heavily tattooed wino, who died just after the film was finished, and a pot-bellied pig living in the

story in the Pittsburgh Post-Gazette by Mike Pelligrini. Front page of the features section, with a large photo of Jeff Campbell and Bill Baierl engaged in an arm-wrestling contest, the article captured the spirit and genius of the group. Pelligrini later joined the Rascals.

In 1997, the Roanoke Times ran a column about an attempt by **Peter Fosl** and others to raise the Rascal flag over

And then came the dry spell, a decade without any notice in the press.

In 2019, the Rascals had a near miss when *Bucks County Courier-Times* mentioned work done by a Rascal in connection with the 2019 Mass Challenge but failed to name the group.

The twentieth anniversary of Lair No. 3 was newsworthy so **Dan Morrison** sent word to the *Intelligencer* and *Bucks County Courier-Times*

newspapers hoping they would cover the event.

Neither paper bit, but Bucks County Magazine did! A glossy, quarterly lifestyle magazine, it ran an 1800-word article and 11 color photos splashed across six pages in the Spring 2021 issue.

The headline is from **Greg Scheer's** Rascal ditty and **Ray Hull II**, who died shortly before the article appeared, is featured.

town's hardware store and the center of a legal brouhaha that occupied the front page of the Burgettstown newspaper for many issues.

Surely the most impressive newspaper appearance for the Rascals was a March 11, 1996 Mount Roger, Virginia.

The RR&R was mentioned in a January 7, 1999 article in *The Philadelphia Inquirer* about **Dan Morrison** trying to get the Empress of Mexico, buried in Philadelphia, canonized by the Roman Catholic Church.

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NEWEST ROGUE CREATED: Sean McVan Digs into Irish Roots

McVan was elevated to the rank of Rogue following his Rascal Challenge

presentation at the June 12, 2021 meeting of Lair No. 3.

The Republican candidate for mayor of Doylestown, Sean McVan, was elevated to the rank of Rogue at the second quarter meeting of Lair No. 3.

Dinner, as elegant as ever, consisted of a hoagie tray and pizzas. **Michael Landis**, Manor College philosopher, made his second appearance at an RR&R meeting.

McVan, who joined the Rascals in 2019, was offered the opportunity to present on animal husbandry but opted to dig into his genealogy. Mostly he spoke of sports and goats.

There are many McVans in Doylestown. Indeed, in the 1990s, Calvin Morrison and Dan Morrison lived in the 1873 Hugh McVan house next door to Jerry McVan, Sean's uncle.

In the 1970s, Sean's father, **Robert McVan**, was on the Doylestown Borough Council.

McVan's family, on both his mother's and his father's side, hail from Ireland and Sean visits his relatives in emerald isle on an annual basis. "I've been to Ireland more often than New York," McVan observed.

The Lair was instructed on two manly Irish sports: Gaelic football and hurling. We also learned about the rural area where McVan's relatives farm.

The most surprising result of his research was that the McVan's are Irish transplants, having begun in Scotland near Loch Ness.

This fact did not incline McVan to call himself a Scot, however.

Along with his computer slide show, which suffered from a non-cooperative projector, Sean brought a slew of historic papers and photos connected with his family.

Following his presentation, Sean absented himself from the table while the Lair considered whether he successfully met his Challenge.

When the vote was taken, all were in favor of advancing the young Hibernian, but with one caveat: that he give a fuller explanation of the goat which sits atop a tower during a certain fair in Ireland. As an explanation was forthcoming, Sean was welcomed to the ranks of Rogues.
