Pros

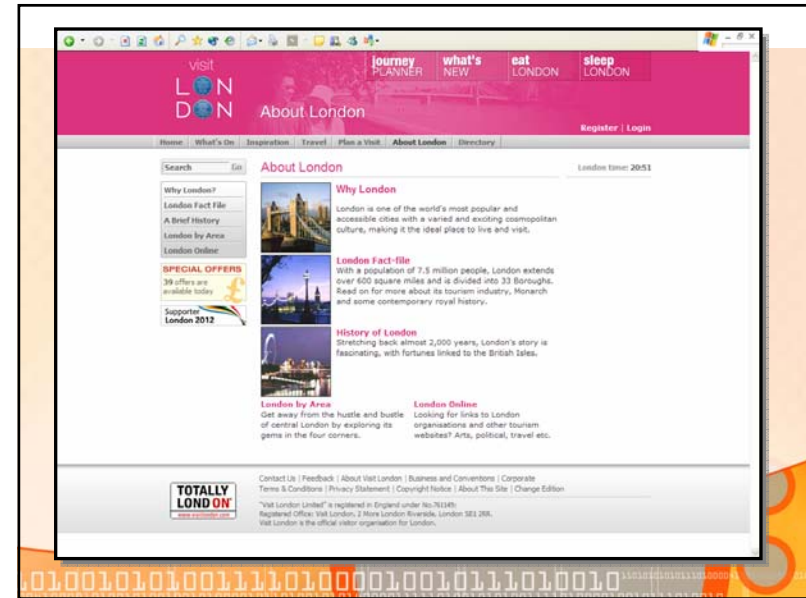
- Very, very easy to use

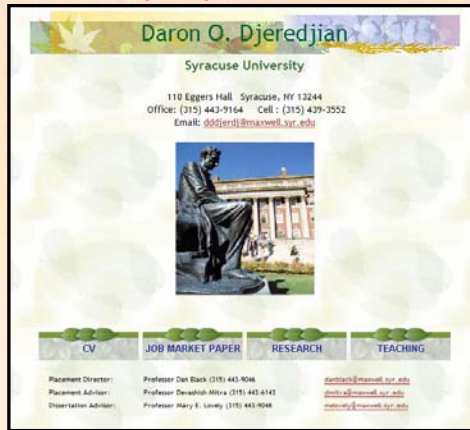

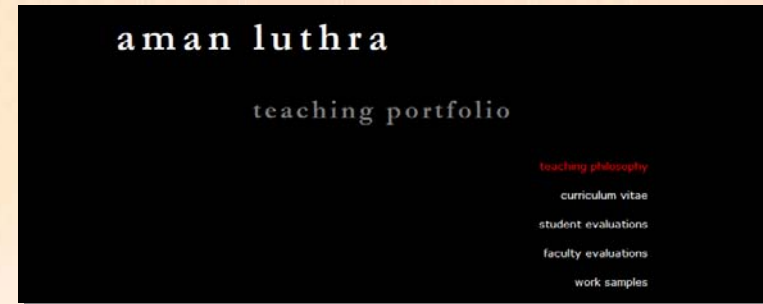

How to start things up with CD Auto Start

- CD Auto Start

Add Autostart to your CD for PCs and Macs!

It's really quite simple to create a CD that will start up automatically on a PC or Mac. The steps below show how to create and burn the CD with a Macintosh computer. It can also be done with a PC, but with limited capability (see below). We've tailored the instructions and files that you download to startup an HTML page, but the principles shown can be applied to startup any program or file.

Step One: Create your web pages or HTML gallery. Our CD consists of a simple HTML Gallery. There are many programs to accomplish this. We use iView MediaPro for the Mac-- Windows version will be available (www.liteo-multimedia.com). You can also use Photoshop, or ThumbsPlus for windows (www.cenosis.com), among others. When creating your HTML gallery, you'll want to use the .htm extension, not the .html extension.
