Reports

The Guardian ad Litem program is a very unique program in that we rely heavily on volunteers to carry out investigations, talk to children, therapists, family members, etc and submit a report to the court on behalf of the child client. Often times, the volunteers are able to gather information no one else has been able to get, or track people down that no one else has been able to find. Many times, our volunteers are very well connected to the community and are able to help secure services for the children we serve and their parents.

Volunteers truly are the eyes and

ears of the judge, and often times, the only voice a child has in court.

The reports that are filed by you the volunteer are crucial to the case you are working on. If the reports are not filed on time, by law, the judge is not required to read the report. This is very important to keep in mind when you are preparing your reports. If the judge does not receive your report on time, the child's voice may never be heard in court.

Please be sure to get your report to the supervisor in the county you serve at least two weeks before the actual

court date, whether your report is e-mailed, typed and hand delivered, hand written, or given verbally via the phone or face to face. This will ensure that your report, will be filed on time and the child's voice will be heard in court.

If you have any questions or concerns about your case, please do not hesitate to call our offices.

Thank you for all of the hard work you do and the time you sacrifice, all in order to help protect a child. You are appreciated and we could not do this without you.

Youth Reports

Your job as a volunteer is to be a voice for children in court, and that is a very important job. We advocate for the best interest of the child, and most importantly, we ensure the court knows what the CHILD wants. Often times the children feel helpless in this court process, or perhaps they don't feel like their opinion really counts in court. A Youth Report has been created to address that very problem. Youth Reports are used

for children that are 12 years of age and older. These reports allow children to put in their own handwriting and their own words what they want and believe should happen. They are actually given the chance to make recommendations to the judges as well. These reports are generally filed with the volunteers court report so all parties involved, including the judge, is able to see what the child wants for themselves.

If you need a Youth Report for your child to fill out, please let us know. If your child would rather write a letter to the judge, that is acceptable as well. Again, these reports and letters are generally attached to your report for everyone to read. **If the child wishes to keep the letter or report private, please let us know so we can ensure their privacy is respected and only the judge reads the letter.**

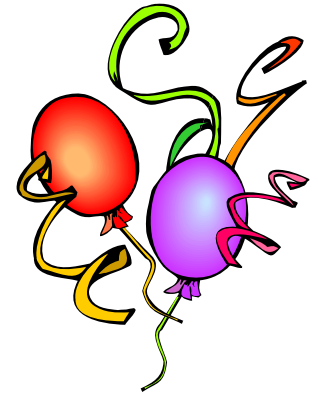

Protect Yourself: Disable Caller ID

If you must call from your home, work, or cell phone, remember to use *67 before dialing the number. This will prevent the people you are calling from getting your number. If they have Caller ID, it will display "private" when the receiver looks for the number. Also, if someone tries the "callback" feature, the call will not go through or display your number.

Dial *67, you will hear a series of beeps, then dial tone; then just dial the number.

What Every GAL Should Know About NC Kids...

- ♦ NC Kids Adoption & Foster Care Network helps North Carolina agencies recruit families for children.
- ♦ NC Kids maintains North Carolina's central directory of waiting children and prospective parents.
- ♦ NC Kids utilizes the internet, television, and print media to recruit families for children.
- ♦ Agencies are required to register children with NC Kids within 30 days of becoming legally free when the plan is adoption and no home is identified.
- ♦ NC Kids is able to internally recruit for legal risk children.
- ♦ NC Kids send social workers homestudies of families who wish to be considered as an adoptive family for a specific child
- ♦ GAL's can help children find permanence by working with social workers to ensure children are registered and that adequate information and pictures are available for recruitment.

We had 64 5th graders in Lenoir County write essays on "What is Child Abuse and Neglect and How Can You Create a Safe Community by Promoting Awareness and Prevention?". These essays were very good and really touched our hearts. We hope to continue this essay contest every year in April.

Lenoir County Family Drug Treatment Court

Judicial District 8 is pleased to announce the start of Lenoir County Family Drug Treatment Court (FDTC) on March 21, 2007. Wayne County Family Drug Treatment Court has been operational since September 2005 and currently has (19) active participants. We are excited to bring this Court to Lenoir County in an effort to create a safe and permanent home

for each child and substance abuse treatment for the parent or guardian. The Drug Court program offers intensive drug and alcohol treatment, supported by rewards and consequences, that encourages the successful rehabilitation necessary for the healthy reunification of parent and child.

Lenoir County FDTC currently has (5) active participants

and more referrals are coming in each week. Judge Joseph E. Setzer, Jr. is the presiding Judge. To successfully graduate from the Drug Court program, you must be clean/sober for 270 consecutive days. Transporting Clients

Over the past 6 months, we have had volunteers throughout our district ask questions about transporting their kids and/or their kids' parents. As a GAL volunteer, our job is to advocate for our children. If they need to be transported to church, school or doctor's appointments, that is the social worker's, or caretakers responsibility. This rule comes from GAL Best Prac-

tices Guidelines. There are many reasons why we should not put a child or a parent in our vehicle. We could get in a car accident and we would then be liable for their personal injuries. Additionally, transporting a child is outside our advocacy role. A child could act out while being transported and this could also case a problem. If you are in a situation where you think a child

or a parent needs to be transported, you have many options. If the child is in immediate danger, call 911. If not, call DSS or call the GAL office. There is always a way to help your child, and we want to make sure that you don't put yourself at risk while doing so. Thank you for all that you do for our children. Continue to keep up the good work.

TRAVEL REIMBURSEMENTS

As you already know, the state reimburses volunteers for case related travel as long as the funds are available and the request is submitted timely. The rate recently increased to forty cents per mile (.40). The state office has made specific requests in order to process your paperwork quickly. Please keep in mind that the person in Raleigh who processes these reimbursements is not knowledgeable of every city and county in North Carolina. To this end, please complete the form completely. Start with the day of the month, just simply the number such as 1. Please list the "to" city and the "from" city, even if they are the same. For the purpose, you may list the school, hospital, DSS, home visit, etc. along with the case number. Then list the number of miles in whole numbers, rounded off to the nearest mile. Multiply the number of miles by .40; which result in a total that should be listed under amount. Total the front page and put that amount in total trans. block. If needed, continue on the back in the same manner and total that page also.

Remember to complete the top portion of the form as well. On each form you must check the division, which is Guardian ad Litem. Then complete your name and address. Check the block only if you have a name or address change. Enter your title (Volunteer) and the Headquarters city (Kinston or Goldsboro). Enter your social security number. Enter the month and year for which the reimbursement is requested. Enter the date the request was prepared. Please sign it. The total cost should reflect the totals from both the front and back of the page. Also put that same total in the reimbursement block. ***Remember, incomplete data results in delays locally or at the state office.***

Travel reimbursements should be submitted on a monthly basis. A good rule for timelines is a submission within five (5) business days of the month following the month of travel. You can mail them in, bring them in, slide them under the door or present personally; we must have an original signature to submit for reimbursement. For your convenience, a mileage chart is below.
