Minutes of GPFHA Meeting

April 5, 2008

Members Present: David and Dixie DeLozier, Willie & Erika Kurth, Joyce Davis, Gwyn Wright, Cindy Griffeth, Kim Willis, Suzy Varner, Boyd Russell, Christi White, Nancy Clark

Meeting called to order by Gwyn at 12:30p.m.

Minutes of Meeting from January 2008 accepted after motion by Dixie, seconded by David.

Open House – Gwyn stated that she has mailed out surveys to the participants in the March 2008 Open House in order to determine how the clinic could be improved. There were 21+ horses, 20 riders, 48 people for dinner. Gwyn has received positive emails from several participants. Looking at holding next year's event at Chicopee again. Date available to us March 21-22 as the 14th is the St. Patricks Day parade in Atlanta. Charlie is interested in being clinician again next year. Suggestions for improving information to interested horse owners, such as pamphlet brochure for sale horses, was discussed as well as separating the fun show from the clinic fee and having a different pricing level. The possibility of a sale class was considered. StableMates was used to advertise for Open House. Date

Trail rides – Boyd Russell – no new reports. There will be a meeting with Watson Mill soon. Next ride is a Poker Ride at Jake Mountain. Dupont ride in May. Still need volunteers to work the rides.

Parades – Memorial Day Parade is upcoming. Jennifer Neely is the new contact for parade information.

Fundraiser – Boyd & Chris putting together a list for vote from board for 2008 recipient. Boyd has reserved space at Watson Mill, plus stalls and cabin.

Membership – Kim stated there are approximately 100 members – 12 new members from the Open House. She has email contacted those members who had not renewed.

Finance – Dixie present financial statements with data through April 4th. The reports are currently missing expenses on directory ads, bill for Charlie's hotel, and cost for GPFHA new directory.

Publicity - Joyce reviewed current advertising efforts. Currently have exposure through trail ads in StableMates, listed on the Judge's List, and press release sent to Gainesville Times for 2008 Open House. Several other events still to be advertised. Two ads planned for show, plus ads for trails, schedules on several free venues, plus schedule on website, and Judge's List. Paso Fino Finder also has our schedule. APF. com has posts for our events. Surveys results of approximately 25 responses reflect that 25% heard about us from the website calendars or the StableMates ad; the largest response indicated they heard about us from flyers and friends.

National Delegate – Cindy indicated it was time to vote for Hall of Fame vote for horse/person. Membership in attendance informally voted that Cindy should cast a vote as she felt appropriate for our region. PFHA is seeking a National PFHA Recreation Committee member from our region and Dixie volunteered to fill that position. Cindy also reminded everyone that the postcards for national prize list must be returned if a member wanted to see said list. The list of National show judges was present and membership asked Cindy to place our regional vote according to her best judgment.

GPFHA Futurity – 7 horses registered for the futurity, with a last notice for final payment mailed the first week of this month. The futurity judges are Moffit, Laracuenta, and Zapata. Neck ribbons are supposed to be sponsored by Show Time; however, there is some question about their commitment.

Show - Per Gwyn, arrangements are moving along, USEF approval is pending but expected, all officials are committed and in place, Bonnie is working on volunteers, plans for the hospitality booth with sales of t-shirts and license plates are being arranged, and Boyd is to bring updated map of Georgia members, if he has time to update it. Directories will be ready for show. Need to have a sign-up sheet for trail rides available near the office. Greg volunteered to make poles for pole bending or to bring 55-gallon barrels for fun games. Need to post a large info sheet with contact data near the office. Chris and Suzy are working on class sponsorships.

Old Business – For 2009 show directories, Greg volunteered for the committee to sell ads for the directory, perhaps to work with Bonnie on this task. May be ideal to separate areas for sales region and will need three people minimum to sell as many ads as possible. Consider an August 1, 2008 timeline to start. Greg will coordinate with Bonnie.

License plates with the new logo are completed and ready for sale at \$19.00 each. The new logo banners are done and look very good. There is also a new banner for use at Nationals, which was first displayed at the Open House.

New Business – A non-member wants to pay for advertising in newsletter and website. Newsletter should only be for members. Non-members must pay double the rate. A \$15.00 affiliate membership would allow non-members to receive membership rates. Corporate Registration - Dixie voted in as registered agent for corporate entity by unanimous decision. Tag sticker for GPFHA trailer needs to be mailed to Ray Franklin. Tag registration needs to be moved from Denton's county, perhaps to Hall County. We will need to make decision before April 2009. There has been a problem with the trailer being kept in only one location. It is important that all members understand that the trailer is not to be moved without permission from the board. It was also noted that the trailer needs to be cleaned and detailed and Gwyn will ask Ray if he knows of anyone who can do so for a reasonable fee. Also, the trailer needs to have new logo put on it after knowing what the cost of cleaning will cost first.

Motion to adjourn by Joyce, seconded by Boyd at 2:15pm.

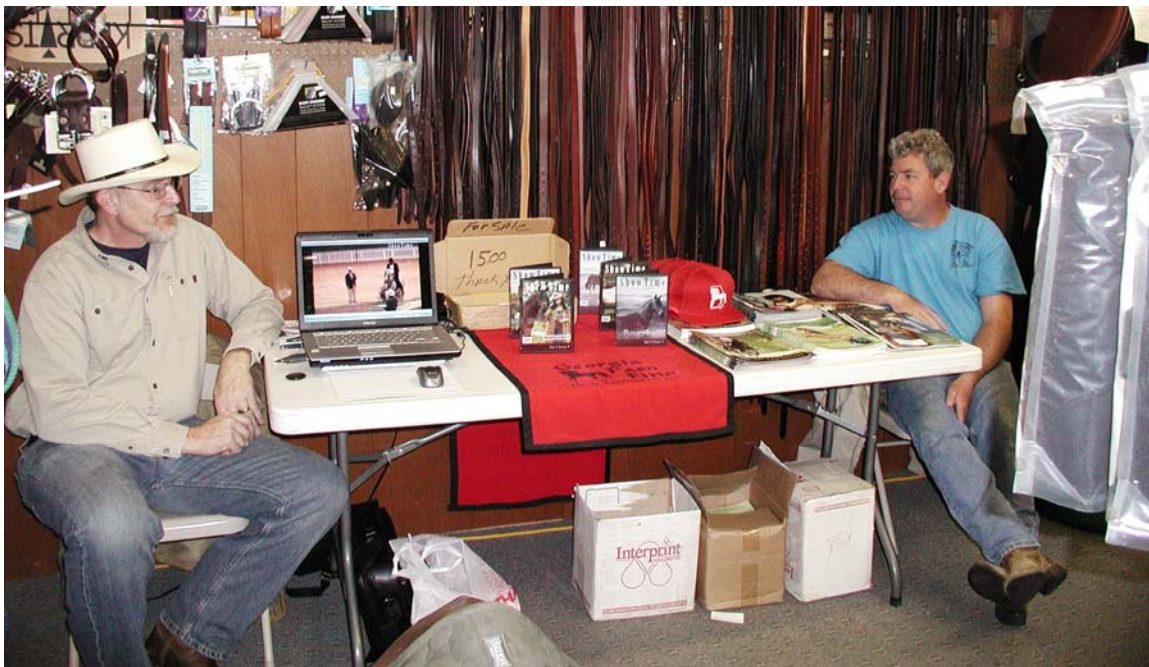

The following are the criteria on which you should base your nomination for A/O of the Year:

ACCOMPLISHMENTS: The candidate must have achieved excellence in the show ring at the regional and or national level. This includes honors, awards and commendations the candidate has received.

CONTRIBUTIONS: The candidate must have demonstrated substantial and sustained contributions to the breed at the local, regional and national level. This category includes contributions (not monetary) the candidate has made to youth, other amateur owners, and promotion of the breed. Contributions could be in a volunteer or elected capacity.

SPORTSMANSHIP: The candidate must exhibit conduct becoming to a sports enthusiast including but not limited to honest rivalry and graceful acceptance of results.

HORSEMANSHIP: The candidate must exhibit excellence in skill of riding, exhibiting, management, and specifically in the care and well being of her/his horse(s).

Procedure after submission:

All nomination biographies will be sent to the nominees, not for any additional information to be added, but for the nominee to check for accuracy of the information submitted. Final nominees and a voting ballot will appear on the PFHA website, in PFHA e-news, and sent to all regional Presidents to include in each region's newsletter or on their respective websites along with voting deadline information and instructions. Also, you may request a ballot by sending a self-addressed stamped envelope to Kathy Yarbrough at the address below.

A to Z of Paso Finos Clinic with Diego Bravo

We were not sure what to expect when we woke up and it was snowing in South Alabama. The weather improved and a great time was had by the participants of a two day clinic with Diego Bravo on the "A to Z of the Paso Fino horse" the weekend of March 8th and 9th. The clinic was held at the picturesque Heart of Dixie Trail Ride in Troy, AL. Both days were packed full with 2 to 3 hours of class work and lecture, and several hours of riding for the eight participants. First we determined the level of our leadership skills with our horses by facing different obstacles in the arena. We had to cross a bright carpet, step over poles, ride a pattern around cones, and ride up to balloons that were whipping in the wind. Then we focused on improving our leadership skills, and recognizing the perfect four beat gait. We learned how to offer consistent and meaningful correction with our horses. We worked on equitation and finding our seat. Then it was turns, who knew it could be so difficult to turn consistently at the same speed! However, David had his horse Alternativa turning in circles at a corto with no hands on the reins by the end of the first day. The class room lectures covered topics from defining the Paso Fino horse breed, Paso Fino tack and the bit (with tack in hand to demonstrate), to the proper care of the Paso Fino horse. We had sessions on correcting vices and learned some neat "tricks of the trade" about teaching your horse to stand still while you are mounting and dismounting among other things. Diego provided a lot of one on one instruction, plus we built our confidence riding with a group of horses similar to being in a class at a show. The second day we even performed drill team maneuvers which was really fun and challenging. We all came away from the clinic with more knowledge about the Paso Fino horse, and our relationship with our own horses. We have plenty to practice and improve upon. The clinic was a very positive experience, and one of the highlights in our four years of owning Paso Finos. It was a diverse and fun group of riders and horses, but I would have to say we were all showed up by an eleven year old girl who was riding a Paso Fino horse for the very first time and the horse was a green broke 3 year old.

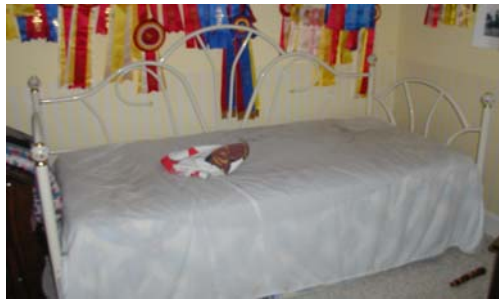

Horse Types

These "horse types" are off Fugly Horse of the Day (www.fuglyhorse.com) - they are cute and pretty "right on the money". See if you can label those in your pasture.....

Now, I do think horses have personalities, so I'll tell you what I think the three types are, and you can tell me what you think of MY analysis. And no, I don't think it has anything to do with energy level - I think energy level has more to do with specific bloodlines. I met an APHA stallion today, a real sweetheart, and the owner told me he didn't do a darn thing when she first sat on him. I asked his breeding and it was Sonny Dee Bar. Not surprising. Those SDB horses wouldn't blow up if a bomb exploded in the next-door neighbor's barn. Good luck getting them to ever gallop, but they are not typically going to kill you.

1. Pushy. This is the foal that tries to mow you over to get to food, and has to be constantly reminded that you are not a chew toy. As an adult, he'll instantly sense weakness in a prospective rider and do something like gallop them straight to where the hay is stacked in the back of the arena and dig in. He pushes other horses around, too. He eats first, and the other horses had better not forget it. These are the horses that are easily become dangerous if introduced to bad handling. The good thing is it doesn't take much to discipline him (voice is usually enough with this kind of horse), and he truly wants to please you. He may also be a wimp physically - if you want to see a (love this term!) drama llama, watch this kind of horse with a hoof abscess. You will be convinced he's dying. *He* thinks he's dying.
