

Georgia Mare Wins BIG at Nationals

Compared to 2007, it was the same song, different verse. Cindy Griffeth rode "Lolita de Napoleon", a Pleasure Mare owned by Ray and Jo Franklin (owners of Silverwood Stables located in Bethlehem, GA), to a 4th National Championship ribbon out of a class of 43 mares. As if this wasn't enough, Cindy and "Lolita" returned to the Pleasure Mares and Fillies Championship to bring home a Reserve Grand National Championship title.

Cindy Griffeth is the owner of Mandalay

Bay, a training facility for Paso Fino horses, located in Dawsonville, GA She has been training Pasos for the past 25 vears, acquiring many regional and national titles.

"Lolita" has a legacy of wins, starting in 2002 as a 3-yr old. She began her career as the

Reserve 3 yr old Filly in the Amateur Owner division with Ray Franklin as the owner. In 2004, she was a Reserve National

Pleasure Mare, ridden by Jaime Suarez. In the same vear, she placed 3rd in the Junior Pleasure class. As if that wasn't enough, she came back in 2005 to

win 1st place in the Sub Junior Pleasure class. She wasn't finished as her show career continued into 2007 where Ray Franklin rode her to a 3rd place victory in the Amateur Owner Pleasure Mares class.

For the Grant Griffeth and Lolita at 2008 show year, she has been successfully shown by Grant Griffeth, the son of Cindy and Dane Griffeth, on the Junior Level of competition. He plans to continue showing her in the 2009 season so it is safe to say that "she ain't done yet."

Ray and Jo have owned Lolita since she

$Balance \ {\it submitted} \ {\it by} \ {\it Arleen} \ {\it Klungle}$

I wanted to start out with a few things for people to think about. Do you feel unbalanced in your saddle or feel unconfident of your riding skills? Maybe your saddle does not fit your horse, saddle pad slides, incorrect length of stirrups, cinch not secure, horse will not stand still and makes rider nervous or shows fear, and the rider

Riding your horse mis-ques. Riding your horse without using your legs is like swimming without kicking your feet. You will struggle hard and not get very far. Your LEGS are the underpinning of your horse's performance even when you are not giving him cues. The horse bears the majority of your weight, so their position, (whether it is good or bad)

impacts both your balance and posture in the saddle. Look straight ahead; DON'T LOOK DOWN, IF YOU LOOK DOWN, YOU WILL FALL DOWN. When you look down, you move your balance point forward. Your feet will automatically go under your bottom and you will lose your balance The horse feels the forward movement and causes the horses body to be out of balance. A balanced seat and the placement of your legs correctly while standing still will help you ride with rhythm and motion.

When you feel yourself falling backward, it means your legs have slipped forward. You will know when you can stand up without having to reposition your legs and you can comfortably and consistently maintain your standing posture at any gait. Mirror your horse's movements.

Know where your horse's feet are at all times. Move your shoulders accordingly to the motion of Fluidity and Rhythm. You will encounter an uncomfortable ride, if you ride against the horse's rhythm. Ride your horse with the flow of his motion and it will feel like you are dancing. Communicate Clear Ques. A strong and steady neu-

tral or soft leg is very important to being an effective rider. Accuracy keeps the lines of communication open and clear to your horse. Where you place

your legs on your horses body influence how he moves. The rider's leg is the boundaries of a tunnel through which a horse travels. The location of your legs

determines the shape of the tunnel.

Activate both legs equally and you generate forward motion. Activate one leg with a casual rein and you generate a small circle, etc. When you use your legs too tight against

the horse's stomach, this confuses the horse of what you want him to do. Horses are claustrophobic animals. They need freedom to move. Always communicate with a soft leg and ask with your body language.

Ask your horse with a feel of motion. There are many horses that have amazing improvements in their strides, attitudes, posture and movement when the rider is balanced. The horse presents a low shoulder on one side and bears most of the rider's weight dispersed on the outsides of their rear heels when properly balanced. The rider will have impulsion problems and trouble with the horse maintaining their gait. After being balanced, the rider gets to experience a very powerful stride with impulsion coming from BEHIND for the FIRST TIME. Sometimes it takes someone else's eye to help you pin point your problem in order for you to move on to your next level of riding.

Don't stay in the same place for a long time. It is the little things that make the difference. I enjoy helping riders become better with their horses whether it is on the ground or in the saddle. I am always improving my riding skills and teaching ground safety is very important to me.

Remember to Dance with your Horse, they will love you even more!!!!!

Exercises: Posture and Building a better leg:

- Stand up in your saddle without using your stirrups.
- Stand straight up in your saddle and sit down to find your balance point or equilibrium as your horse stands still.
- Stand up for 10 strides and sit down for 10.
- Rest.
- Now with arms out (like an airplane) do 10 small arm circles.
- Bring both hands to touch your nose.
- Bring each hand one at a time to touch your nose.
- Sit on both hands with one hand holding onto the cantle. Do this in both directions.
- Now try this same exercise at a walk with someone on the lead line in a round pen.
- Try it at a Jog or corto and then at a canter.
- You should be able to ride standing up in all gaits very comfortably.
- As you improve with all the gaits ADD Circles to the same exercise.

She could not figure out why the rest of us were in tears. She even said, "It's okay, Momma, I'm right here." Then she had a request. When Nikki got out of the hospital she wanted a pony, a Springer Spaniel, and Billy Ray Cirrus. Well, Billy Ray got his own television show that winter and in the spring Nikki got her Springer puppy. All that was left was to get her a pony.

In August 2001, our nephew, Dakota Scott was born. He had a myriad of health problems, but we already had access to an amazing team of doctors. He came to live with them full time at just weeks old. That changed things and access dold.

things and caused some delays in the process of acquiring said pony.

The following summer Nikki's brother, David got a job work-

ing at RaShaw Farms in South Carolina. Though he had spent most of his life around horses, he was amazed by the power and grace of the Paso Finos

he was working with and invited his family out to the farm to see them. That would be when Nikki met Rachael (Shaw Laney's sister) and was introduced to the breed. The smooth ride and gentle disposi-


Why do I like horses? I reckon I must be mad. My mother wasn't horsey

Minutes of Meeting October 11, 2008

Meeting opened at 11:30pm by Gwyn Wright. (Dinner and Awards first!)

Members Present: April Hughes, Gwyn Wright, Suzy Varner, Bonnie Herman, Brenda Hankinson, Boyd Russell, Ian Black, Melanie Black, Joyce Davis, Chris Williams, Dixie DeLozier, David DeLozier, Jo Franklin, Ray Franklin, Cindy Griffeth, Greg Willis, Kim Willis.

Minutes of Meeting: Motion to accept the minutes from prior meeting sans reading presented by Greg, seconded by Gwyn.

Nominations: Gwyn Wright re-elected as President, Dixie DeLozier reelected as Treasurer, Bonnie Herman voted in as Director.

Advertising: Presented by Joyce Davis. Joyce discussed press releases and how they should be handled, if needed. Joyce clarified her position as advertising coordinator as being responsible for submission of ads, etc. Joyce stated that she had publicized all sponsored events and continues attempting to get free advertising when possible through a variety of equine related publications. Our paid print ads were for the trail ride schedule, Open House, 4 Beat Jubilee Show, and the Charity Treasure Hunt. Discussed with other members the advantages of coordinating with other trail riding groups, and using local Chambers of Commerce as a conduit for trail rides. Brenda indicated that she would investigate a paso type clinic for her local trail riding club.

Directory: Presented by Greg Willis. Stated that he is currently contacting a variety of differing businesses for ad placement: local Chambers of Commerce, members who have already committed to several ½ page, and Seminole for center full spread. Directory is still black & white unless a whole bunch of ads are sold. Directory ad deadline is 1/9/2009. Note: Cindy asked that everyone understand that the sales from directory ads are earmarked to pay for the show awards at a minimum. Greg & Bonnie to talk about an award for most ads sold in directory to help fund the awards (\$500/\$200/\$100 & payouts for championship classes).

Events

Fundraiser: Presented by Chris Williams. Chris indicated that there are 32-35 preregistered entries for the Treasure Hunt as of to-day. More expected to register at the event. She also stated that we had 71 or so riders last year. Friends of Watson mill have donated a port-a-potty. 144 prizes of various dollar values are all donated. Raffle and auction items of greater value are also in place, plus 1st, 2nd, 3rd place prizes for trail ride winners, too. Surveys are being handed out at lunch in order to determine how riders learned about the ride.

Open House: Presented by Gwyn Wright. Discussed possible new format: Clinic on Saturday from 10am-4pm, dinner at 4pm, open house from 5pm-9pm where individuals can advertise their sale horses and provide demo rides; with Sunday to be only the fun classes. Also may add packages for farms. Gwyn needs four people in committee for open house: Cindy, Gwyn, Dixie, Suzy, Joyce, Chris.

Parades: Jennifer was not in attendance; therefore, there was no report.

Trail Rides: Presented by Boyd Russell. Only two rides left in the year. Committee meeting scheduled on 11/15/08. Boyd is stepping down as Trail Committee Chair due to busy schedule. At November meeting, members should discuss future of trail rides – maybe quarterly instead of monthly. Report to Gwyn in January 2009.

Finance: Presented by Dixie DeLozier. Handed out financial statements including P&L. Balance sheet shows \$2,426.66 through 10/10/08. 2008 Open house income was less than \$200.00 and 4 Beat show loss was around \$800.00.

Futurity: No report from Cindy.

National Delegate: Presented by Cindy Griffeth. She advised membership of the reduced cost of registrations only being offered by PFHA for a short period of time. Also, she raised an A/O Safety issue relative to the "prodding/urging" of horses at the in-gate and the complaint lodged against it. Membership is against a rule to govern this action. Cindy discussed the Youth Nationals and the mixed feelings on schedule. The National Committee needs to research the needs of parents/youth riders and to review the results of the survey! Everyone felt that later show start times would be desirable.

Membership: Present by Kim Willis. Advised that the 2008 memberships was 143. Current renewed member is 21 as of today. Note: 8 members renewed at the meeting.

Show Committee: Present by Gwyn Wright. First was a thank you to all volunteers. Gwyn needs a new show manager to fulfill organizational responsibilities. USEF paperwork and our show are two different responsibilities. David is willing to be barn manager again. Greg volunteered to be show chairman. We will need a new landscaping person for the judge's stand. Discussed a \$25 championship class with a minimum of four horses...no payback with less than four entries.

Old Business: None discussed.

New Business: Calendar for 2009/meeting places for 2009 to be provided by Gwyn in January. Next meeting to be January 17th at Suzy Varner 's residence (Kathleen, GA near Parry).

Gwyn motioned to adjourn at 3:05pm; motion seconded by Ray.
