Research, Skills and Interests:

Dissertation Research: "Magic, History and Slavery in Rural Imerina", a 20-month research project conducted in Madagascar between 1989 and 1991, funded by a Fullbright-IEE. I conducted about seven months of detailed archival research, largely in the Arsivam-Pirenena, or National Archives with court and administrative documents written in Malagasy during the 19th century. The archival work also overlapped with ethnographic fieldwork in and around the town of Arivonimamo and especially the rural community of Betafo in Western Imerina. Topics ranged from the gathering of oral histories to participat observation in mortuary ritual, spirit mediumship, research on magical practice, astrology, narrative, and collective decision-making; all of it conducted in the Malagasy language.

Current Research Project: "The Ethnography of Direct Action", a study of the Direct Action Network and related anarchist and radical democracy movements in the New York Area and elsewhere. In pursuit of this project I have participated in major actions in Washington D.C. (A16, J20, S26, A20), Philadelphia (R2K), New York (WTO, and WEF), Quebec City (FTAA), Genoa (G8), Ottawa (G8), and minor ones too numerous to mention, and worked with groups like NYC-DAN, Ya Basta!, the NYC-ACC, NYC Independent Media Center, and so on.

This project was initiated in April 2000, received funding between 2001 and 2002 from the Junior Faculty Fellowship fund, and has already born fruit in a forthcoming monograph.
