GMAS BIG SIT – 2005

The Greater Mohican
Audubon Society's Ace Birders
participated in their first Big
Sit. This was the 13th annual
Big Sit for the international
area, which was held on
Sunday, October 9, 2005. The
non-competitive birding event
was hosted by Bird Watcher's
Digest. It was founded by the
New Haven (CT) Bird Club and
sponsored by Swarovski Optik
and Eagle Optics.

Hundreds of teams from around the world participate in the Big Sit every year. The event is free, it is fun, and anyone can join. The Big Sit is like a bird-a-thon or a big day in

that the object is to tally as many bird species as can be seen or heard within a 24-hour period. But the unique thing about the Big Sit is that birding teams must count birds from within the same 17-foot diameter circle during the entire Big Sit.

The GMAS Ace Birder Team of Gary Cowell Jr., Tim Leslie, Su Snyder, Pam Jordan, Louise Fleming, & Cheryl Harner held their Big Sit at Malabar Farm, in front of the Bailey Farm Bicentennial Barn, just across Pleasant Valley Road from the Malabar Farm Inn, which is just west of St. Rt. 603. They were joined most of the day by Hugh & Judy Rose, who were visiting the area from Richfield.

From midnight to about 5:30AM, it rained and the first bird, a Killdeer, was not detected until 7AM. During the next 8 hours, 47 bird species were tallied including a Red-breasted Nuthatch and a Palm Warbler. A Sharp-shinned Hawk flew over at 2:43PM for the last new bird of the day. Lots of people stopped by to visit and many more waived as they drove by. During the daylight hours, the weather was overcast and in the 50s — all and all an enjoyable outing.

GMAS PICNIC

Sunday, August 21st turned out to be a great day for a picnic at Malabar Farm. The sky was mostly sunny and the temperature was in the low 80s. Nineteen members shared a tasty meal, followed by a bird walk led by Tim Leslie and Gary Cowell. We found 37 species of birds including Cooper's Hawk, Baltimore Oriole, Rose-breasted Grosbeak, and 4 Blue-gray Gnatcatchers. We also saw a few species of butterflies and dragonflies. Those staying around until later in the evening were treated to approximately 100 Little Brown Bats, 10 Big Brown Bats, and what Gary believes was probably a Hoary Bat. ANNUAL SUMMER BIRD COUNT RESULTS

Eight birdwatchers from the Ashland area drove the roads and walked the fields June 7th thru June 21st, and two watched their feeders. The ten observers spent a total of 77 hours in the field and watching their feeders. We use the Ashland Christmas Bird Count Circle for this count, which is

total of 77 hours in the field and watching their feeders. We use the Ashland Christmas Bird Count Circle for this count, which is 15 miles in diameter, with the center being the "S" curve on Ohio 511 south of Ashland.

Those participating included; Byron Burnett, Gary Cowell Jr., Louise Fleming, Cheryl Harner, Denny Hiner, Ruth Ann Hiner, Tim Leslie, Trent Leslie, Jim Midlam, and Su Snyder.

This was the 6th Summer Bird Count for Ashland; we use these records to watch the trends of the nesting birds in our area. We added four new species to our list of 119 species seen on this count over the six-year period. They were broad-winged hawk, marsh wren, Henslow's sparrow, and dickcissel. There were a total of 99 species reported this year, with a total of 6922 individual birds. Most species had an above average count this year, most likely because of the increased time in the field. The ones that were below average this year were double-crested cormorant, Canada goose, mallard, Cooper's hawk, wild turkey, bank swallow, and cedar waxwing. Also, we had no northern bobwhites reported this year.

2005 Nest Box Report

I currently maintain and monitor 45 boxes, of which 13 are on my property in Lucas in Richland County, 8 at the Pleasant Hill Lake Campgrounds, 23 on five different private landowners' properties, and one at Malabar Farm.

This was my best year to date for total birds fledged, Eastern Bluebirds fledged, Tree Swallows fledged, and House Wrens fledged. I also had Carolina Chickadees nest and fledge on my front porch and American Kestrels fledged in a Barn Owl box at Malabar Farm.

9TH ANNUAL GREAT BACKYARD BIRD COUNT

Greater Mohican Audubon Society (GMAS) calls on volunteers in the our area to help count the birds. During the weekend of February 17-20, people across the North American continent are urged to look at the birds in their backyards and report them over the Internet as part of the Great Backyard Bird Count, one of the world's largest volunteer efforts of its kind. This count

allows people to celebrate their birds, and whether counters are novices or experts, their participation is vital in helping North America's birds.

This is the ninth year of the popular event, developed and managed by the National Audubon Society and the Cornell Lab of Ornithology with sponsorship from Wild Birds Unlimited storeowners. People are encouraged to enjoy the birds around them by going out into the "Great Backyard" during any or all of the count days and noting down of the highest numbers of each bird species they see.

Instructions for participating can be found at <www.birdsource.org/gbbc>. There's no fee and no registration is required. Those who would like to participate but who aren't online can try their local library, and many Wild Birds Unlimited storeowners who are online will be accepting observations made by their customers.
