Introduction: Welcome to the Revolutionary Restaurant. We are pleased to have you dine with us. Our chef, Billy Barnacle, has a fabulous menu planned for you. Make sure that you order a complete meal, or Billy may have hurt feelings.

A complete meal consists of the following:

One (1) appetizer

One (1) side orders

One (1) entrée

You have your choices from the following menu, but be aware, **YOU MAY NOT MOVE ON TO A NEW COURSE UNTIL THE CHEF TELLS YOU TO.**

Appetizers (Choose one)

Fried Lettuce: You will create a map of Massachusetts showing the first 3 battles of the Revolutionary War (Lexington, Concord, and Bunker Hill). Your map should show the locations of each battle, the direction/route of travel of each group of people, cities/towns, rivers/water, mountains/landforms, as well as **all standard map features** (compass rose, key, labels, title, etc.). Your map should be large enough to take up a 8.5"x11" sheet of paper at the minimum. Your map must also be in **color**. Additionally, for **each of the three** battles you will need to write a 1-2 paragraph information card that will accompany the map which will tell the 5 W's and the H for each battle. Make sure to tell the outcomes of each battle as well. You will need to read pages 141 – 145 to find this information. The maps on pages 143 and 153 will also be helpful. Your map must be produced entirely by hand, no printing of internet maps.

Iced Chicken Livers: You will create an illustrated timeline of the first 3 battles of the Revolutionary War (Lexington, Concord, and Bunker Hill) as well as the other events directly related to these battles or that happened during the same time frame. Your timeline should show each event in **chronological order** accompanied by an **illustration**. You should also make sure that your timeline is well constricted and shows the flow of the events clearly. Your illustrations should be clearly emblematic of what really happened. Additionally, for each of the three battles you will need to write a 1-2 paragraph information card that will accompany the map which will tell the 5 W's and the H for each battle. Make sure to tell the outcomes of each battle as well. You will need to read pages 141 – 145 to find this information. Your timeline must be produced entirely by hand, no printing of internet time lines. Your timeline and illustrations must be in **color**.

Introduction: Billy would like for you to choose your side order. He has prepared two options for you. **YOU WILL ONLY CHOOSE ONE OF THE FOLLOWING.**

Si de Orders (Choose One)

Crispy Critters – You will create a burrito book with an artistic cover about the Declaration of Independence. In this book you will write 5 – 6 original poems. Each poem will need to cover a different piece of information about the Declaration of Independence. Your poems should answer the general questions: What is the Declaration of Independence? What does it say about how people should live? Why is it such an important document? Your poems may be rhyming, acrostic, etc.. You should refrain from haikus and other short poems, as these will not be long enough to adequately cover the needed information. Each poem you write should cover a different section of the required information. The sections are: Moving Toward Independence (pages 147 – 151), The Preamble, Declaration of Natural Rights, List of Grievances, and Resolution of Independence by the United States (all on pages 154 – 157). It should be obvious from reading your essay that you understand what the Declaration of Independence says and why it is important. You will need to use the text pages mentioned above to accomplish this. Also, you will need to complete the “Declaration of Independence Organizer” to get you started. Poems should be 5 – 10 lines each.

Scalded Scabs – You will write a 5 - 6 paragraph essay/analysis of the Declaration of Independence. Your essay should answer the general questions: What is the Declaration of Independence? What does it say about how people should live? Why is it such an important document? The essay you write will also need to cover each section of the required information. The sections are: Moving Toward Independence (pages 147 – 151), The Preamble, Declaration of Natural Rights, List of Grievances, and Resolution of Independence by the United States (all on pages 154 – 157). You will need to use the text pages mentioned above to accomplish this. Also, you will need to complete the “Declaration of Independence Organizer” to get you started. Essays should follow all good writing techniques; have titles, introductions, conclusions, etc. It should be obvious from reading your essay that you understand what the Declaration of Independence says and why it is important. Watch out for COPS!

Entrées

Billy is finally ready to serve you the main course. You will have a choice of two entrées. Each entrée is equally filling, so there is no need to inspect them for which is easier to digest. Simply choose the one that matches your taste the best.

Chips n' Dip – You will create an original trivia board game about the events of the American Revolution. You will need to draw a detailed and decorated, poster-sized game board, create a system for asking trivia questions, the trivia questions themselves, rules for playing the game, game pieces, etc. Your game board must be in color, it must be based on the events of the American Revolution, it must be decorated in a way that resembles icons/images from or about the Revolution, it must be playable for a group of 5 – 6 students, it must use trivia that asks for “real knowledge,” you should have 45 – 55 trivia questions, it must be neat, organized, and show obvious planning and effort. You may choose to base your game on an existing trivia game or make up your own. You will need to include all of the required information, which you will also receive as a separate sheet. **Note: your game must be board based, not game show style.**

Cereal – You will create a decorative informational display about the events of the American Revolution. You will need a poster or tri-fold display board that you will use to make your display. Your display board must be in color, it must be based on the events of the American Revolution, it must be decorated in a way that resembles icons/images from or about the Revolution. Your display will also contain an element of trivia. These could take different forms. You could do “question flaps” that ask a question on top and are flipped up to show the answer or you could create a quiz to go with your display. Your trivia or quiz must be answerable by looking at and reading your display. You will also need to create titles and subtitles for each element on your display. Be prepared to have written information as well as illustrations/images for each section of required information. You will need to include all of the required information, which you will also receive as a separate sheet.

Required Information

You will need to cover information from each of the following categories in your entrée. Remember, if you are creating a game, you will be covering this information in the form of trivia. If you are creating a display you will need to cover this information in writing as well as trivia.

1. Loyalists vs. Patriots
2. Women in the war
3. Winter at Valley Forge
4. Allies/foreign aid
5. Major Battles (Saratoga, Yorktown, Cowpens)
6. Independence at last.

You will need to know enough about each of the 6 categories above that you will be able to create well written information and trivia. For trivia, you should plan on needing a minimum of 5 questions from each section. You may want to base your questions and information on the 5 W's and H for each section.

Time Frame

Below is a calendar of the next three weeks. Each day titled, "Information assignment" means that you will be given an assignment that day that will help you gather information that you will need for your entrée. On days marked "Work Day" you will be given time in class to work on your project. **Make sure you are prepared with what you need in order to work on your entrée for these days.** The entrée *is* your "exam" and will be the single most important grade you will receive for the 9 weeks. Make sure you plan your time well and that you do a good job. If you use your time you will not end up needing to do work over the break. The day before break will be a progress check to insure you have accomplished an acceptable amount of work and will count as a grade.

You should get a poster board or tri-fold display as soon as possible. If you are having problems getting one, talk with me.

Points

This project will be worth a fair amount of points, but these points will come over a long period of time. The breakdown is as follows.

Appetizer = 40 points

Side Order = 60 points

Entrée progress check = 20 points

Entrée = 100 points

Total = 220 points

In addition to the points above you will also receive “productivity points” based on how well you choose to use your time in class. For each day we have a work day you will receive either 10 points for working well, or 0 points for not using time properly. These points will be added into your project grade

During this project you will also be completing in class assignments and some additional homework. You will receive grades on some of these assignments, and other assignments will be designed to help you specifically on your project (trivia bank).
