
What Dee Holland actually wrote in the e-mail was:

Thursday, Oct. 15 – 9am – Set-up

We will be washing and sorting rock for the Silent Auction (this is an excellent way to learn rock identification). At 6pm we have a potluck dinner for all members and our show dealers. We are asking each member to bring a hot dish AND either a salad or dessert. Please have your food there BEFORE 6 o'clock as we will begin eating at 6pm. You will need to take your leftovers and dishes home as we do not have refrigeration available.

SALMON RIVER FIELD TRIP

On a sunny Sunday in September, Jody Favre and I decided to see if we could find Ruby Rapids based on the directions given by Rick Westerholm and the books Roadside Geology of Idaho and Idaho Minerals. We managed to force ourselves out of warm beds early. After a not-so-brief stop at Flying J for food and gas, we headed east. During the drive we discussed, what else, rocks and geology and the island arc attachments to the North American continent. As we neared Lucille we made a spur of the moment decision to stop and collect some Lucille slate. From there we headed to Riggins, oohing and aahing as we recognized some of the geologic features mentioned in our books. At Riggins we left the highway and crossed the Salmon River and headed upriver. We actually did find Ruby Rapids. We took a look at how we would access the river and came to the conclusion that we could make it down the bank but there was no way either one of us getting back up! Mountain goats we are not!!!

Soooo.....we looked along the roadside for anything of interest. Then traveled a few miles further to where we found access to a rocky beach we could drive to. We spent time looking for garnets and anything else of interest.

At this point we decided to start heading back to Lewiston. As we left Riggins, we made a stop at Guff Bridge, aka Time Zone Bridge where we picked up some green rock that we are still trying to identify. As we approached White Bird, we made the unanimous decision to stop and collect fossil specimens. Neither of us found anything exciting.

Our total collection for the day included pegmatite, schist, Lucille slate, agate, jasper, and the green rock. No garnets...or so we thought. After cleaning our specimens I decided to take a look at them with a jeweler's loupe. I found garnets! Some of the specimens contain just a few and some contained a considerable amount. So we can now say we have found garnet in situ!

I will bring some of our finds to the next meeting. Perhaps someone can identify our green rocks!
