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Introduction

Earlier this summer, my mother, Paul Hagan, and I took a drive through the southern part of the county looking for old home places. Mother remembers going rides in the car with her father, Sideny Hagan and his sisters Aunt Felicia and Aunt Marie; they would point out a log house with a dog trot just north of Gethsemini Abbey at the turn in the road. The house has since been torn down. Even so, I do not think that this was the site of the original Hagan property. Perhaps the property of Clement Hagan, Monica's son, was that of Miles Hagan on the 1882 census map of Nelson Co. We looked for the Thomas Sidney Hagan house at the foot of Rohan's Knob, and I finally found it on the 1870 Census map of Marion Co.

Because of this search for home places, I was encouraged to pull together some of the information which I have gathered on this part of the family. The pages focus mainly on the Hagan family and their related lines. (I have done a more exhaustive work on the Hagan family as well.) At present, I know less about the Barry family although there must be more information on the family since they have lived at their home place "Rathbarry" in Co. Cork, Ireland since about 1200, and the Barry family was part of the Norman conquest under William the Conqueror. Also it should be possible to tract down the Jesse and George families in Shelby Co., but that remains to be done.

Every attempt has been made to note the source of information. Where I have worked from original sources these have been given. Where I have made use of the work of others, I have tired to note that. In those cases, I am merely reporthing their work and not verifying it.

I would like to give special thanks to Paul Hagan, Pauline O'Bryan Jones, and Elsie Miles. The larger Hagan family was researched extensively by Mrs. Martha Pikell and later by Mary Jo Maguire and Thomas Spalding, CFX. Jesse Hagan and Gerald Thompson have also added to this, and many more beside. My thanks to all of them.

THOMAS HAGAN, THE IMMIGRANT

Most of the Hagan families of Maryland and Kentucky trace their family lines back to the immigrant Thomas Hagan who arrived in Maryland in 1662. The following is a "biography" by Martha Pikell who was one of the foremost authorities on the Hagan family. As far as I know, this summary exists only in typescript and was never published:

Thomas Hagan, the immigrant, was born about 1645, giving his age in a deposition of 1715 as "Seventy odd Yeares" (Patents 3:235). He arrived in the late summer of 1662 as a servant of John Meekes. He may have come by way of Barbados.

The first record concerning him was an oath he took in the October Court of Charles Co., MD to the effect that a consignment of sugar from the freight of John Meekes out of Barbados into Virginia had been delivered to a certain resident of Maryland (MD Archives, LIII, 400). When Meekes attempted to extend Hagan's time of service shortly after their arrival in Maryland, the new indenture, dated 12 Aug 1662, was invalidated as contrary to a law of the Assembly, "wheareupon the sayd Meekes in open Court declared him to bee a free man" (MD Archives LIII, 400-401). In August 1665, Thomas Hogan sought a warrant against James Lindsey for an unspecified transgression but in November the suit was dropped (MD Archives, LIII, 595, 608).

It was not until 1670 that Thomas Hagan demanded 50 acres for his time of service (Patents 12:594). On June 9 of that year 100 acres called "Newcastle" was surveyed for him and George Akeeth (Aisquith) in Newton Hundred, St. Mary's County (Rent rolls). About the same time, he married. The surname of his wife Mary is not known. [In another place, Mrs. Pikell conjectures that it might have been Aisquith on the basis of some land settlements involving Mary Hagan and the Aisquith family.] In August 1672, a tract of 150 acres called Correct Measure (Cadock Measure) was surveyed for him in the same hundred (Rent Rolls).

He soon moved back to Charles Co. where in 1678 a tract called "St. James" was surveyed for him. Originally 200 acres, it was resurveyed in 1714 for 317 acres. In 1695 "Good Intent" containing 650 acres was also surveyed for him, and in 170? a tract called "Clare" was resurveyed for 235 acres and patented to him in 1710. From Major William Boarman, he also purchased portions of "Content" and "Lanternam" - 140 acres in all (Deeds: D #2:54) and will of Major Boarman. by the time of his death, this former servant had acquired through his own industry over 1,500 acres of land. The Charles County holdings lay in Bryantown Hundred, in a northern part of the county known as "Zachia Swamp."

Thomas Hagan made his will on 20 March 1714 (1715 O.S.). to his wife, Mary, he left the tract on which he lived, "St. James, and two parcels of land purchased from Major Boarman, which was to go to his son, William, at her death. To his son, James, he left 350 acres of "Good Intent" and to his son, Ignatius, he left 200 acres of "Good Intent" and 65 acres acquired from Major Boarman an confirmed in the latter's will.

To his son, Thomas, he left all of "Clare" which adjoined "Good Intent." To his daughter, Mary Baggott, he left 100 acres of "Good Intent." To sons, Thomas and Ignatius, he also left "Correct Measure" in St. Mary's County, at the end of Nevitt's Creek.

To his daughters, Sarah Edelen, Charity Green, Ann Smith, and Elizabeth Clarkson, he bequeathed a token ten shillings each, indicating he had already provided for them. All of his personal estate he bequeathed to his wife, Mary and to his son, William, at her decease. The Will was proved in court 21 Feb 1715/6 by William Boarman, Jr., John Gates, and Joseph Gates (Chas. Co. Liber 14:213).

Thomas Hagan was still living in the fall of 1715, however, when as Thomas Hagan, planter, he submitted a deposition concerning the boundaries of "Lanternam" which adjoined the property of Richard Edelen (Patents: 3:235).

The inventory of his estate was taken by John Dent and William Boarman on 10 Mar 1715/6. It showed a personal estate worth £173-16-9 and included three slaves, 24 head of cattle, 36 hogs, and three horses. James and Thomas signed as "highest of kin" (Chas. Co. Inv. 1677-1717, f. 418). In all probability Thomas Hagan was wealthier than the Inventory indicates having already giving much of his personal property to his children. A final settlement was made 13 Jun 1717 by Mary Hagan, the Executrix. It included a disbursement of 500 lbs. of tobacco for the funeral sermon. delivered unnamed (Chas. co. Accts. 1708-1738, f. 126).

The will of the widow, Mary Hagan was drawn 8 Apr 1721 and proved on 4 Feb 1626 (1727 USA). She left everything to her son, William (Chas. Co. Wills, 19:26-27).

¹ In a Chancery Deposition in 1715, Thomas Hagan, Planter, gives his age as 70 odd years: Thomas Hagan of the afs. County [i.e. Charles], Planter aged seventy odd years being sworn and examined at the afsd Spanish oak deposeth and saith that about twenty years ago when he took up his land Good Intent Mr. Richard Edlin ???...told said Hagan that this oak is the beginning tree of Manwareing[?]" PG 253.

² The full court proceedings are found in the Charles County, Maryland Proceedings of 1662 Liber B. page 179-181, in Maryland Archives, LIII. As best I can determine, John Meekes transported Thomas Hagan (spelled Hogen, Howgin, Hogin) into the colony of Maryland on a ship named the "Catch." Meeks and Thomas Hagan then entered into another indenture on 12 Aug 1662 for two more years of service. Seemingly, Thomas Hagan then found out that a master could not renew and indenture and therefore with the help of his attorney John Waltom! brought the matter before the court. Meeks, being informed of the law of the colony, sets Thomas Hagan free in court. The year is either 1662 or 1663. I cannot tell from the zerox pages before me.

Anna Hamilton says that Mary's maiden name was Boarman, but she gives not a reference. I find this hard to believe. Martha Pikell wonders whether Mary "were a 'Aisquith' as [Thomas Hagan] and George Akeeth (sic) bought land; then in 1685 she and others sold land to George Glover. I've though perhaps he might be one of her family, and they were clearing up an estate, but I have never found anything about him." From a letter to Mrs. Florence T. Lovejoy, 28 Mar 1981.

However, Martha Pikell also gives the "approximate" order of birth as follows: James, Mary Sarah, Charity, Ann, Elizabeth, Thomas, Ignatius, William. She also says: "Mary may have been the youngest daughter."

WILL OF THOMAS HAGAN

Thomas Hagan's will is found in Liber 14 pages 213-214, dated 29 Mar 1714, and probated 2 Feb 1716. An inventory of his estate was taken on 16 Mar 1715; Charles Co. Liber XIV 213; inventory Chas. Co. Accts 1708-1738, f 126. Liber 14, ff 213-214 .

In the name of God Amen: I Thomas Hagoë of Charles Co. in the Province of Maryland, Planter, being infirm of Body but of sound and perfect memory do make this my last Will & Testament as follows:

IMPRIMIS: I bequeath my Soul to God that gave it and my Body to the Earth after my decease to be decently buried at the Charges of my Estate and discretion of my Executor hereafter mentioned.

ITEM - I will that my just Debts and funeral charges be first paid

ITEM - I constitute and ordain my loving wife MARY HAGOE whole and Sole Executrix of this my Last Will & Testament to whom aforesaid Mary, my wife, I give and bequeath the Plantation and Tract of Land I now Dwell upon called by the name of "St. James" lying in Charles Co. containing three hundred acres of Land, as also two parcells of Land, one bought of Major Wm. Boreman containing fifteen and other bought of (Major) Wm. Boreman containing Sixty Acres of Land during her natural life and after her decease to my son WILLIAM HAGOE to him and his heirs forever

ITEM - I give unto my son James three hundred and fifty Acres of Land a part of the Tract of Land called "the Good Intent" beginning (according as put in the Patent) at the first boundary: Tree standing in Zackiah Swamp and so running according to the same aforesaid pattern to make the just quantity of three hundred and fifty acres of land and his heirs forever

ITEM - I give unto my son Ignatius Hagoë two hundred Acres of Land out of the aforesaid Tract called "the Good Intent" binding upon his aforesaid bro. James' and running according to the Patent of the aforesaid Land to make up the just and full quantity of two hundred acres of Land as also I give unto The aforesaid Ignatius, my son, a Tract of Land containing sixty-five acres bought Major Wm. Boreman and made over to me by a Codicil affixed to the Last Will and Testament of the aforesaid Boreman to him and his heirs forever

ITEM - I give unto my son Thomas Hagoë two hundred and fifty acres of Land binding upon "The Good Intent" and Major Boreman's which I purchased (my ????? = 1st Plat) called by the name of "Clare" to him and his heirs forever.

ITEM - I give unto my Daughter MARY BAGGOTT one hundred acres of land being part of a Tract of Land called "the Good Intent" aforesaid which part adjoining convenient to the Place where she was seated before to her and her heirs forever

ITEM - I give to my two sons THOMAS AND IGNATIUS HAGOE a Tract of Land lying St. Mary's Co. upon the head of Nuett's Creeek called by the name of "Carrick's Measure" containing one hundred fifty acres of Land to them and their heirs forever

ITEM - I give unto my four Daughters, SARAH EDELEN, CHARITY GREEN, ANN SMITH, ELIZABETH CLARKSON to each of them ten shillings

ITEM - I give and bequeath unto my beloved wife MARY HAGOE all my personal Estate I

am and shall be in possession of at my Death during her natural life and after her decease to be my son WILLIAM HAGOE's

ITEM - I do by these presents Revoke and make void all former Wills & Testament and I do ordain--this my present Will to be my Last Will & Testament in Witness hereof I have set my hand and seal this 20 day of Mar. in the Year of Our Lord, 1714

Also listed by Magruder in *Magruder's Maryland Colonial Abstracts 1772-1777*: Seventh day of December in the year of one-thousand seventyfive. I will to my wife MONICA HAGAN all my personal estate of any kind, during her widowhood and then at that time I give and becho to her 1/3 part of said estate and the rest to go to my eight children Mary, Edward, Susannah, Sarah, Aliege, James Jr., Tabatha, and Clement. I appoint my wife Monica Hagan my sole Executrix.

Testors to the will were Joseph Beall, Charles Beall and Elisha Beall.

Chas. Co. Deed O#3:639-41: On 1 Dec 1769, James Hagan of Pr. Geo. Co., planter, and his wife "Monakey" for 60 pounds currency "as well as for other Valuable Considerations ... hath given Granted bargained Aliened Sold assigned transferred enfeofed conveyed made over and confirmed" to Henry Hagan of Chas. Co. all that part of a tract called Clares to be laid out by the said James Hagan adjoining his brother Ignatius Hagan's 60 acres willed to him by his father, where the said James Hagan formerly lived, with dwelling houses, barns, gardens, and orchards. Witnessed by J. Reburn and John Reburn Jr.

⁸ The tax list of 1817 shows her with 66 acres on Pottinger Creek and the only member of the house hold. According to A. Hamilton she married Phillip Cooper 22 Oct 1815 and gave her age as 51, but I have not seen this record, but it is surely wrong given the tax listing above. There is also a bond dated 16 Sep 1816 for a Monica Hagan and Theodore Hagan; but she is the widow of Benjamin Hagan.

⁹ Nelson County Clerk's Office, Will Book G, p 36. Edward Hagan asks "to be decently interred at Holy Cross Church" and names "my loving wife Mary Hagan" and "my four children Henry, James, Polly, and Nancy." Dated 14 Nov 1830; probated 9 May 1831. Witnesses William Hayden and Mary Hayden. Executors: wife Mary and son Henry.

The tax list of 1817 shows Edward Hagan with 360 acres on Pottinger Creek with 1 male over 21, 3 under 21, 4 black males, and 5 others.

Edward of James and Monica makes the surety for the bond of his orphaned niece Statia Elder, daughter of Thomas Elder, dec'd to marry John R. Medcalf, bond 28 Jan 1822, Nelson Co. Ky.

¹⁰ Thomas Elder and wife Susannah (Hagan) Elder signed over to Edward and James Hagan all their "right title claim and interest in and unto our proportionate part of the Estate of James Hagan, Sr., deceased, which our mother Monica Hagan has now in her possession and our said proportion of said Estate" (Book 6, p 657, 1807, Nelson Co.).

Thomas Elder is the son of William and Sabina (Wickham) Elder. His mother was the daughter of Nathaniel Wickham. His father was the eldest son born in 1729 to William and Ann (Wheeler) Elder. She (b

E C. Hagan was born January 8, 1834 and is a son of Sidney and Nancy (Cecil) Hagan. Sidney was born in 1800, one mile east of new Hope, was reared a farmer and had 700 acres of land; he was also a large holder of slaves property; was a clerk in his young days, also carried on distilling for forty years. He was live in Marion county since 1823, and served several times as magistrate. He was son of Clem Hagan and Millie (Miles) Hagan, who were natives of Maryland and Virginia respectively, and were among the first settlers on Pottinger's Creek. Clem Hagan was a farmer and distiller, and when but a small boy he lost his parents, who were of Irish descent. Mrs Nancy Hagan was a daughter of James and Susan Hamett, who were natives of Cecil County Md. and raised a family of eight children.³⁴ Ed C. Hagan was born in the west part of Marion County, was raised on a farm and received a fair English education; he spent one year in St. Mary's College, taught in the common schools a few terms, and commenced the battle of life for himself at the age of eighteen years. September 2, 1861, he enlisted in Company B, Ninth Kentucky Confederate Infantry, participated in the battles of Shiloh and Stone River, and in fact was in all engagements in which the regiment took part except Baton Rouge. At the battle of Jonesboro, Ga., he lost his right arm, was captured and sent to the hospital where he remained for eight months; he was at Camp Chase for four months when he was released at the close of the war in June 1865. He then turned to his home and engaged in stock trading two years, then engaged in general farming for seven years. In 1876 he commenced selling goods, which he continued four years, after which he returned to farming. In November 1884, he returned to the dry goods business at New Hope where he is now engaged; he was also engaged for four years in distilling. October 7 1879, he married Anna Parolee Barry, daughter of Dr. J.J. Barry and Frances Felicia Barry of New Haven, Ky. Dr. Barry was born in County Cork, Ireland, came to Kentucky at the age of sixteen, graduated in medicine in Louisville, was the author of several religious and scientific works; understood seven different languages, lived and died a member of the Roman Catholic Church. Mrs. Barry was the daughter of the Rev. Samuel Jesse of Shelby County, and is a convert to the Catholic Church; her parents were born in Virginia. To Mr. Hagan's marriage four children were born: Joseph S. (deceased), Frank Miles, Augustine Bradford (deceased), and John Sidney. Mr. and Mrs. Hagan are members of the Roman Catholic Church. Mr. Hagan cast his first presidential vote for James Buchanan.

Death notice in the Rolling Fork Echo for Edward Clement Hagan: Headline: WAS READY FOR THE CALL: Edward C. Hagan, Age 82, Dies Here After Long and Useful Life.

As calmly as a babe going to sleep Edward C. Hagan, age 82 years a retired merchant passed away in his home in this place yesterday afternoon (August 9, 1916) fully fortified by the sacraments of the Catholic Church of which he was a devoted member. Mr. Hagan was born and reared in Marion County and was the descendant of the Maryland settlers who first located there. He was educated at St. Mary College and when the war of states come on cast his lot with the South and joined Company B of the ninth Kentucky Regiment of the Famous Orphan Brigade.

The first battle he engaged in was Shilo, after that starting at Stone River, he followed the

campaign on South of Chicamauga where he was wounded in his right arm, later he was shot again at Jonesboro Ga. in the same arm. After he had fainted on the battlefield his comrade the P. Books Reed found him and carried him out on his shoulders to a place of safety where he was captured. After the amputation of his arm, he was sent from Chattanooga to Camp Chace where he remained until the close of the war.

Of Captain J. Cripps Wickliffe Company B but three remained they are Messrs George R. Mattingly of Bardstown, Chas. Cecil of St. Mary, and John O'Bryan of the Confederate Home. Mr. Mattingly speaking of him stated: He was a good soldier and always on the firing line.

When he returned from the war the loss of his arm only strengthen his determination to be a man and he was successful; he made his left arm do what his right would have done for him. Most of his life was spent here and at New Hope where he was universally loved and respected.

In 1879 he married Annie Parolee Barry a daughter of the late Dr. J. J. Barry and his wife Francis Felicia Jane Jesse Barry of the palce; seven sons and daughters were born to them Joseph and Bradford died in infancy, those surviving are Frank M., J. Sydney and Beorge B. Hagan and Miss Felicia and Marie C Hagan and his wife all of this palce and one sister Mrs. Cyrene Lancaster of Owensboro.

His funeral services will follow a High Requiem Mass which will be celebrated to-morrow morning at 8 o'clock.

Death Notice for Anna Parolee Barry: Headline: MRS. ANNIE HAGAN PASSES SUNDAY AT NEW HAVEN, Sister of Editor Barry, Greatly Beloved in Community, Funeral Wednesday.

Mrs. Annie Hagan, age 81 years, died at her home in New Haven on Sunday, January 5, of general debility. Mrs. Hagan was a most lovable woman and was greatly beloved in the New Haven community.

Her survivors are three sons, Messrs. Frank M. Hagan, J. Sidney Hagan and George Barry Hagan, all New Haven; two daughters, Misses Felicia Hagan and Marie C. Hagan, both of New Haven; and two brothers, Mr. Joe G. Barry, agent of L & N Railroad at New Haven and Mr. John J. Barry, editor and publisher of the Rolling Fork Echo, New Haven.

The funeral servied were held at St. Catherine's Church in New Haven Wednesday morning at Eight o'clock with High Requiem Mass conducted by Rev. James Willett. Burial was in St. Catherine's cemetery. The pallbearers were Paul Corbett, New Hope, Bernard Bowling, Errol Johnson, George, Gerald and Paul Barry.

Further Notes: Edward and Anna Hagan lived in New Hope when they first married. Ed was in the distilling business with his brother George: Belle of Kentucky Distillery which can be found on the 1882 census map of Nelson Co. The house where they lived still stands (1993) on the street just to the left of St. Vincent de Paul Church across the street from what was the sisters' house. If you stand at the gate of the churchyard facing the church, I think you would be able to see the house as you looked at the left corner of the church. One of the windows in the church bears the name of of benefactors: Edward and Anna Hagan.

Mated in May: Miss May Louise Boone and J. Sidney Hagan at Catholic Church

St. Catherine's Church Saturday morning, May 15, 1909, was filled with the friends and relatives to witness the ceremony that would unite for life Miss May Louisa Boone and Mr. John

Sidey Hagan. Just as the last sound of the Angelus died away the organ pealed forth the air of "Oh Mary we Crown Thee with Roses To-day," with perfect stey [sic!] entered Dr. Ray Boone and Miss Mary Jane Bowling. She was attired in white paris muslin over blue silk.

They wer followed by Mr. Lawrence Dawson and Miss Lizzie Ball who wore white paris muslin over helitrope silk.

Then Dr. Sam Rodman and Miss Fannie Thompson dressed in White Paris muslin over Emeral green silk. Next was Mr. John Thompson and Miss Anna May Thomas, of Hodgenville, she attired in white net over yellow silk. After them Mr. Elmer Riney of Hodgenville and Miss Felicia Hagan, sister of the groom, she wore hite net over pink. Then Mr. Bernard M. Bowling, best man and Miss Nellie Boone sister of the bride as made of honor, she was dressed in white net over turquoise follwed by the Flower girls Agnes Boone a little sister of the bride and her cousin little Miss Nellie Howard of Hodgenville. The bride wore a handsome gown of white lace, trimmed with pearls and point lace over liberty satin, en train with veil and wreath of orange blossoms and carried a shower bouquet of brids roses. The gentleman wore regulation black.

At the Communion rail the bridal party divided to the right and left and remained standing while the Very Rev. Wm. P. Hogarty performed the ceremony which was impressively beautiful. When it was finished the bridal couple walked to the predeus in the sanctuary and the attendants retired to the first pews. Miss Georgia Ferriell rendered various selections on the organ.

Then followed Nuptial mass with Very Rev. Wm. P. Hogarty as celebrant, during which the bride and groom received Holy communion. After the nuptial blessing Father Hogarty gave them a short congratulatory talk as he had both preceding and following the marriage ceremony. His remarks each time were pointed and pleasing.

After service the bridal party repaired to the residence of the bride's parents where a sumptious breakfast was served after which they left on the Greensburg train for Louisville, Cincinnati, Indianapolis and Chicago where they will spend about ten days before they return home.

The bride is the eldest daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Alexander Boone and is one of our loveliest young ladies. She has always been a favorite and has numerous friends.

The groom is the second son of Mr. and Mrs. Edward C. Hagan and is a young man of sterling worth. He is the Assistant Agent of the L. & N. at this place a position he has held for several years with credit to himself and the company.

After they return they will go to house-keeping.

They received quite a large number of presents from their numerous friends and admirers. The Echo offers its contratulations with the hope that their lives will be as lovely as a summer sunset.

THE BOARMAN FAMILY³⁵

From Timothy J. O'Rourke, *Maryland Catholics on the Frontier*, 748: "William Boarman was born in England in 1627 and came to Maryland in 1645 at the time of the Civil War in England. From Lord Baltimore he received land patents exceeding 17,000 acres. Among these was Boarman's Manor of 3333 A. A grant called Brother's Gift of 3000 acres might indicate a relationship with the Calvert family. When Charles Calvert, third Lord Baltimore, visited his province in 1661, he was a guest at the manor house of William Boarman. Thrice united in marriage, William Boarman successively wed Sarah -----, Mary Matthews and Mary Jarboe. William Boarman served as a gentleman justice of St. Mary's Co., MD, 1663-1666, 1670, 1675-77, and as presiding justice in 1678. He was a delegate to the General Assembly of the Province of MD for St. Mary's county from 1671 to 1675. He later served as high sheriff of Charles Co. MD 1678-1681. In 1686 he defended the colony against Indians. He is usually referred to as Major William Boarman, because of his militia office. He died 16 May 1709 in Charles Co. MD."

According the *Maryland Semmes and Kindred Families*, p 187, it was recorded in 1655 that "William Boreman confesseth in court that he's a Roman Catholick and that he was borne and bred so."

It cannot be determined whether the John Johnson who died in Prince George's Co. in 1710 came from England or was born in Maryland. There were at least 21 John Johnsons who entered the colony between 1658 and 1680, all but two of them transported at the expense of others (Skordas, *Early Settlers*).

John Johnson married Mary Dove, probably the sole heir of Robert and Mary Dove of Prince George's Co. Robert Dove was in Maryland at least as early as 1682, when he witnessed a will in Calvert Co., or that part of Calvert Co. that became a part of Prince George's Co. (Baldwin, II, 24) He died intestate shortly before 9 Apr 1704, when Mary Dove was granted bond for the administration of his estate (Bonds, box1, folder 58). The inventory of the personal property of Robert Dove, appraised at £ 158-5-6, indicates a fairly successful farmer (Inv., box 1, folder 29). Mary Dove, his wife, rendered the final account of his estate on 8 Oct. 1709 (Adm. Accts., JB#1:48).

John Johnson was probably married to Mary Dove only a few years when he died intestate in 1710, as indicated by the undated inventory of his personal estate but returned sometime in the late spring of 1710. Among his personal possessions, valued at £211-14-5, was an indentured servant, Rose Corman, who still had two years and one month to serve, and four negroes, Samson, Bess, Nan, and a boy Titt (spelling unclear). Though he had considerable livestock, the ownership of a parcel of carpenter's and cooper's tools suggest that he was a builder (Inv. 31:136). Not long after his death, his widow married William Cook of Prince George's Co., who rendered a final account of the estate of John Johnson on 21 Aug 1711 (Accts., 33:39).

By her first husband Mary Dove Johnson Cook had two children: John and Mary Johnson. By her second husband she had four children: Elizabeth, Robert Dove, Ann, and Alice Cook. William Cook, father of the latter, died shortly before 11 Aug 1729, when Mary was granted bond for the administration of his estate. John Johnson her son, stood as one of her sureties (Bonds, box 7, folder 27). John and Mary M. Johnson signed the inventory of his estate as greatest creditors, indicating that William Cook at the time of his death was still in legal possession of that property due the heirs of John Johnson Sr. (Inv. 15:266). On 21 Aug 1730 Mary Cook deed to her son John Johnson a 200-acre tract called "Penny's Choice," originally patented to Henry Thickpenny but assigned to her father Robert Dove, retaining one-half of the same until her death (Deeds, Q:95).

The widow Cook took as her third husband Bryan Reily (or Reyley). There was apparently no issue by this marriage. Bryan Reily died sometime before 21 June 1734, when his will was proved. He left bequests to Robert, Ann, and Alice Cook, the Rev. Lawrence Debutts, and William Rawlings. John Johnson witnessed the will (Baldwin, VII, 92). The widow, who received the residue of his estate lived many years after. Though Mary Dove Johnson Cook Reily made her will 22 Nov. 1748, it was not prove until 27 Aug. 1763. She left nine head of cattle to her son John Johnson to satisfy a note for £9, the balance of his father's estate. She also made bequests to her son Robert Dove Cook, her daughters Elizabeth Piles (m. Leonard Piles), Ann Hugoe (m. Israel Hugoe), and Alice Estep (m. Philemon Estep), and her grandchildren William Johnson Rawlings and Mary Rawlings, indicating that her daughter Mary John had married a Rawlings but had predeceased her (Wills 31:1030). She left an estate valued at £243-3-11, of which £221-17-11 remained after debts for distribution to her heirs (Accts. 52:266).

John Johnson, son of John and Mary (Dove) Johnson, was born in Prince George's Co. about 1705-1710. He married Susanna Semmes, the daughter of James and Mary (Goodrick) Semmes of Charles Co. Mary Goodrick Semmes Speak in her will dated 25 Sep 1746 names her daughter Susanna Johnson and her granddaughter Monica Johnson (see Semmes). The Johnsons were probably not Catholics before the Semmes alliance. On 24 Apr 1740 John Johnson exchanged by deed with his half brother Robert Dove Cook the 200 acre "Penny's Choice," deeded to him by his mother, one-half at her decease, for a 100-acre tract on the west side of the Patuxent River called "Wood's Joy," where John Johnson was actually then living. His wife Susanna waived dower right to the former (Deeds Y:165,166).

John Johnson, planter, died in Prince George's Co., shortly before 15 May 1766, when James

Johnson, his oldest son and heir-at-law, was granted bond for the administration of his estate, Robert Dove Cook standing as one of the two sureties (Bonds, Susanna had evidently predeceased her husband). The inventory of the personal estate of John Johnson, returned 28 Nov 1766 and appraised at £188-8-2, included among other items three slaves, Peter, Will, and Nan, and an old fiddle. John Johnson and James Hagan signed the inventory as kin (Inv., box 21, folder 21). Tobacco, corn, and bacon increased the value of the personal estate to £266-16-½, but after payment of debts only £50-5-1½ was left for distribution to the six heirs (unnamed) or £8-7-6½ apiece (Accts. 63:4; Balances 6:143).

Though John and Susanna (Summes) Johnson had at least six children, only five are known:

James Johnson finally disposed of "Wood's Joy" (Deeds CC#2:267) in 1776 after having settled in Charles Co. where he married Mary Ann Mudd. His will, dated 1 Oct 1798 and proved 30 Mar 1799, indicates that he had a daughter Mary and an unnamed daughter, then deceased who had married Jeremiah Neale. He made a provisional bequest of £350 to his brothers John and Joseph and his sisters Monica Hagan and Mary Ann Gwynn (Wills AK#11:480). The daughter Mary entered the Carmelite monastery at Port Tobacco, as indicated in the will of her mother Mary Ann Johnson dated 16 Oct. 1814, who also mentions her sister-in-law Mary Ann Gwynn, wife of Thomas Gwynn of Kentucky (See Mudd Family, pp. 405-406). John Johnson III also married a Susanna (surname unknown) who is named in his will dated 1 Mar 1812 and proved in Charles Co. 18 Aug 1812 together with his children Alexander, Ignatius Semmes, James, Elizabeth, and Mary Johnson (Wills HBBE#13:178). Monica, who married James Hagan, and Mary Ann, who married Thomas Gwynn, both settled in Nelson Co. KY.

Co 1962) names Nicholas Harvy, 30 years old, among those who took the oath of allegiance in order to sail to Virginia on the Bonaventure, 2 Jan 1634.

By special warrant from Lord Baltimore, Nicholas Hervey was grante 1000 acres on the conditions of his emigrating with his wife and five others; dated London 8 Sept 1641; Liber ABH, f 103. Frances Hervey, listed as the daughter of Nicholas was transported to Maryland in 1641; Liber I; f 130.

p 215 - Jane Hervey, the widow of Nicholas, married Thomas Green prior to 1653; Liber VII, f 62.

Frances Hervey, daughter of Nicholas married George Beckwith in 1658; Liber ABH 102 (Q fol 416)

According to Sr. Mary Louise Donnelly in *Thomas Hill and Rebecca Miles*, pp 1-4: Nicholas Harvey arrived with the first party on the Ark and the Dove. She says that Mary records first note him as being brought into the Province as a transportee of Father Andrew White, SJ. By 1637 he is living near St. Mary's City and served on a jury. In 1639 he was appointed Captain by Leonard Clavert to fight the Mancantequ Indians. He later attended the General Assemblies. He fled to Virginia in 1642 at the Puritain uprising, and his house was burned. His will was probated on 28 Jun 1647; William Wheatley testified that he and Henry Spink, servant of Nicholas Harvey, witnessed the will.

THE CISSELL FAMILY⁵³

Notes by Elsie Miles: The original name for Cissell was Sitsyll. The family was first recorded as fighting with the Normans against the English on the Welsh Border. It is not known whether the family was Norman or Welsh. The year was 1091. Most of the Cissells in KY now go by the name Cecil. One of John Baptist Cissell's sons petitioned the Kentucky legislature to allow the spelling Cecil for all people in Kentucky with the name Cissell. This passed and at first only a few used the new spelling but now most all use it today. My mother always spelled her name Cissell.

Susannah Williams Hammett the wife of James Cissell married James Ballard several year after her husband's death. The author Dashiel Hammett, who write *The Maltese Falcon*, was from a different branch of our Hammett family. he descended from the first McKelvie Hammett. The name McKelvie was handed own through the Cissell family. My grandfather was McKelvie Cissell. He was called Kell. I notice in the Kentucky Standard very often something about a McKelvie Blandford or a McKelvie Ballard. I always tell my husband, here is another cousin.

From the Rolling Fork Echo (c1931): LOW DOWN ON JOHN J. BARRY: Mountain Editor Draws Pen Picture of New Haven Man

The following appears in the Louisville-Times occupying the column headed "From Mills Point to the Big Sandy."

Over at New Haven by the banks of Rolling Fork, lives an old editor who is as good a source for copy as the most colorful character to be found anywhere.

We had a run-in with Uncle John a number of times. Once we rode with him over the who "Lincoln country" about New Haven where young Abe was born, passed his first years, went to school, fell in a creek and was nearly drowned.

The other night coming out of Louisville on the train, we met him again. With his cap drawn tightly across his head, he stumbled onto the train, looked about for a place to sit down and was

invited to share the seat at our side. It was a forty-mile ride to New Haven where he got off and we were delighted with the chance for an hour's gossip.

Uncle John is 73, a bachelor, and has been publishing the Rolling Fork Echo, for lo, these many years!

We delved back into the history. Uncle John is "half Irish half Kentuckian" as he explains. He elaborated on his father, who was a John, too. Dr. John Barry, his esteemed sire, was direct from Southern Cork Ireland. He came to this country when he was a young man, was a linen weaver by trade, studied medicine in Louisville, was attending physician at Notre Dame University, resigned his place there and came to New Haven, married and settled down. He picked out the community because it was largely Catholic and because it was in a Southern climate, which suited him best. John, Jr. just one of a good sized family, was later to become the editor who is now a life member of the Kentucky Press Association.

Uncle John said that his father was a fluent linguist, who could speak Gaelic, English, French and other languages. He was also quite a writer. He wrote a medical book called "Christian Embryology," His most important work was a "Life of Columbus," over 600 pages of which four editions were published. Uncle John knows of only three copies of the book which are now extant, and he has them.

It was with obvious pride that Uncle John was unraveling these facts about his father. He then began to give a background of his family and to tell us that in Southern Cork was the old Barry homestead or castle known as "Rathbarry". Built of stone in 1198 it has descended to the first son of each succeeding generation of the Barry family. Unfortunately for the Barry who was to become the doctor at New Haven, and the father of the present Uncle John, he was only a second son, and Gerald Barry, the first born inherited the estate. A son of Gerald and a cousin of Uncle John, became a member of British Parliament.

The present owner of "Rathbarry" is another John Barry, a second cousin of Uncle John, the New Haven printer-publisher "who knows directly more about the childhood of Abraham Lincoln than any other living man."

Uncle John is a practical printer and few country printing offices are better equipped than his. (Middlesboro-News)
