Joseph Wilson in 1992. It is open for the public to enjoy bird watching and exploring and is managed by Cooper Hollow.

The second stop was the Fairgrounds Wetland Mitigation Area on Rocksprings Road near Pomeroy hosted by Michael Austin from the Ohio Department of Transportation (ODOT). It was created by ODOT to mitigate for wetlands filled during the construction of the Athens to Darwin and Ravenswood Connector highway projects. As a part of the project, ODOT enhanced 8.4 acres of wetland: created 3.2 acres of new wetland; protected in perpetuity 35 acres of surrounding forested buffer: and improved overall water quality by constructing

acid mine drainage treatment systems.

The next stop on the tour was the Meigs SWCD Conservation Area on New Lima Road near Rutland where SWCD staff showed attendees around the 2.2 acre wetland. The tour ended at the Jim Vennari Park in Rutland where a picnic meal was served.

### ACOE Watershed Study Meeting

At a public meeting in Pomeroy on June 24<sup>th</sup>, the Huntington District of the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers (ACOE) presented their Southeast Ohio Watershed Assessment Study. The purpose of the study is to provide coordination assistance for five Southeastern Ohio counties and develop watershed assessments addressing water resource issues. Some of these include flooding, abandoned mine lands, water supply, ecosystem degradation, and sewage treatment. The Meigs County section of the report focuses on the Upper Ohio-Shade Watershed, which encompasses most of the county.

Citizens, organizations, and government officials were given the chance to identify and prioritize watershed concerns. These comments will be incorporated into the final report.

The goal of the final report will be to create an assessment that when implemented will result in improved water quality, reduce flood hazards, and increase opportunity for economic development. The Army Corps plans to submit the final report to the Appalachian Regional Commission this September.

## Students With Soggy Socks

On May 15<sup>th</sup> and again on May 20th the Meigs SWCD was glad to host two local schools for field trips at the Meigs SWCD Conservation Area along Little Leading Creek. Students from Mid-Valley Christian School and from Meigs Intermediate School were some of the first to explore the wetland there. The wetland was completed last fall, but it is already a common sight to see black ducks, buffleheads, sandpipers, and, of course, Canada geese. Wetland plants are emerging and the aquatic insects are already abundant.

The SWCD provided the students with nets and with rubber boots, which most of the students promptly filled up with water. The students tromped through the shallow

upper end of the wetland, used nets to scoop up critters in the water, and excitedly announced their finds. Staff expected to find the hundreds of tadpoles and dozens of crayfish but were pleasantly surprised to find masses of aquatic bugs.

One insect that was pleasantly absent was mosquito larvae. After all, a healthy wetland doesn't bite! This was due in part to one species that was in abundance, the Predacious Diving Beetle. This bug and many others found feed on the larvae of mosquitoes and prevents them from being there to bite us. In its larvae form this bug is a long, slender insect with strong jaws and surprisingly swift movements. In the adult form it is a large, dark colored beetle with large pinchers.

The 2.2 acre wetland is just one of the many projects planned for the Conservation Area, which is primarily used for outdoor education. Future plans include a handicapped accessible path that will border Little Leading Creek and the wetland, as well as a trailhead facility with a pavilion.

During the May 20<sup>th</sup> field trip, students were also treated to presentations from partner agencies such as Ohio EPA, ODNR-Division of Wildlife, United Plant Savers and OSU Extension. Thanks go out to our partners who focused on topics like camouflage, stream habitats, agriculture and food, and wildflower and plant identification.
