Abraham, Suzanne, and Derek Lleqellyn-Jones. Eating Disorders. New York: Oxford UP, 1992. 141-191.

The book explains the importance and sufferings of obesity. Several individuals are in danger of diseases because of becoming obese or anorexic. Angelou, Maya. "Getting a Job." The Interactive Reader. Evanston, IL: McDougal Litell, 2000. 111-117.
