

Definitions

Abstract

A pictorial and pleasing arrangement of colours and shapes which are not recognisable as known objects although they may suggest any object or scene.

Sign of the times

A picture clearly describing an era either now or in the past

Patterns

Arrangements of subjects or shapes which is interesting or aesthetically pleasing to the eye.

Close up

Any photo taken when the cameras lens is less than 1 metre from the main subject.

Urban wildlife

Wildlife with <u>clear evidence of</u> man and or main made structure and environment.

Candid people

Photos of people 1 or more not

posed with no knowledge of photographer taking the picture.

Reflections

A picture of which the reflection of a subject provides the centre of interest. Mirror reflections are excluded, although glass is acceptable.

Tree's

Two or more tree's of any arrangement.

Human form

A study of part or a whole, of a male or female figure. The subject may be nude or lightly draped the object is to show the femininity or the

Masculinity of the subject by suitably posing or lighting.

Country road

A road that clearly shows it is in the country, the road being the main defining part of the photo.

Tips for Better Landscape Photography.

The following tips are adapted from Guy Edwardes's 100 Ways to Take Better Landscape Photographs. It is suitable for film or digital users.

1. Include a Sense of Scale.

If possible include something easily recognisable to give a sense of scale for the viewer.

- 2. Use a Tripod. The with long exposures and the need for good depth of field a tripod will be an essential piece of your equipment. Purchase the most study model you can afford. A cheap tripod will let you down at the critical time.
- **3.** Use a Polarising Filter. Most effective when used at right angles to the sun, a polariser will assist to saturate the colours and accentuate blue sky and clouds.
- **4.** Search for the best vantage point. Take time to scout an area. Sometimes a little effort can create a more dramatic image. Stand, sit , lay down. Look at the different options available.
- **5. Early and Late Light.** Many photographers fail to take advantage of the best light. Use the golden hours around dawn and at sunset.
- **6.** Use a Focal Point. Use something in your image to hold the viewers attention. It could be a building, a mountains or some recognisable feature.
- 7. Use Forward Interest. Having something of interest in the foreground can assist to lead the viewers eye into the image and create a feeling of depth.
- 8. Use the right lens. Experiment with different lens. Sometimes a long telephoto can compress the features and highlight a specific feature that could not be achieved with a wide angle lens.
- **9. Eliminate distractions.** Sometimes the most powerful images are the most simple. Look for the simplicity in a landscape and also see what detracts from the image.
- **10. Look for rubbish or litter before pressing the shutter.** Sometimes we take all the care in focusing and metering the light and do not see the rubbish within the scene. If you are photographing an are scout it first for rubbish. Remember not to leave footprints
