The picture shown above was taken in 1899 and shows what the Los Angeles harbor looked like 110 years ago. Imagine what it must have been like when Juan Rodriguez Cabrillo discovered the "Bay of Smokes" in 1542. The south-facing San Pedro Bay was originally a shallow mudflat. So it must have been a sticky situation to get on shore: stay far out at anchor and row to shore; or beach yourself and walk through the yucky mud.

Today, the Port of Los Angeles is a huge complex along 43 miles of waterfront. How did the transformation happen? Aren't you curious? Sometimes residents of an area get pretty complacent about their surroundings. I know I have traveled across the world to see a red fort, but I lived in the area for years before I took a harbor cruise.

2009 Programs

April 2009:

This month, our guest will be Sally London from Rainbow Gallery. Sally will be talking to us about the newest threads that are available. Orders for the kits have been placed. If you missed the order date, you can speak to Sally at the meeting for possible available kits. Even without the kit, this should be a fun and informative lecture where you may be introduced to some new fibers to add to your stitching stash.

<u>May 2009:</u>

The MAY program will be our next installment of the NAS Yearlong Project. Rachel Watkins will lead us in the GOLDWORK SHELLS, done using silk and metal techniques. The kit for this band includes

- Felt
- #10 Japanese gold

You will need to bring the following:

- Sharp needle (very important)
- Regular sewing supplies
- Regular sewing thread, wax, paper scissors
- Laying tool or thumb trolley or a large needle to use as a laying tool

A note about threads - Rachel used variegated silk floss and DMC in shell-like colors. Check your stash for gold or silver threads or metallic cording such as Kreinik gold ribbon 002.

June 2009:

In June, we will be given a tassel lesson by Kristi Todd. There is a kit that includes all items needed to make this red, white and blue tassel. Sign-ups for the \$10 kit have started. Orders need to be in by May 1st so decide now if you want to join the fun.

July 2009:

In July we will be back working on the NAS Yearlong Project. The fourth installment will be the BEADED FISH, and Idele Gilbert will be the instructor. A complete supply list will be in the next newsletter.

"Heart of July" Brazilian Embroidery Workshop Saturday, May 30, 2009, 9am-3pm Designer/instructor Kristi Todd Long Beach Chapter, EGA Cost: \$35

Learn all the "basics" of Brazilian embroidery: French or Colonial knots, bullion, chain and satin stitches, and "cast-on roses". Also the tricks of using Brazilian threads on moiré

fabric! The workshop includes all materials to complete the project. Students should bring their usual stitching supplies, including a 5" embroidery hoop, a marking pencil and both fine and sturdy scissors.

Shoreline Stitchers' Showcase

I wrote earlier about how the judges were hired and how the schedule of Divisions, Categories and Classes was determined. I would like to address the sensitive subject of the actual judging itself. In most exhibits, some pieces receive ribbons and some pieces do not. Sometimes the piece that took a higher place ribbon is obviously superior in artistic value or workmanship and sometimes this isn't so obvious, at least not to individuals who weren't specifically involved in the judging. One must always make sure they are comparing apples to apples; for instance, the pieces may be entered in different classes. One may be stitched by a Master or Professional and another by a Non-Professional and the judges may have applied different standards of workmanship. Also, just because a particular piece received accolades at a particular event does not mean a different panel of judges at a different event will place the piece the same way when it is being evaluated against a different collection of work.

Different exhibits generally have different methodologies or criteria for judging. At the ANG National Exhibit, there are a different number of total points available to be awarded in the different Categories, i.e. Original, Adaptation, Independent Project and Class Project. Each piece is judged on its own merits, and Best of Show is usually awarded to something entered in Original or Adaptation, since these have the most available points. Special Awards each have their own criteria. Our Showcase, at least so far, doesn't judge quite the same way.

Each individual class, a combination of Division, Category and technique, is judged together, and ribbons may be awarded for First through Third Place, plus Honorable Mention. Ties are permitted, and the Judges are not obligated to award all of the ribbons. If, in their opinion, there is no piece in the class that merits a First Place ribbon, they may start awarding ribbons at Second or Third Place, or at Honorable Mention or even give no ribbons at all. The special awards at our Exhibit are Best of Class (technique) and Best of Show (everything), which are selected by consensus of the judging panel from the first place winners. Judge's Choice is completely up to each individual judge to select their personal favorite from every entry in the Showcase. While these are usually selected from amongst the first place winners, there is no rule about this; they may choose whatever they want without regard to other judge's selections or opinions. An additional Best of Show is selected during the Showcase by popular vote of people viewing the exhibit.

The Master Division is a unique aspect of our Showcase. I will write about that next month.

LOIS KERSHNER HAWAIIAN BEACH WORKSHOP Presented by Point to Point ANG Chapter

Mark your calendars now for a two day workshop with Lois Kershner on **Friday, June 26th and Saturday, June 27th**. The event will be held in the Huntington Beach, CA, area. The total cost of the event is still being determined. The costs will consist of \$60 kit cost plus teaching fee, room rental and lunch should it be decided to have it catered.

We are currently firming up the details. If you want to reserve your place send a deposit of \$100. The final cost will be announced once details are worked out, the balance will be due June 1st. This beach scene is Lois' memories of Hawaii, but many find it reminding them of local So Cal beaches. The piece includes various stitching techniques including over-laying stitches, stitch padding, and selective use of overdyed threads.

The design size is 8" x 5" on Congress cloth. The kit includes the threads, instruction booklet and color photocopy of the finished design.
