Scissors were an early development in hand tools, probably originating about 1500 BCE, using blades connected by a C-shaped spring at the handle end. In ancient Egypt, people used scissors to cut silhouettes turning this into high art. In Greek mythology, when Apropos of the Three Fates cut into the thread of a life, she did it with "shears" or scissors. Various blades and bronze or iron scissors were produced in India, Europe, parts of the Orient, as well as in the ancient Roman world. Methods of metal forging continued to improve and, as a result, scissors and other implements became more widely used.

True mass production of scissors did not occur until 1761. Robert Hinchliffe in Sheffield, England (a city known for its cutlery since the 1300's) used crucible-cast steel, a highly refined type made in clay vessels, to manufacture the blades. By the 1800's beautifully ornate hand-filed scissors became popular in Europe.

Today, machines are used to produce scissors. Red-hot steel bars are turned into blanks, which are then forced between the dies of drop hammers. These hammers form the rough shape of the blade. The final product is made by trimming the forgings from the blade and it is finally hardened through a heating process and tempered. Scissors come in many sizes and their blades are shaped and sharpened for specific functions that range from cutting threads and fabric to steel. My favorite scissors are those that I purchased from France. They are 4" lingerie scissors made prior to the occupation during WWII. The company from which I ordered them took these vintage "blanks" and hand-finished them, with each pair requiring six months of work. Using them is a real treat, and, I could not resist, I have three pair!

Chatelaine literally means "Lady of the Castle," and is derived from the functional belt worn by the Lady of the manor from which she hung her keys and other tools such as scissors. Castles and manor houses typically kept many things under lock and key. The Lady of the house would unlock the pantry and give the cook or pantry maid what she needed to make the day's meals before locking the rest of the food away. Tea and sugar, being imported at great expense, were locked in separate chests, so the Lady of the house needed a large number of keys to do her daily business.

Since the Lady of the house was never seen without a chatelaine, this useful item became highly decorated and attractive; a chatelaine made of silver or gold could be seen as a sign of the wealth and importance of the owner. Eventually the functions were dropped but a chatelaine remained as a graceful piece of jewelry meant to highlight the importance of the wearer.

If you missed last year's Seahorse scissors offered by Ways and Means, Alta Graham is taking orders now for Dolphin scissors and Flying Witch scissors. The Dolphin scissors are a must have to your collection and the Flying Witch scissors are a wonderful companion to Margaret Bendig's Broom Hilda's hat!

Always remember, don't run with scissors, especially in Scissors, Texas.
