June's program and project is a "Glamour in July" tassel taught by Kristi Todd. This is a "finish at the meeting" project. All you need to bring along is some large scissors. The rest of the supplies are part of the kit which you have already signed up for.

The tassel is kitted as a red, white and blue design. If you are like me and wish to do a blue and white version, then bring white or blue cording (about 24 inches). You can use the DMC # 796 blue as a guide for the color blue that we are using.



July 2009:

In July we will be back working on the NAS Yearlong Project. The fourth installment will be the BEADED FISH, and Idele Gilbert will be the instructor. Here is the supply list for this portion of the sampler:

Ultra Suede Small pieces to match fish colors

Sequins 3 mm fully cupped – 2 shades (available from ccartwright.com)

Seed beads size 15/0 Glossy black, one main fish color,

two additional shades to complement the main color

Felt Small pieces to match fish colors

Black eye beads 2 beads [3mm for canvas 2mm for congress cloth]

Beading needles size 12 and 13

Nymo Beading thread Size B to match fish colors Black sewing thread Wax

Scissors Working surface

Shoreline Stitchers' Showcase

The Showcase Committee is made up of several Chapter member volunteers. Each of the Committee members is a sub-committee chair for their own area. They each think through their own process and develop their own procedures for handling their tasks, and for recruiting and training their own volunteers. All of the Sub-Committee Chairs meet together periodically to update the group on progress, ask questions and basically say, "How shall we handle this?" "Did we think of this?"

The Showcase Administrator creates the entry brochure, reminder postcards, window posters, and other Showcase advertising and gets these items printed and distributed. She receives and processes all the entry forms; these are used as raw data for drop-off, creating the gallery cards that go next to the piece in the exhibit and the exhibitor text for the program. The Administrator helps check-in pieces at drop-off and coordinates getting Judges Comments back to the exhibitor at the end of the Exhibit.

A Committee member is in charge of the publicity campaign, first to get stitchers to enter the Showcase and then to get people to come see the Exhibit. This may involve calls to local shops and teachers to request they encourage students to enter, press releases to newspapers, radio and television stations, maintaining information on the Chapter website and responding to requests for information that come via the website, and even cajoling local Press to cover the Exhibit. This is an area where we learn a little more each year. Our goal is to become a local institution and at least regionally famous, and publicity is a big part of this. We have accomplished a great deal with word of mouth so far, but an organized campaign will help immensely.

The Boutique Chairperson has a <u>big</u> job; luckily it can be spread out over time. She solicits all the merchandise for Opportunity Baskets and for the Boutique. She applies for a resale permit from the State of California and handles the related reporting. She receives the various donations, organizes and prices them, and keeps track of who donated what so that we can first of all, thank the donors and secondly, acknowledge their tax-deductible donation in a legal fashion. Her spare bedroom slowly but inevitably gets filled up. A group of volunteers gather shortly before Set-up day to fill and wrap the Opportunity baskets. Eventually, the stuff is moved from the collection point to the Exhibit space, where it is attractively laid out. This is a "men-folk with trucks or vans" kind of activity, simply from the point of view of bulk and speed.

The Entries/Judging Chairperson has unique requirements. The main requirement is a reasonably centrally located, kid-less, smoke-less, pet-less BIG space in which to receive and sort all the entries into the respective classes in preparation for judging. We have been very fortunate that one member is willing to have this exercise take over her whole house for 3 to 4 weeks at a time. This individual also recruits the Remote Hostesses and coordinates getting any entries from them. As we receive pieces, we carry them upstairs and sort them into unused bedrooms by technique. Once completed with this initial sort, at the end of Drop-Off Day, we can make smaller sorts by Division (Master, Professional, or Non-professional). This organizes pieces into the groups in which they will be judged and we can start to make a plan for how to present the pieces during the three days of judging. Any necessary adjustments to the paperwork can be made at this time also, especially those that might affect the Program or Gallery Cards.

The Volunteer Coordinator recruits and organizes all the volunteers who perform jobs not associated with those listed above, and also keeps track of who does what on which sub-committee so we can be sure everyone receives the acknowledgements they richly deserve. She recruits and schedules our Showcase Docents, helps for Drop-off, Set-up and Teardown, Opportunity Ticket sales, Admission ticket sales, Boutique cashiers, and on and on. Individual sub-committee chairs most likely take care of recruiting volunteers for specific tasks within their specific areas, but the Volunteer Coordinator keeps track of everyone and makes sure there is enough help with the right skills at the right time. This particular job isn't one that can be spread out over time, in advance of the event. It requires a lot of effort concentrated in the four months or so just prior to the Showcase.
