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One story of the origins of Valentine's Day begins in the third century with an oppressive Roman Emperor and a humble Christian martyr.

The Emperor was Claudius II and the Christian was Valentinus.

Claudius had ordered all Romans to worship twelve gods, and he had made it a crime, punishable by death, to associate with Christians. But Valentinus was dedicated to the ideals of Christ, and not even the threat of death could keep him from practicing his beliefs. He was arrested and imprisoned.

During the last weeks of Valentinus's life, a remarkable thing happened. Seeing that he was a man of learning, the jailer asked whether his daughter, Julia, who had been blind since birth, might be brought to Valentinus for lessons.

Julia was a pretty young girl with a quick mind. Valentinus read stories of Rome's history to her. He taught her arithmetic and told her about God. She saw the world through his eyes, trusted in his wisdom, and found comfort in his quiet strength. They often prayed together and Julia credited this prayer with the restoration of her vision.

On the eve of his death, Valentinus wrote a last note to Julia, and he signed it, "From Your Valentine." His sentence was carried out the next day, February 14, A.D. 270, near the gate that was later named Porta Valentini in his memory. He was buried at what is now the Church of Praxedes in Rome. It is said that Julia herself planted a pink-blossomed almond tree near his grave. Today, the almond tree remains a symbol of abiding love and friendship.

There are almost as many tales of the origin of Valentine's Day are there are Valentines! One credits the origin to a pagan fertility festival, Lupercal. Another to Pope Gelasius in the year 496 who created a feast day in memory of St. Valentine. In medieval England, Geoffrey Chaucer of "The Canterbury Tales" fame supposedly got together with his fellow poets and invented the new holiday. In a poem titled "The Parliament of Fowls," Chaucer claimed that all the birds in the world choose their mates on St. Valentine's Day.

Whatever version speaks to you, use this day, especially, to express to someone that you care. Set those hugs free!

2007 Programs

February Program – Lecture by Pat Rozendal

and the Beginning of our Year-Long Study on Mexican Samplers

We will start the day with a lecture about Mexican Samplers, their history and what makes the Mexican Sampler unique to its culture. There will be time for a question and answer period also. Then, after the lecture, we will stay for a hands-on mini-workshop to get you started on your own sampler. Please bring a sack lunch, or, if you like, we can order out for sandwiches. If you want to order, make sure to bring some small bills to pay for your lunch. After our lunch break, Pat will get us started on the basting needed in preparation for the sampler project. She will also talk about the areas that are cross stitched, so you will be ready for the Aztec and reversible stitches that we will learn in August. If you are doing the sampler to the size suggested in the books, please bring a 15" x 15" piece of 32 ct cream linen for the Sampler in Book 1 or a 14" x 14" piece of 32 ct cream linen for the Sampler in Book 2. If you don't wish to use 32 ct, the stitch size for #1 is 256 x 256 and #2 is 248 x 236. You will also want to bring a contrasting basting thread, needle and regular stitching supplies. You may want to bring magnification and light if needed, or bring paper and pen to take notes so you can get started on the project in the quiet of your home sitting in your favorite stitching chair! If you have any questions, please call me and I'll try to help.

March Program – Lecture with Honored Guest

We are so lucky to have our own Amy with us this month as she doesn't teach often. She will be going over her wonderful Bouquet design. This is a great stash user as it uses small amounts of many colors of thread. Amy has said that if you get your order in by March, she will get the books to me by our April meeting where you can pick them up and have them so you can go over her instructions and bring your threads to the May meeting. At the meeting, she will help everyone to plan their own Bouquet and talk about the most effective way to use their threads and colors. This project won an award at the Tucson ANG Seminar and is very fun to do.

August – Mexican Sampler – Year-Long Project with Pat Rozendal

Pat is with us again to work on our Mexican Samplers. After the field trip to the Autry Museum on Wednesday, we will be ready on Thursday to get some more sampler stitching done. We will do reversible stitches in the morning program and you can either do these on your sampler, or if you are not doing the Year-Long but want to participate with a small project, we will have a book mark project for you to do the stitch on. Then in the afternoon, we will practice the reversible stitch and learn the Aztec stitch for our Sampler. Friday we will have a workshop day to be able to get a little more work done.

CHARMS - What's a Charm Award and how do I get one?

These awards are given to encourage participation in projects presented by Needle Artists by the Sea Chapter and the American Needlepoint Guild and to encourage excellence in stitching by learning.

You must be a member of the NAS chapter at the time the project is presented. In the case of a workshop, you must have participated. The charm awards are to be given upon completion of a project with stitching completed, but not necessarily finished (i.e., framed, made into a pillow, etc.). The awards for the pieces presented to the membership for needlework accomplished shall be:

- 1. <u>Sand dollar</u> or <u>star fish</u> for each:
 - a. NAS sponsored workshop including the November special meeting.
 - b. NAS group correspondence or individual correspondence course.
 - c. Any 1, 2, or 4-day class taken at a National ANG Seminar.
 - d. ANG on-line group correspondence course or cyber workshop.
 - e. Board approved ANG project book design
 - f. Project for a monthly program that is deemed worthy of inclusion by the Board because it involves greater time and skill.
- 2. Special award of a <u>scallop</u> or <u>ark shell</u> is given for the 10th project completed from those listed above. (This is in place of a sand dollar or starfish.)
- 3. Special award of a <u>triton shell</u> for each yearlong NAS study project.


The Board shall determine the qualification for each award. These awards shall be presented at the regular meeting and the project must be presented to the membership at this meeting. Out of town members may submit a photograph of completed piece to fulfill this requirement. If multiple pieces of the same design are stitched, only one charm will be awarded.
