Pins were at first made of thorns, bone, or wood and, as one of the earliest human artifacts, were used as clothing fasteners, hairpins, and, meat skewers. Long, single-shaft pins then made of metal were often tipped with ornamental knobs. In 14<sup>th</sup> and 15<sup>th</sup> century England the costliness and scarcity of plain pins caused Parliament to limit their sale to the first two days of January, for which women saved money all year; hence the term "pin money." With the fashion for enormous hats in the 19<sup>th</sup> century, came the development of ornate jeweled hatpins. Many of today's stitchers have decorative stitch counters that appear as to be small, ornate hatpins.

Because pins were so costly and rare, they required a special place to keep them. Pins were originally kept in cases; but a case of pins is not easy to use while working on a project as there is the ever present risk of poking one's fingers or, dropping the case and spilling its contents all over the floor. As a result the pincushion emerged and quickly became a popular must-have item. The basic pincushion emerged as a simple pillow, perhaps stuffed with wheat chaff, in England in the 1500's.

By the 1800's pincushions were commercially produced and were often elaborately decorated. Some were designed to resemble fruits and vegetables; the classic strawberry pincushion endures to this day. Novelty pincushions and those purchased as souvenirs of events and trips were often displayed instead of being actively used.

A prototype of the safety pin and probably one of the earliest applications of the spring coil, the fibulae, as it was known, was popular from early antiquity through medieval times. From the fibulae the Romans developed the hinged pin which subsequently led to the modern brooch. Bent-wire hairpins are believed to have originated in 16<sup>th</sup> century England with the modern bobby-pin introduced in the 20<sup>th</sup> century.

Other types of pins are appliqué or sequin pins, corsage pins, custom lapel pins, push pins, mourning pins, kilt pins, and rolling pins including French, Hardtack and Candy; mmm... yummy. There are also cotter pins, belaying pins, thole pins, bobbin lace, diaper and Duck Pin bowling pins. You could also have fork pins and tidy pins which are both upholstery pins, yet are two different items. And what-ever you do, don't forget your ATM-card Pin.
