Did you know...

Mercerized cotton is cotton which has been treated with sodium hydroxide to bring out certain properties first discovered by John mercer in 1851. John Mercer discovered that immersing fibers such as cotton and linen in a caustic soda bath would increase their strength and also allow them to take dye more readily. It was Horace Lowe who popularized this process by discovering that keeping the fibers under tension while they were soaked yielded a more lustrous thread. In addition to having rich color saturation and a shimmering appearance mercerized cotton is much stronger than conventional cotton thread. Because of the deeply lustrous appearance of the Mercerized finished cotton thread, it is referred to as Pearl cotton. Finished threads are also passed through a flame to remove any fuzz. This produces a silky finish to the thread and is known as gassing.

Linen threads, made of fibers from the flax plant, are expensive to manufacture. Flax is a temperamental plant to grow and the quality of the finished linen depends largely upon the quality of the plant itself. The flax fibers are found in the stalk which is picked by hand to preserve the fibers' integrity; separating the fibers is also a long and tedious process. Linen readily accepts dye and is moth-resistant and repels dirt, all good qualities for our needlework.

No one knows for sure when silk was discovered; however, according to Chinese legend, it was about 2700 BCE. Historians do know that silk was first used in China and that the Chinese closely guarded its secret for about 3000 years. Silk is a filament fiber formed from proteins secreted by silkworms. Silk larva pods are dipped into hot water to loosen protein threads, which are then wound onto wheels. The raw silk can now be spun into a variety of different types of thread. Silk also takes dye well.

There was a study done not too many years ago by the Smithsonian Institution regarding the stability of fibers, i.e., length of time until breakdown. Wool was classified as the most unstable with silk, second (organic). The most stable fibers were cotton and linen (plant). I don't remember if polyesters or micro fibers (synthetic) were included in the study. And, yes, it is fibers that are made into threads.

I have yet to meet a "stitcher" that does not have a stash of threads. Some have more stash than others. Stash is defined as to "hide away or store in a secret place" while cache is "a store of goods concealed in a hidden place." Yep. That sounds like what stitcher's have.

Our program in May will present David McCaskill with his hands-on lecture, Tips & Techniques for Everyday Threads. David's lecture will be about everyday threads and their myriad uses.
