ESWG has produced a booklet, "NAIS and Horses: The Facts Surrounding the National Animal Identification System as it Applies to the Horse Industry in the U.S." The NAIS system is still in the planning stages. The 20 page booklet explains the history of the plan, possible benefits, the current status of the program and frequently asked questions. The organizers of the Allentown Horse Parade held a meeting on Thursday, July 13th. With the weather predictions of 93 degrees and high humidity for the day of the parade, we have been forced to make the call we didn't want to make, but it was deemed that for the health, safety and welfare of the horses, the horsemen and women, the volunteers and spectators, The Allentown Horse Parade will be POSTPONED.

The predicted temperature for Saturday, combined with the humidity is threatening to give us a heat index of well over 100 degrees. The temperature on the asphalt road of the parade route could be an additional 10 to 15 degrees higher. (Hot enough to cook an egg). We feel it was the right decision.

We sincerely appreciate everyone's support for the parade and for the Horse Industry of New Jersey.

We also want to thank the almost 200 people who were willing to bring their horses from all over the state to show their pride in their horses and the horse industry, both today and as it has been over the last 300 years that the Bourough of Allentown has existed.

We are working on rescheduling the parade for Saturday, September 16, 2006. We are also hoping to have a proclamation on that date making September 16th the Day of the Horse.

Our sincere thanks go to the Allentown, Millstone, Upper Freehold, County and State Officials who have been of so much help to us.

At the moment we are working feverishly to get the word out to everyone of our decision. There will be more information in the next few weeks regarding the postponed date.

MEMO FROM THE NEW JERSEY DEPARTMENT OF AGRICULTURE

Dr. Nancy E. Halpern, DVM, State Veterinarian sent a memo regarding **PERMIT REQUIREMENTS FOR INTERSTATE HEALTH CERTIFICATES.** She stated that "Frequently, other state animal health offices notify the New Jersey Division of Animal Health of Certificates of Veterinary Inspection that were "NOT APPROVED" because entry permit numbers were not provided.

This is a reminder that you are obligated to meet the requirements of the state of destination and Federal regulations when completing health certificates." If you should need further clarification regarding a state's permit requirements or regulations, please contact the state directly. Dr. Westendorf, of Rutgers, stated that in N J there are 7,100 Horses, 1,500 Cattle, 1,300 poultry, 360 hogs, & 900 sheep.
