CHOOSING AND USING GLUES AND EPOXIES

Just as you don't use the same type of lumber or sheet goods for all types of wood working, you can't rely on one type of glue to produce the best results in all of your bonded assemblies. Chances are, like most woodworkers, you use some type of white or yellow woodworking glue 90% of the time, but there may be a much better alternative product to use when water resistance, open time, or clamping concerns are the primary consideration. It makes good sense to have an arsenal of appropriate products at your disposal, and to know when and how to best use each of them.

At our January meeting, Chris Rowland and Jeff Alarie from Woodcraft in Appleton will clarify these issues for us. Chris and Jeff are well known to area woodworkers as leaders of the friendly team at our local Woodcraft store who provide us with access to the best woodworking tools and materials available, and, just as importantly, the knowledge we need to use them safely, appropriately and effectively.

The program will cover the various types of adhesives commonly used for woodworking, and the characteristics and properties that make each one useful in particular circumstances. They will also discuss available tools and proven techniques for the application of adhesives that will help us get the kind of results we want to see in our work - both strong and pretty.

JIM, THE TOOL MAN

Hi, I'm Jim . . . and I'm a tool addict. I attend regular meeting on the 3^{rd} Friday of each month.

As most of you know, I enjoy the mechanical and design aspects of wood and metal working tools as much as the woodworking hobby itself.

Now that I told you last month about sharp drill bits and belt/disk sanders, on to my next favorite tool: the random orbit sander. These things will sand twice as fast as the ¼ sheet, ½ sheet or other non-random orbitals! And, they leave a surface perfectly swirl free even on squirrelly grain.

Because I'm so frugal, I like tools that serve multiple purposes. The right angle design Porter Cable 97355 was the kit for me (the 9 means "kit", and the 5 means 5", or a 6 means 6"). It's a 5" contour pad hook and loop, variable speed, with dust hood, hose, and case. It collects most of the dust and has a real rubber cord long enough to actually reach an outlet. Take off the random orbit assembly, toss on some nasty gritty sandpaper, and you've got a v.s. right angle grinder hog for that roughing-out work on big wood or even for sanding metal.

Now here's the kicker. Go to an auto body supply store and buy a Meguiar's Mirror Glaze foam polishing pad # W-8006 or two for 11 bucks each. Now you can finish sand, polish . . . and wax that wood project. Or, if you like, wax the car in less than 20 minutes (or even your shower stall, countertop, or boat hull) with that spare foam pad! You cannot mar or burn the paint when using the foam pad at any speed or We use it regularly on our pressure! Porsche, everyday cars, countertops, and even on woodworking projects. Meguiars sells the same machine as #G-100 just for this purpose at a much higher price and without the dust hood. It's an industrial tool meant to last a lifetime. The only drawback is it's quite noisy. This thing has saved me tons of time, I hope it does the same for you.
