AN EVENING WITH THE FOREST PRODUCTS LABORATORY

Our January meeting focused on Wisconsin's logging days. For February, we move right up into the 21st Century, but keep within Wisconsin's rich forest and wood heritage. Our speaker will be Charles R. Frihart from the national Forest Products Laboratory in Madison, Wisconsin, where he is Supervisory Research Chemist and Project Leader for Wood Adhesives Science and Technology

The Forest Products Lab is part of the Forest Service which, in turn, is part of the U. S. Department of Agriculture. Some of you, I know, are familiar with the Lab. Those of you who are not have quite a treat in store. This is *the* national laboratory for wood and forest products. It has a long and distinguished history. We'll hear something of that during Mr. Frihart's talk, but, as you might expect because of his job, we'll also learn a lot about what's new in adhesives. Lyle Martens says that one of the very best adhesives is Gorilla Glue when it splashes on your shop glasses, but I think we'll get a little more insight at the February meeting.

Like last year, members will be able to sell their products at the Show. Last year, one member grossed over \$1000 in sales, and he was selling his woodworking, not cookies or stuff made in China. You could be selling some goodies, too. Be prepared this year with some inventory of handmade wooden items.

This will be the 22nd annual spring show. The objectives for the show are to promote woodworking, attract new members, enjoy time with your fellow Guild members, display your work, and raise enough money from our annual raffle to support the Guild, the library, and our programs.

Each year, Guild members donate something they've made to the raffle and buy and sell raffle tickets. This is essential for the Guild's treasury. It enables us to keep the dues at \$15 a year. The dues barely cover the cost of mailing the 11 issues of *Bench Talk*.

We need for you to participate. Demonstrate one of your skills, like turning, carving, sharpening, scrolling, building the carcass of a cabinet, using the Kreg jig (or one of your own making), or something else. We're going to avoid using routers unless we can arrange for safety screening and please don't bring toxic finishes for demonstrations.

Display some of your projects, even it is only one. Sell raffle tickets. Donate a prize. Help with set up and take down. Talk with visitors. Help with security. Help with publicity.
