MAKING SNOWSHOES: THE NOVEMBER PROGRAM IS JUST IN TIME FOR WINTER

John Hielsberg, an Oshkosh resident, will be with us this Friday, November 18th. John makes snowshoes. More precisely, he steam bends hardwood and, from the bent wood, makes different kinds of snow shoes.

Now, you may not be planning to do a lot of trekking through neck deep snow this winter, but even if you aren't planning to make your own snowshoes, John's presentation will provide you with information about how to steam bend hardwoods, which kinds of woods react in which ways, and where to buy supplies.
