GUILD SPRING SHOW JUST AROUND THE CORNER

Don't forget we will be holding our Spring Show at the East Town Mall in Green Bay. The Show will be held on March 25 and 26, with set-up on Friday, the 24th. Mark your calendar now.

Where?

East Town Mall is at 2350 East Mason Street in Green Bay. If you are on Interstate 43, take Exit 183 (Mason Street) to the West. East Town is a mile or so west of the exit on the south side. There is a very good chance that we will be in a large store, about to become vacant, that is right at the Mall's main entrance. It is large and "lockable." We'll very likely know exactly where we will be by the time we send out the March *Bench Talk*. Free parking. Go in the main entrance.

The Raffle

You will notice that, as in past years, we've enclosed four pages of raffle tickets (that's \$20 worth) and poster sheets. Please sell or buy those raffle tickets and put the big poster where people likely to come to the Show will see it. Cut up the sheet with four little posters on it and hand them out to friends, coworkers, or strangers. Return the money and the filled-out stubs to me (Jane) at 909 Forest Hill Drive, Green Bay, 54311, or bring them to the February meeting (920-468-0132). You can always get more tickets and posters from me, so put your selling and postering shoes on.

The raffle prizes this year are dynamite. From Woodworkers Depot, we were able to purchase a 10 inch Makita sliding compound miter saw and a cordless impact driver. (Thanks, Merl, Char, and your friends at Makita). Cordless drivers are going to replace a lot of cordless drills and that Makita saw is great (we've got one), so you'll want to buy some tickets, too, as well as sell them. From Woodcraft in Appleton, we got an oscillating spindle sander by Delta and a DeWalt random orbit sander. (Thanks Chris, Mary, and your friends at DeWalt.) Lyle Martens who demonstrated the Kreg K3 at the Depot, got a donation of a Kreg K3 Master system from the folks at Kreg. (Thanks to Lyle and Kreg.) We also got a 7" Skil Saw from Tom Carlson as a donation. It's new and its nice! (Thanks, Carlson crew.) We got seriously great discounts on all the things that we purchased.

Already this year, Guild members have been generous with their donations to the raffle. The list of magnificent stuff is growing. Thanks to those of you who let me know in time to get it on tickets and posters. There were enough of you that I had to use categories instead of just specifics. We need you to

sell tickets now and we need volunteers to hawk tickets at the Spring Show. We need people. Please

fill out the enclosed volunteer form and return it.

Displayers and Demonstrators

Don't get nervous. We're talking about members who will display their work at the show and members who will demonstrate their woodworking talents. We need volunteers to demonstrate scroll sawing, carving, turning, sharpening, finishing, intarsia, and whatever. The demonstrations should not be real dangerous for onlookers,

but can be a little noisy so as to attract observers. (Dan says it is like tapping on the lake bottom with a big sinker to attract perch. And to further the fishing analogy, Lyle Martens will be Kreg jigging.)

As to Displace, everyone in the Guild is asked to, welcome to, beseeched to display their work. A central purpose for the Spring Show is to show others how much fun woodworking can be and that we want people of all skill levels to join us. Besides, we know that your work is a lot better than you think it is. We're looking for single items like **Marge Charlier's** turned potato masher to **Joe Martin's** full corner.

This is your job: fill out the enclosed form, telling me how much space you need (how many tables, how much floor space, whether you need power, etc.), what you will display and/or demonstrate, and when you plan to be there. Then get it to me. We set up Friday. Some chairs will be available – first reserved gets first choice. Bring your own chair to be comfortable.

Publicity

Publicity is always the hardest part. It is more than one person can do. Here's what we have to do: put up posters, put ads in papers across NE Wisconsin and the Valley, talk about it with friends, put it on the website, get free notices in papers and on the radio, arrange for television coverage during the week before the show, get signs up at the East Town Mall, and make sure we've got posters in critical stores: Woodworkers Depot, Woodcraft, and Bay Hardwoods for sure, but places like Krueger's in Neenah, other hardware stores, lumber yards, grocery stores, restaurants, and the like. Let me know what you will do to boost show attendance. Ask for permission before you post. Quarter sheet size posters are available to put at check out counters at shops.

Sales

We'll be able to sell stuff at this show! Use your own permit and pay your own sales tax, etc. If you have casual sales of a few hundred dollars a year, intermittently and sporadically, then you might be able to do without a business permit and related stuff. Forms and answers are available from Wisconsin Dept of Revenue (downtown Green Bay) and on the Internet.

I don't presume to tell you how to sell your stuff, but when I shop shows, I look for clearly stated prices, nice displays, friendly artisans, and an occasional bargain. People who are demonstrating usually attract lots of people and may actually attract customers. It seems to work for Joe Martin and Bob Decker. Demonstrators like carvers don't have any problem stopping work to talk with potential customers. People who are turning or scrolling may have more trouble doing that and talking with customers at the same time. They may want to have someone with them to take care of the selling part.

Over the years, we have had very little pilfering, but it makes sense to have someone watching your stuff when you need to leave your booth. If you don't plan to display at the show, volunteer to give demonstrators and Displace a break.

Attracting New Members and Having Fun

Our founder, **Bob Platten**, always reminds us that the Spring Show has to do with fellowship, spreading the good word about woodworking, and bringing people into the Guild fold. These three things usually require oral communication. We need some talkers at the Show – members who will gladly talk about how much fun they have turning trees into *objets d'art*, our magnificent library and great programs, how much the Guild has helped them become competent artisans, and what a golden group of good people we are. If you are up to that, come on down and hang out. Even if you aren't, come on down and hang out.

FEBRUARY 17TH – JEFF ALARIE ON THE ROUTER

Jeff, a fixture at Woodcraft in Appleton, will join us to talk about Decorative Design and Inlay Techniques with the Router. If you are like me, you were intrigued by Marv Buelow's router work when he showed it to us in January. As it turns out, I don't know how to use my router to follow patterns or to do inlay. The good news is that Lyle Martens was able to talk Jeff into joining us Friday, February 17 and showing us how. I'll try for the front row, even though we hope to have our new microphone and cameras by then.

Jeff will show us how to add a distinctive flair to our woodworking projects using a plunge router together with commercially available patterns and inlay kits. His demonstration will showcase some of the products and techniques used to create design and inlay accents, including the "Turnlock" Router In-Lay Kit, the "Spirocrafter" and the CMT "3D Router Carving System". The "Turnlock"

Router In-Lay Kit is an "everything in the box" system for doing inlay work such a adding "Dutchman's Patches" or butterfly keys. The "Spirocrafter" looks like the "Spirograph" you used as a kid and can be used to create patterns such as rosettes and starbursts. The CMT "3D Router Carving System" allows you to create carved patterns using your plunge router and the kit's templates. He'll bring samples created with each product and will demonstrate the operation of each kit. It's surprisingly easy to add a custom made design or inlay to your project. Come, see how it's done.

As usual, we'll meet in Mary Ann Cofrin Hall on the University of Wisconsin-Green Bay campus in room 109 at 7:00 P.M. Parking is free. Call Jane (468-0132) if you don't know how to get there. Remember, Highway 54-57 has been improved. There is an exit for Bay Settlement Road from Hwy 54-57, about a mile east of the Nicolet Drive exit. Exit 54-57 north at Bay Settlement and take the first left (it comes up fast!) down the hill to the stop sign. Continue straight from there to Mary Ann Cofrin Hall, on the left, just past the Phoenix Sports Center (which will be on your right).

FEBRUARY WOOD SHOW: CANCELLED

REVIEW: THE JANUARY MEETING

All of **Marv Beulow's** jewelry and music boxes are from his original designs. Many of his smaller boxes feature "through" inlays done on a scroll saw, including angels, hummingbirds, lighthouses, and even a Pegasus. Some inlays are done with a router. His jewelry boxes are

exceptional, not only for their exquisite design, but also for his near flawless joinery and finishes.

Marv talked with us about designing and making boxes, making scroll saw inlays, and marketing on the internet. He's had good experience in each of those subjects. You can see his work on the website he designed at www.beyondthetree.com. He also displayed lots of boxes and answered lots of questions during his talk. He brought visual aids to show how to cuts his inlays. It was a very informative presentation.

By the way, it was standing room only as we had one of the largest turnouts ever, meaning we had well over 70 attendees. Thanks, Marv.

HOW WOULD YOU LIKE TO SAVE \$1000?

Jim Haen told me that another club he belongs to doesn't mail out newsletters. They all go out by e-mail. Some other clubs mail to members only by request – mostly to folks who don't use e-mail. It costs us about \$.90 for every newsletter we mail, counting postage, paper, labels, and copying, plus all the free hours it takes the Editor to print, fold, staple, labels, and stamp the 150 or so newsletters we send out very month. We could outsource that part, but the total cost would then be substantially over a dollar a copy. The upshot is that almost all of your annual dues go to mailing out ten newsletters to almost everyone during the year. The speakers, library, and special events have are paid for from our raffles.

If two-thirds of our members would be content to receive *Bench Talk* by e-mail only and not get a mailed copy, we could save \$1000 a year that we could spend on programs, books, videos, and the like.
