

THE PENTACLE

The Pentacle is also known as the five pointed Star of the MAGI, and it is quite often seen as a Spirit Sign in the air over people's heads, or affixed to the forehead, and it may appear in many colours.

The five points have special significance to those who understand, and to have such a STAR affixed to your forehead as a Spiritual attachment usually denotes that you have a pre—destined role in life to play, or what we may call a “Strong Karmic commitment” to fulfill.

The five points represent the *five* absolute values, which are:

1. **Love** (for the whole of mankind)
2. **Truth** (the totality of truth in all things).
3. **Beauty** (that everything we think or create will be beautiful).
4. **Goodwill** (that all our physical actions will be for the upliftment of M~2)
5. **Wisdom** (that each of us will make every effort to learn God's Laws).

It also serves to remind us of the 5 stages of Creation; the Spirit (created first), then the Elements – Fire, Earth, Air, and Water.

If the Star is a deep green it represents the ~n-ii and we know that this person in one lifetime was Jewish and bound by the five sacred principles of Jewish Law, unto which even Jesus Christ himself was once bound.

These five principles are the oath that every male Jew was expected to keep, and it was the responsibility of the parent, usually the Father, to make sure that they were strictly adhered to. They were as follows:

1. **Circumcision** (all male children had to be circumcised by the Covenant taken out with God Jehovah).
2. **Education** (all Jewish children should be taught the Law and the Jewish histories pertaining to Judaism).
3. **Employment** (all Jewish children had to take some type of job of work and learn a trade which the Father would have to find for them).
4. **Marriage** (as the law of Moses was to be fruitful, multiply, and spread the good seed. throughout the Land, young Jewish men were expected to get married and raise children. If the wife was barren, they could divorce her. In fact, it is believed that if a woman produced only female children, even this could be grounds for divorce in some remote Jewish Sects, for the husband must have a son to follow in his footsteps).
5. **Redemption** (this was the last of the five cardinal virtues that a Jewish father expected to have in a Son. Once these had all been fulfilled, as he aged he may have become a Patriarch and given special blessings, as well as preached in the Synagogue.

Jesus always proudly proclaimed before he started his “Ministry” at about 27 years old, that he had fulfilled all of the Jewish Laws, and we know that if he hadn't, the Pharisees and the Sadducees would have come down on him like a “ton of bricks”. So here comes the next question. Did Christ himself get married and have children? Nothing in the Bible refers to it, except when he went to the Wedding Feast in CANA (this is where he turned the water into wine). Was this the marriage feast of Jesus and someone else? So if he did get married, were there any children as the result of this union? Remember, Jesus was proud to be a Jew, and until his Ministry began he tried to do everything right to the Letter of the Jewish Law.
