

Small children are fascinated by the cartoons on TV. They stare at the screen for a solid 30 minutes and don't so much as twitch or fidget till the programme is over. But in Church! You've guessed it – they are a 3 – ring Circus. Lift up the kneeler, slam it down. Swing on one end of the pew. Flip through the pages of the hymn books. Take out a lolly – pop stick from heaven knows where and tickle the baby. Look pure and innocent and sweet when the baby screams!. The altar is far away and nothing interesting seems to happen there. Ofcourse there are candles and incense and bells and music but kids don't understand it at all (especially the sermon) and are bored.

Aren't some of the adults bored too? Distracted and inattentive? You watch some of them. They examine the nail polish at the tips of their fingers, pat their hair into place, re-arrange their costumes, scrutinise other women in the congregation.

The children say when they are getting dressed for Church on Sunday, "Why? Why do we have to go"?

Let's answer the question for ourselves first, and then for the kids. When we were young we were told to go and people who missed Mass on Sunday for no proper reason went to Hell!! Case dismissed!

Taking part in a Sunday Eucharist goes far beyond covering the basic obligation and touches what is central to our Christian life. Whether I acknowledge it or not, God is central to all human life, to all creation. God is central to my life. Apart from God I can do NOTHING. Without God I literally would not exist. And what better reminder than the Season of Easter? Our God LIVES and because of that fact I can face tomorrow and all the tomorrows in my life.

I think of the basics – God created me, God loves me unconditionally, God wants me to spend all eternity with him, God sent his Son to save me. And this undeniable fact – God understands my weaknesses, how I feel bogged down by the problems of daily living and forget that it is HE and only HE who can calm my stormy seas.

At Sunday Mass I can praise God, thank him and move forward to receive him in the Eucharist. This is all fine for me and you. But what about the 4 and 5 and 6 year olds who fidget and can't keep still? Theory and basics don't cut ice with them! The 3 – ring Circus is their means of escape. Sometimes, parents with small children at Sunday mass, feel they haven't said a single prayer. But I don't think that's true. Being present at Sunday Mass demands a lot of coordinated effort between parents and children and that in itself is a special prayer.

As the little ones get older they may get involved in parish activities. Serving at Mass, ushering, singing in the choir. So it seems that the seed God planted in parents who insisted their children attend Sunday Mass when they were small has grown and borne fruit during their teen years. Sometimes it takes longer for the first green shoot to appear. May be it does in young adulthood when they start raising their own families. Then they realize the importance of attending Sunday Mass by living their faith and nurturing it in their own 3 – ring circus families they possess, something priceless, something valuable that will last forever.

.GOD - Exists




Now came the turn of the youth to enjoy. A one-day

Community Fund - A Christian Response

For quite some time, in the Archdiocese, there has been talk of launching a new 'Fund'. The idea was discussed at the level of the College of Deans, of the Priests' Council and at Clergy Meetings, the Parish Pastoral Council and the Archdiocesan Pastoral Council. The idea has thus been allowed to gradually ripen. It is felt that now is the time to speak of it to the Catholic public as a whole.

I. Rationale for this Fund — our Vision : Over the last few years, in the Archdiocese of Bombay, our focus has been on the Parish as a community, a family of families, based on the model community described in the Acts of the Apostles: "All believers continued together in close fellowship and shared their belongings with one another" (Acts 2:44). Further, "the group of believers was of one mind and heart. No one said that any of his belongings was his own, but they all shared with one another everything they had; there was no one in the group who was in need" (Acts 4:32). Our vision for a Parish is one in which no one should feel unwanted or left out. Rather, everyone should feel a sense of belonging as part of a family. Members share their resources to enable everyone to have the basic necessities of life and face emergencies.

In the past, our parishes have tried in various ways to cater to the needs of the poor parishioners. There was the Church Support System where people made a voluntary contribution to the parish. The positive aspect of this system was that people were encouraged to give. Negatively, the contribution was the same whether someone earning Rs.5,000/- a month or someone earning Rs.50,000/- the same contribution! Further, since the amount collected was small, it sufficed only to maintain the parish institution. There wasn't much left to be set aside for community growth and welfare.

Rather than Church Support, what is needed is a "Community Fund". The goal is to create an awareness that we are the parish and so we need to give both for our good and the good of all. While we give according to our means, there is a basic uniformity, i.e. all give at least 1% of one's gross income.

II. The Synod Recommendation : One of the topics discussed at the 2001 Bombay Synod was the need of generating funds for the welfare of the community in each parish with a view that the poor could be cared for, so that no one would go to bed hungry at night, no child would be deprived of education because the parents could not afford the fees and no one would die for lack of basic medical aid.

Hence, it was suggested that every earning parishioner, even the smallest wage earner, contributes 1% of his/ her gross salary. The Bible lays down a 10% tithe and several Christian bodies - including some of our charismatic communities - are following this practice of tithing themselves; but the Synod settled on a 1% contribution. (Of course, those who would like to be more generous are most welcome!) If a person is needy, he/ she may receive back much more than his/her contribution; but every one has the satisfaction of contributing towards the welfare of the community according to one's capacity. No one is merely a recipient, a beggar.

As Christians many of us have this deep desire to help and reach out to the poor and needy brothers and sisters of our parish, keeping in mind the mission and command of Our Lord Jesus Christ — "Whatsoever you do to the least of my brothers and sisters, you do unto Me". The Community Fund is seen as one of the possible answers to this desire. Through this Fund, we systematically cater to the deserving in our community so that no one will be in need.

III. Method of Collection: How are the funds to be collected? Each parish will work out its own system but a simple yet effective way is through an envelope system, which will carry the name, address, zone and community of the contributor as well as the months for which he/ she is contributing. This envelope could be dropped into a box kept in the Church and marked "Community Fund".

It is expected that every parishioner contributes conscientiously: A help towards this end may be a family card where the contribution is recorded.

IV. Disbursement of Funds : There are various ways of disbursing or allocating the funds. One suggestion is as follows :

50% for medical and education of the needy in the parish. The SVP would also draw from this to carry on their activities, though they may still like to carry on their own home-to-home collection, which is entirely voluntary and should not be done to the detriment of the Community Fund which surely takes precedence over the SVP drive for funds.

15% for Zonal/Sector activities i.e. Parents', Teachers', Children's, Senior Citizens' Day celebrations. Zonal Anniversary Mass etc. There would not be need of any other collections for this purpose.

20% for Church maintenance and Parish related activities, e.g. sending someone for training in catechetics, liturgy, etc.

15 % for Parish Reserve Fund — for emergencies.

V. Questions that may arise :

Q.1 : Why force people to contribute? Leave it free to them to contribute.



Our emphasis is on the parish as a community where every parishioner puts in his/her contribution of talents and resources for the growth of the community. It is our Christian obligation to reach out to our brothers and sister and help satisfy their needs, The Community Fund encourages parishioners to do what Jesus did care for the poor, the weak and the helpless.

Q.2: Do not people contribute at other times e.g. Sunday Masses and other collections for the Parish?

The Sunday Mass collection will remain your FREE LOVE OFFERING. You may or may not give. (Incidentally the 1st and 2nd Sunday collection goes to Archbishop's House for the needs of the Archdiocese - especially the new and needy parishes). The contributions to the other archdiocesan collections are also free i.e. Collections for Vianney Sunday, Mission Sunday, Lenten Alms, Hunger and Disease Campaign. On these occasions, one gives out of one's generosity.

Q.3: Is this a new venture or is there an experience we can go by ?

As of now, a few parishes have already initiated this process. The first initiative was taken by Infant Jesus Church, Dombivli in the year 1992. Dombivli is a poor parish, but the results have been very satisfying. Other parishes too have tried this out, and met with a lot of success. One of our suburban parishes, for example, with only 46% of its parishioners contributing, was able to collect more than 25 lakhs last year! The parish is thereby able to cater not only to its own needs but also the needs of other parishes: it has adopted a rule that any application for help from any parish in its deanery will receive a donation of Rs.5000/-. Any application for aid from a parish outside the deanery will receive Rs.3000/-. Thus, as a result of even a partial contribution towards the Community Fund, out of its superabundance, this parish is able to help not only parishioners but people of other parishes too!

We like to insist that no one is forced. Much less is there a question of anyone being denied the Sacraments or Christian burial because he/she has not contributed to the Fund. It is not a question of a person being forced; rather it is a 'self-obligation' flowing from a person's realisation of belonging to a Community. When all the parishioners take the Community Fund seriously, it will be a blessing for the parish community - and, we may add, to the contributor. We remember the words of Paul: "Thin sowing means thin reaping. If we sow bountifully, we will reap in abundance" (2Cor.9:6). Indeed, the Lord has given us that beautiful promise: "Give and it will be given to you. A good measure, pressed down, shaken together, running over will be put into your lap; for the measure you give will be the measure you get back" (Lk.6:38).

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I am the Resurrection and the Life

Resurrection / Life two faces of the same coin. For the Christian life will reach its full value only in the Resurrection otherwise we are merely existing.



"I came that you may have life and have it in abundance." Jn 10/10

"I know that I shall see the goodness in the land of the living," and Ps. 23:6 "surely the Lord's goodness and mercy of the Lord shall follow me all the days of my life." Jn. 17:3 "and this is eternal life, that they may know You (the Father) the only true God, and Jesus Christ, whom You have sent." So, where do we get this realization, this faith? Here below, not when we go up yonder. This here is eternal life itself at its inception, enjoy it!

Life is God's gift, it is precious, it's for living to the full. If you are not enjoying its fullness, you need to ask yourself why. May be we need to probe a little into what is missing in us, for that life not to be flourishing in us now.

In Lk. 10:21-27 we read of a certain lawyer who put Jesus to the test saying, "what must I do to inherit eternal life?" Jesus puts a question in return, "What is written in the Law?" He answers, "You shall love the Lord your God, with all your heart, with all your soul, with all your mind, and with all your strength, and you shall love your nieghbour as yourself," To justify himself further, he asks "and who is my neighbour?" To which, Jesus relates the Parable of the Good Samaritan, that we are all familiar with. But the punch line is v. 37 "go ye and do likewise."

We fulfill the Law only when we serve and love God, love our neighbour, serve our neighbour, only then are we serving God. "As long as you did it to the least of my brethren you did it to me. "The proof of the pudding is in the eating. This is the law; it flies on two wings-love of God and love of neighbour. We love God with our heart, yes and our soul, but what about strength? How many Christians are straining their

muscles in God's service? And how much of our mind is exercising God's Word?


But we are quick to point out that we are a New Testament people. We are not under the Law of Moses, but under Grace. When Christ appeared to the Twelve on the shore (Jn 21:15) he asked Peter thrice "Do you love me more than these? Feed my lambs, feed my sheep. The only true love Jesus accepts and recognizes is our here and now service in His Kingdom. We are already in this kingdom. Do we not say "Christ our King" "Jesus is Lord"

"A new commandment I give you, that you love one another as I have loved you. "By this will all know that you are my disciples, if you have love one for another?" You must read Jn. 13 to feel the pathos behind his command. The fate of His Church would depend precariously on their caring / sharing love for each other. This was the glue that would keep them from breaking up and going their separate ways.

Every man, woman and child born, has been blessed with at least one talent. Find out what is yours and begin to use it in the service of others. In the natural order what you don't use, you lose. But Rom 11/29 says "For the gifts and the calling of God are irrevocable." Some are blessed with time rather than money; spend time reaching out, a listening ear, a healing touch. Others are blessed over and above their needs financially. Give some of that surplus to relieve another's need, and give as **to the Lord.** Every gift, whether time or money spent is for the Lord.

It will turn your life around and Jn. 10:10 will be translated into a reality, rather than remain just a Biblical Verse Shalom.

The friend who had earlier slapped and had now saved his best friend, asked him "After I hurt you, you wrote in the sand, and now you write on a stone. Why?"


