

In the aftermath of the bomb blasts of 7/11, many questions have emerged. Why did the terrorists want to make a statement written in blood, death and doom, condemning innocent people? Have not the people of Mumbai, lived and worked together in harmony, giving it a genuinely cosmopolitan character, and making this city what it is today? Why us? Why was Mumbai targeted, is it some fault of ours, that we should suffer the wrath of few misguided individuals? What do we do in the face of violent acts?

Some **reacted** by trying to fuel the flames of hatred and discontent, targeting and looking with suspicion on individuals and specific communities. Others **responded** by looking beyond the immediate violent acts, in trying to identify the underlying causes. Violence does not erupt in a vacuum – it erupts as an expression of protest. But against what? A few possible reasons could be the increased injustices, wide economic disparities, exploitation, and

domination of some world powers, upsetting the equilibrium elsewhere, and thus causing a tsunami effect in far flung countries.

As we look closer we realize the people of Mumbai did not deserve this disaster. They are not to blame. The blame lies outside the parameters of Mumbai. Though it is true Mumbai was the target, the blame lies elsewhere – in India, or even in the world at large. One thing is certain: the people of Mumbai are not insulated from outside influences. Being a thriving cosmopolitan city, Mumbai is bound to be a target for discontented groups.

What then do we do?

The city of Mumbai is a blend of different religions, cultures, communities, and ideologies. In this lies its strength, and the answers to a possible solution. It takes just a minute to chop off the hand of another in a fit of rage, but it takes a team of specialist doctors a long time to fit it back. The terrorists provided a platform for men of goodwill, religious, social and community

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leaders to join hands and address the problem of violence.

One such praiseworthy initiative has been taken by the Bombay Catholic Subha, under the leadership of Fr. Allwyn D'Silva and Dolphy D'Souza. They have initiated a process in collaboration with other likeminded groups, and started a process of reflection in organizing a programme – " **Campaign against Violence.**" This

campaign would involve a long-term plan, and positive action with our active involvement. It would mean also, that communities refrain from exaggerating their

differences and magnifying their uniqueness; instead they need to network with others and start a process towards harmonious living. It was felt the need of the hour was to strengthen secular forces at grassroots and at other levels, and start cultivating human values of brotherhood and respect. An interesting point made here was that we learn brotherhood, love and harmonious living from the slum-dwellers and lower strata of society, rather than preach to them. At this meeting, Mrs. Teesta Setalvad observed that the paradox of our nation which championed non-violence, is now a very violent society where domestic violence, caste discrimination, communal violence, atrocities against women and even state-supported violence are daily occurrences. She further said that the middle class, pressurized from all sides bears the brunt of the consequences. but fails to unite and take a stand. It is time we stop cursing politicians,

bureaucracy, judiciary and administrators and rather curse ourselves for our inaction, insensitivity and passive acceptance. This praiseworthy and long-term venture will not succeed, unless we Christians throw in the weight of our numbers and goodwill to make it a reality.

We point our finger and condemn the terrorists, but maybe we Christians can learn a lesson from them. Terrorists are not

fighting for a religion, but for a cause, which they believe is just and will become a reality in future. They are ready to die for this cause. I wonder if we are as committed, as the terrorist is, to

the cause of proclaiming the gospel. Do we even believe that gospel is good news? We offer excuses, and make all sorts of compromises. For something that is of great concern to our children's future, for instance corruption in public life, are we ready to put our lives on the line. We organize all sorts of welfare programmes in our parishes, but how many would join or lend their support to groups that are demanding action in favour of better social, civic and political structures, better governance, moral values. If we are interested or concerned, we cannot afford to be self-complacent onlookers, we must be involved. Our Small Christian Communities are action groups, channels through which we collaborate with likeminded groups for a better society. The time has come to move from 'Small Christian Communities' to 'Small Human Communities'," the better to realize our potential, as messengers of the good news.

He began the novenas by saying that true happiness is found in Jesus. Jesus has given us a formula for happiness and these are called the Beatitudes.



mercy proved this. To be gentle does not mean we allow ourselves to be trampled upon, or become a doormat, it does not mean that we accept injustice, bowing down with unlimited patience. If you follow the path of gentleness, love abounds and hope deepens.

Blessed are the poor in spirit, for theirs is the kingdom of heaven.

Jesus began His public ministry with this good news. Kingdom usually means a territory; for Jesus it meant salvation. Salvation is manifested in 'Shalom', meaning peace — a harmonious relationship between God and man, man and man and man and nature. Salvation is explained as 'poor in spirit'. For Jesus to be poor meant to be totally dependent on the Father. We need to ask ourselves today, do we have this attitude to become poor in spirit? To be poor in spirit we have to open our hearts to Jesus from inside. When we are poor in spirit, we will be rich in God's love.

Blessed are those who mourn, for they shall be comforted.

We ask ourselves if we live a good life, then why do bad things happen to us? Jesus said the opposite – "whoever does not carry his cross and follow me, cannot be my disciple" [Lk 14:27]. How then can we find relief from suffering? Those who suffer develop sensitivity. Our hearts change. When we go through suffering relationships change, friendships become more precious.

Blessed are the meek, for they shall inherit the earth.

Jesus refused to be the Messiah of power. He was kind and compassionate, and His works of

Blessed are those who hunger and thirst for righteousness, for

they shall be satisfied.

To be righteous means to be honest, to have a desire to live a positive life. God knows no one is perfect, it is not perfection that matters, but the willingness to do what God wants us to do.

Blessed are the merciful, for they shall obtain mercy.

Why are some people still happy despite being hurt? It is because of our attitude; it is not what happens that matters, but how we react to what happens. Humanly it is difficult to forgive. It is only when we have faith, is it possible to liberate ourselves from anger and hurt. Reverse negative to positive, pray, invite Jesus into your heart; let God's Holy Spirit heal you.

Blessed are the pure of heart, for they shall see God.

If there is any hostility towards anyone, if we have done anything illegal or immoral, and have not repented over it and confessed it then our hearts are not pure. Negative feelings block faith because we prevent the Holy Spirit from working in us. Here are a few steps to keep our hearts pure. Clean up - If there is some hatred and bitterness in our hearts towards someone, decide to forgive, say a forgiving prayer. Give up - become pure in heart by giving up something you like very much which is in fact harmful. Take up - something that is productive. We have to live for a cause, take up Jesus' cause.

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Blessed are the peacemakers, for they shall be called children of God.

Peace is a harmonious relationship between family and friends. Jesus bought peace through his sufferings, and we can experience Jesus' peace by way of forgiveness, love and sacrifice. Peacemakers are those who bring people together, they are repairers of breaches.

Blessed are those who are persecuted for righteousness' sake, for theirs is the kingdom of heaven.

Persecution becomes salvific when we face it the way Jesus did – by way of forgiveness and love. Be prepared to face persecution bravely. Equip ourselves with the Armour of Prayer, Sacraments and the Word of God. Persevere in doing what is right. Persist in trusting God. Pray for courage and strength. When we are persecuted God gives us courage and strength to go through suffering.

Jesus gave us these spiritual laws – The Beatitudes – so that we may have the gift of abundant life and the secret of happy living as Mary, His Mother had. You and I can choose to be happy, no matter what. Amen

I'm thanking you because FATHER, YOU haven't given up on me.



A brief report of the happenings in all the 22 SCCs of our Parish for the period June 2006 to August 2006.

In June, the 22 SCCs came together to conduct the daily



This year our Parish has 86 Confirmation candidates and hence most SCCs have conducted the "Rite of Acceptance" prayer service in their respective groups in July. Some SCCs continue visiting the families in their Community in an effort to know them better. The sick and ailing have been shown love and affection and one SCC in particular got involved in hospitalising two elderly siblings who had no one to care for them. The community also made funeral arrangements for one of the sisters who succumbed to an illness.

Following the July 2005 floods, one SCC made efforts to meet the local BMC officials and sought their assistance in helping in the problems of water logging and drainage. Working with the ALM, another SCC made a concentrated effort to attend to drainage, potable water and civic issues.



In August one SCC presented a Spiritual Bouquet to the priests of our parish on Vianney Sunday. The Bouquet comprised of community

members offering to attend Masses, and to do acts of charity and sacrifices.

Efforts are in progress to get Community members to spend an hour at the Blessed Sacrament Chapel, and one community had committed the 5th of every month as the date of visits. This is in keeping with the Archdiocese PEACE initiative.

Two SCCs conducted a session on "Understanding the Sacraments and their Communitarian Dimension". Another SCC had a fellowship, and a questionnaire on the Eucharist was discussed.

There was flag hoisting on Independence Day and a Celebration of Baptism in the neighbourhood.

The Holy Hour in the Church was conducted by different SCCs on every First Friday of the Month.

Peace Rally

In response to the call given by the Chief Minister of Maharashtra, to observe a memorial service on Tuesday, 18th July 2006 at 6.24pm, in remembrance of the victims of the bomb blasts on July 11, the Parishioners of OLPS Church under the banner of The Bombay Catholic Sabha and AGNI assembled in front of the Chembur Railway Station on 18th July at 6.15pm.

Fr Edgar Moreira C.Ss.R., a priest from the OLPS Church and a good number of nuns from St Joseph's Convent, along with three hundred members of the OLPS Parish, and members belonging to other communities in the neighbourhood were present when the first siren was blown at 6.24pm.

Candles were lit and all stood in silence in memory of the victims and in solidarity with the families of the victims. After the 2-minute silence was observed, a Pledge was read by each and everyone present expressing heartfelt sympathies to the families of the deceased members and resolving to work with renewed determination for peace and harmony among all peoples, irrespective of caste, creed and community.

George Kurian, repre-senting the Bombay Catholic Sabha and AGNI, thanked the people present for showing their concern for and oneness of spirit with those who suffered in the blasts.

He affirmed that their presence in large numbers was an expression of unity and

civic consciousness. He thanked the Railways for restoring the services swiftly and for dispensing compensation to the victims immediately. The Mumbai police was thanked for putting in 30-40 hours of continuous work, for restoring law and order and for help rendered to the victims immediately. The doctors, nurses and staff of Lokmanya Tilak hospital, the K.E.M. hospital and other hospitals in the city were thanked for the selfless work rendered to the victims and the injured. The people living close to blast sites were also thanked for their readiness in reaching out to the injured, and their sensitivity to the dead.

The universal hymn for unity "Bind us Together" was then sung. The service concluded with the singing of the National Anthem.

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Meaningful Responses at Mass

"Amen" when receiving Communion: Holding the Sacred Host before us the Celebrant says: "The Body of Christ". To which we reply" Amen". When the Celebrant points to the Host with the words "The Body of Christ" he does not only mean that this little piece of bread is the Risen Lord really



present in it. But he also points out to the whole community of baptized - the Mystical Body of Christ.

Take And Eat: So the celebrant says to each communicant: "This (myself, my body, my person) is the Body of Christ- take and eat, consume it for it is given for you. And this is what he is expected to do when he serves his parishioners throughout the day and week giving of his body, time talents, energy- the whole of himself that they may be nourished and grow in their Christ-life. He lives for others, or rather; he dies in slow degrees so that others may live. What is said of the priest and his self-giving applies equally to each person receiving Holy Communion. His/her life is meant to be apostolic - a

breaking of self to feed others. This readiness to give of oneself is expressed by the "Amen". Having understood this, let us answer "Amen" boldly.

"Amen" at the end of each prayer: Again, routinely we make this response under our breath. That short response

means: "So be it". In other words we endorse or approve of the petition the celebrant has made. We boldly request the Father to give us what we ask in the name of Jesus.

Response at the end of the readings: When we have attentively and eagerly listened to a speaker whose words have stirred us we respond at the end of his/her speech with enthusiastic applause. At mass we have God himself offering each of us personally a life-giving message. Should we not respond to God's Word with a resounding "Thanks be to God" and "Praise to you Lord Jesus Christ"?
