## Course Information

### General Conditions for all courses

Applicants are invited to nominate for any of the courses scheduled for 2009 for which they hold prerequisite competencies.

All nominations for courses must be submitted on the '**Course Nomination Form**' (page 19 of this booklet). Additional forms can be downloaded from the **myrfs** website or obtained from the zone office.

Unless exceptional circumstances exist, all Course Nomination Forms are to be forwarded to the Fire Control Centre no less than two (2) Weeks prior to the commencement of the nominated course. Failure to submit the form within the time frame may result in your application being unsuccessful.

### Selection Criteria

The selection of participants in Zone courses is based on the principles of 'Fairness & Equity'. Initial selection is based on meeting course prerequisites & other published selection criteria. The highest priority is given to field officers requiring completion of courses required for that position.

Further selection is based on 'Availability' – *priority being given to members known to be available for fire calls*, 'Relative Risk Basis' – *if the risks are higher in one brigade than another*, or 'Relative Needs Basis' – *if the numbers already trained in one brigade are higher than another brigade*.

### Notification

All nominees will receive advice as to their successful or unsuccessful nomination. In the event of an unsuccessful nomination, the member will be advised the reason(s) behind the unsuccessful application. Where a course is full, a waiting list will be created and nominees unsuccessful in gaining a place initially will be placed on the list and advised accordingly.

Please note that course numbers are strictly limited especially for high demand courses. If you are not successful in gaining a place on a course or you have submitted a late nomination or have failed to put in a nomination at all, please do not turn up for a course unless advised to do so by the Zone L&D Officer.

### Attendance

If you are successful in obtaining a position on any course it is your responsibility to advise the Zone Office not less than 24hours (unless exceptional circumstances exist) prior to the commencement of the course if you're unable to attend. Failure to advise the Zone Office may jeopardise future applications to attend courses.

### Dress Requirements

Unless mentioned otherwise, trainees may wear casual clothes to any 'theory only' training sessions but must wear basic Personal Protective Equipment (Overalls, boots, helmet & gloves) for all practical training sessions.

### Meals

Where a Zone course or assessment is conducted over a full day or weekend, or unless otherwise advised, meals will be provided.

## **Assessment procedures**

At the introduction of each course, participants will be advised of the assessment procedures. Assessments will be conducted at a convenient time and location that is agreeable to members.

Assessments must be undertaken within 2 years of completing a course. Failure to undertake assessment may result in having to re-attend some parts of the course.

## **Venues**

Check the calendar details for indication of venue locations and times. Where a location e.g. "Tumut District" is listed, the finalised venue will be notified to successful nominees once nominations have been collated. Venues will be selected to minimise travel for members wherever possible taking into account adequate heating / cooling and catering facilities.

## **Physical Fitness & Health**

Members must always consider their general health and fitness before nominating for a particular course. Please ensure your fitness is at a level that will enable you to complete your training in a safe and healthy manner. You should inform course coordinators of any prescribed medications, dietary needs or general disabilities prior to commencing any training. All training within the RHZ must comply with the NSW Occupational Health & Safety Act (OH&S) 2000.

## **Recognition of Prior Learning (RPL)**

The Riverina Highlands Zone provides RPL in all mainstream courses. Persons who believe they may already possess a competency for a particular qualification should obtain a copy of the "How to become qualified in..." booklet from the Zone office. Contact the Zone office for details on completing an RPL application, or undertaking an 'Assessment on Demand'.

## **Recognition of Current Competency (RCC)**

You may already be qualified in one or more of the relevant units through assessment with another Fire Service or Registered Training Organisation (RTO). If so your Qualifications will be automatically recognised. You then only need training and assessment in those aspects that are unique to your new location.

To find out more about how you may already be qualified in your chosen training course, please contact your Brigade Training Officer or Captain. If unsure of any aspect of this process contact the Zone Learning and Development Officer on 6941 2222.

## **Additional Training Information**

For more detailed information on Training Courses, learning outcomes and information on how NSW RFS qualifications relate to the National Public Safety Units of Competency, refer to the Training Services Information Booklet 2009. This booklet details each Mainstream course and specialist course and identifies the national Module equivalents. A copy of this booklet can be downloaded from the RFS Website <http://www.rfs.nsw.gov.au/> or the **myrfs** website.

## **Your Qualifications**

Who can access your qualifications and details? Your records are kept on file for a period of 30 years and may be accessed by you on request. Your personal details are confidential and cannot be given out to anyone else. Your training, assessment and certification details however, may be made available to anyone having reasonable cause, but only with the approval of the Zone Manager or higher authority. Further information is available by downloading the Training Code of Practice from one of the above websites.

## Bush Firefighter (BF)

BF is generally the first training course undertaken by most RFS members and is delivered either at brigade or Zone level. The Bush Firefighter course is aligned to four National Units of Competency, *Prevent Injury, respond to Wildfire, Operate Communications Systems and Equipment, Work in a Team* and *Work effectively in a Public Service Organisation*.

Initial instruction, leading to the BF competency, involves theory sessions, group discussions and practical activities covering:

- basic safety
- an appreciation of fire behaviour
- use and care of equipment
- procedures and communications
- working in a team and as part of the RFS
- hose skills & drills

BF training is usually held on week-nights or weekends. Further practice, typically about 20 hours, is usually needed for inexperienced members until the required standard is reached.

Prior to BF training, members may be required to participate in an OH&S Induction session. This induction session familiarises new members with hazards that may be encountered around their fire station.

**Where required, new members will receive OH&S Induction training from their local brigades unless otherwise notified.**

The assessment process will be explained at the start and end of each course. Members become certified as competent to BF level by being assessed by a qualified assessor. This assessment includes **demonstrating** practical bush firefighting skills and **answering** related questions.

To maintain your competency as a safe and effective Bush Firefighter (BF) you need to participate in actual firefighting activities, brigade training sessions, or as a minimum an annual brigade training session / refresher.

One day BF “Fast Track” (Recognition of Prior Learning) Workshops may be available to brigades with experienced firefighters who do not have any formal qualifications. Further information on RPL is available from the Zone L&D Officer.

## Village Firefighter (VF)

Village Firefighter (VF) is the level of competency needed to fight small structural, vehicle and similar fires. The training to achieve VF competency is conducted within the brigade and at zone level. The course covers structural and vehicle fire behaviour, safety, use of equipment, team work, firefighting procedures and fire protection systems. The VF course is aligned to the national unit of competency *Respond to isolated/remote structure fire*.

VF training takes about 40 hours and involves theory sessions, group discussions and a lot of practical activities. Training can typically involve “hot fire” work involving an LPG gas pad.

**Prerequisite:** Nominees must be qualified at BF. Members wishing to undertake the VF training are advised to discuss nomination with their Captain. The Captain will verify the member has completed Bush (Basic) Firefighter, is likely to be an active member in a VF role, and is fit enough for normal brigade VF duties. **Note: This training is physically strenuous.**

Brigade members become certified as competent to VF level by being assessed. Assessment includes undertaking self-paced projects, demonstrating practical village firefighting skills and answering related questions.

To maintain your competency as a safe and effective Village Firefighter you need to participate in at least two, and preferably more, sessions of training or actual village firefighting activities each year.

## Advanced Fire Fighter (AF)

Advance Firefighter (AF) is the level of competency needed to fight bush & grass fires **without constant and direct supervision**. The training to achieve AF is conducted at Zone level and consists of two separate course components (AFP & AFT) followed by self-paced practice in your own brigade.

The AFP (Advanced Firefighter Principals) course covers firefighter safety, bushfire behaviour, bushfire weather and fire prevention.

The AFT (Advanced Firefighter Technical) course covers maintenance and testing of equipment, map reading, hydraulics and pumping.

You become certified as competent to AF level by being assessed. This assessment includes demonstrating your practical skills and answering related questions.

**Prerequisite:** Nominees must be qualified at BF. It is preferable to have had fireground experience under supervision before nominating for this course. Members wishing to undertake this training are advised to discuss nomination with their Captain. **All members who nominate for the AF course are expected to be up to speed in all aspects of pumping including draughting, closed & open relay pumping.** Please make sure you have refreshed your pumping skills before hand, as no time is available to re-visit basic pumping skills during the course.

To maintain your competency as a safe and effective Advanced Firefighter you need to participate in at least two, and preferably more, sessions of training or actual firefighting activities each year.

## Crew Leader (CLW, CLV, CLS)

Crew Leader (CL) is the level of competency needed to lead a crew at a fire or incident.

The CL training program is conducted at Zone level and is divided into three main components, CL Wildfire (CLW), CL Supervision (CLS) & CL Village (CLV). CLW & CLV enables you to lead a single crew or unit at an incident. CLS enables you to command multiple units in strike teams & tasks forces including small staging areas and sectors where needed. CLV is recommended for Crew Leaders of Brigades responding to Village type incidents although it has no national unit of competency without BAO (Breathing Apparatus). To maintain your competency as a safe and effective Crew Leader you need to participate in at least two, and preferably more, sessions of training or actual firefighting activities as a Crew Leader each year.

**Prerequisite:** Nominees must be qualified at AF (and VF if undertaking CLV), with at least one year's active experience at AF level (or equivalent). Members wishing to commence this course must be nominated by their Captain or Group Captain who will verify that the member has been, and is likely to continue as, an active member, has shown some interest and aptitude in leading rural firefighters and is apparently fit for normal RFS duties.

Nominees for CLW must be certified at AF

Nominees for CLS must be certified at CLW or CLV

Nominees for CLV must be certified at AF & VF

Certification is achieved through an assessment process, which includes **demonstrating leadership skills**, applying **firefighting tactics** and answering **related** questions.

**There are no Crew Leader Village courses scheduled for 2009. However, if members with the required prerequisites are interested, a night session prior to the VF refresher at Adelong can be conducted with the practical component run as part of the VF refresher.**

## Group Leader (GLA, GLC)

"Group Leader (GL)" is the level of competency needed to lead several crews at larger, more complex fires/incidents. It is designed to enable you to run a medium scale operation as the Incident Controller, or to be a Sector Officer or Division Commander within a large incident. It covers advanced wildfire behaviour, advanced wildfire suppression, pre-incident planning and operational management using the ICS system. The GL certification is aligned to the following National Public Safety Unit of Competency:

- Manage a Multi-Team Response (PUAOPE005A)

**The GL training program is conducted at Region level and is divided into two components,**

The GL training program (2003 standard) comprises two courses (GLA and GLC), each taking about 20 hours to complete. Group Leader Analysis (GLA) covers advanced wildfire behaviour and suppression, while Group Leader Command (GLC) covers pre-incident planning and operational management. In addition to these courses, practice is needed until you reach the specified level of competency. Typically this includes acting as a Group Officer under supervision, or by assisting Group Officers at incidents and other activities.

**Prerequisite:** Nominees require Crew Leader certification as a prerequisite for commencing training in GL. Each person considering this course should ideally have significant firefighting experience as a Crew Leader.

To maintain your competency at least four sessions of training or actual firefighting are typically needed each year for a person to maintain safe and effective GL skills.

Certification is achieved through an assessment process, which includes demonstrating leadership skills, applying firefighting tactics and answering related questions.

## Rural Fire Driver (RFD)

Rural Fire Driving (RFD) is the level of competency needed to drive a firefighting vehicle under operational conditions. The course concentrates on developing low risk on-road driving and sound off-road 4WD skills.

**Prerequisites** for becoming a Rural Fire Driver (Heavy) are:

- Must hold BF qualifications and also AFT component of the AF Course (equipment testing & maintenance, hydraulics & pumping, map reading)
- Must hold minimum current MR licence (held for at least 12 months) and have at least twelve months experience driving brigade heavy vehicles before final, practical assessment.
- Must be an active member of the brigade.
- Be nominated by the Captain.
- Will be required to attend a one night & two day 4WD training session and assessment.
- Must be finally assessed as competent in practical driving skills by a member of the District RFD Assessment Team (within 12 months of the theory assessment).

## Chainsaw Operation (CSO)

Chainsaw Operation (CSO) is the level of competency needed to operate a chainsaw during RFS activities.

Two levels of chain saw competencies are available in the Zone; Trim & crosscut Felled Trees (TFT) and Tree Falling Intermediate (TFI). Crosscutting is normally all that is required by brigade members during routine fireground operations. Tree felling during fireground operations requires the Tree Falling Fire-line (TFF) competency. **TFF is a Regional course and not available at Zone level.**

Priority is given to ensure that there is an adequate number of cross-cut rated chainsaw operators in each brigade equipped with a chain saw. Other CSO qualifications are considered on a needs basis.

**Prerequisites:** Bush Firefighter level (or higher).

To maintain competence in chainsaw operation you need to be regularly using the equipment under a variety of conditions. Chainsaw Operators will require re-certification every three (3) years.

Re-certification of existing qualifications is obtained every three years through observation of recent actual work and producing an up to date log book or undertaking a challenge test. Re-assessments are typically conducted on the practical day of a scheduled course but can be undertaken at any time by a qualified RFS chainsaw assessor.

## Global Positioning Systems (GPS)

## RFS Instructor (RFI) - Regional

RFS Instructor (RFI) is the level of competency needed for brigade members to be able to train others. The RFI program is run by Region and nominations are open for any brigade members who may wish to become an instructor. The course consists of some pre-course reading, a two-day course workshop followed by several self-paced projects over the following months.

**Prerequisite:** Nominees must be qualified at AF. Members wishing to commence this course must be an active member who have shown some interest and ability in training RFS members.

Zone Instructors play an important part in delivering training at all levels to zone volunteers and must be prepared to instruct at least twice per year to maintain their competency.

## Conduct Briefings & Debriefings (CBD) - Regional

This course covers conducting precise and effective briefings and debriefings. It covers situations from simple crew briefings/ debriefings up to those involved at major incidents. It is aligned to the national unit of competency PUAOPE004A Conduct Briefings/Debriefings and also covers the prerequisite unit PUACOM001A Communicate in the workplace. The assessment includes conducting two briefings and two debriefings (in each case, one simple and one complex). This course is designed for Deputy Captains and above. **Prerequisite for this course is CL.**

## Incident Management Workshop (IMW) – Regional

The IMW workshop is available to those people who wish to become qualified to operate in Incident Control, Operations, Planning or Logistics cells within an Incident Management Team. The IMW is a generally completed prior to participating in the Regional IMX. People interested in attending the IMW should first complete a self paced Introduction to Incident Control Systems for IMT's (ICS for IMT's). ## **CSA – Community Safety Assistant**

CSA provides the skills to assist during RFS Community Safety activities. The program is aligned to the national unit PUAFIR208A (Participate in community safety activities). The course covers specific hazard identification, presenting community safety information and undertaking fire mitigation activities. Prerequisite is BF, BFS or equivalent certification to commence the program. CSA programs are organised and delivered by the RFS Community Education section.

**A Workbook must be completed prior to attendance at a course. The workbook and reference material can be obtained from the Zone Community Safety Officer and returned when completed**

## **CSF – Community Safety Facilitator**

CSF provides the skills to facilitate RFS Community Safety activities. The program is aligned to the national units PUAFIR301A (Undertake Community Safety Activities) and PUACOM005A (Foster a positive organisational image in the community). The program provides competencies to identify and evaluate risk in the community, to select and implement strategies to improve community safety, and to promote a positive public image for the organisation. You need to have CSA and BF, BFS or equivalent certification to commence the program. CSA programs are organised and delivered by the RFS Community Education section.

**A Workbook must be completed prior to attendance at a course. The workbook and reference material can be obtained from the Zone Community Safety Officer and returned when completed**

No dates have been set for the CSA & CSF courses, if interested contact the Zone Community Safety Officer for further information.

## State Level Course
