CAMP PREPARATION CHECK LIST

WHEN

WHAT TO DO

March-April

- Request camp dates, and submit your \$20.00 per person deposit to the Council Service Center. Be sure to turn in one check from the Pack, NOT individual checks.
- Select and conduct Cub Webelos Scout Resident Camp promotion for Scouts and Parents. Contact your District Promotions Chair or Camp Director Mike Engfer for assistance with this.

April-May

- Review with group leaders *A Guide to Safe Scouting*, for all safety policies.
- Recruit two registered leaders for every Four scouts.
- Complete (if necessary) Campership request form and submit it to Council Service Center. **The Deadline is April 6th, 2009. The forms must be in the Council Service Center on this date to assure the request is considered. Camperships awarded and the amounts offered will be reported to the units no later than May 1st, 2009**

May-June

- Submit the balance of the fees to complete registration to the Council Service Center.
- Provide parents with a copy of the “**THINGS PARENTS SHOULD KNOW**”. The section is included in this guide and is also available as a separate camp document.

June-July

- Register any new boys who recently joined your unit. Discounted fees are applied to any boy registered new to the unit after the 30th of June, 2008.
- Forward **final** Unit Roster and dietary needs to the Council Service Center at least two weeks prior to arrival.
- Secure correct Medical forms for all youth and adults.
- Finalize all travel arrangements for transportation to and from camp

PACK RESERVATIONS

You may reserve your place for resident camp by submitting a deposit of \$25.00 per person to the Rainbow Council Service Center. Payment in full is due in the service center on or before June 29, 2009. Reservations are by Pack only. Use a pack check for all who register from the Pack. The only exception is when only one youth and his parent are coming to camp from a Pack. Please note that every attempt will be to give you the first choice of requested camp sessions, but, there is a limit of 125 scouts that can be adequately served in a session. Reservations will be slotted on a first paid first serve basis of the requests made.

ARRIVAL TIME

All units plan to arrive together between 2:00 P.M. and 4:00 P.M. on the first day of your camp session.

CHECK-IN

Check-in occurs upon arrival to camp and is by Pack! Please have your participants and **all** your Pack's paperwork at camp and **in hand** when you check-in. Late arrivals will be accommodated after the pack is checked-in. For those who cannot get to camp with the rest of their Pack, It is each pack's responsibility to guide their late arrivals to the First Aid Station for Medical check-in and the Waterfront (If Opened) for swim checks.

CHECK-IN MATERIALS

These are the materials you need for registration:

1. A Roster of the boys and leaders attending camp.
2. Health forms for all boys and leaders. The **BSA Class 1 (or 3 if over 40)** medical form is required for attendance for camp. The **BSA requires** that the **Class 3 medical form has a valid Doctor's signature. This Medical is only good for one year from the date of the Physical.** Please verify the validity of the form for the time the registered adult is at camp.

Refund Policy

Individual refund requests from the family must be coordinated with the unit treasurer or unit Chairperson. Refund requests will be entertained by the Council Camping Committee if the request is in writing and postmarked no later than August 10, 2009. All refund requests will be considered on an individual basis and no refund is guaranteed, if the refund request is approved, Rainbow Council will send the refund check to the unit leader. Refund requests received postmarked after August 10, 2009, will have a max of 70% of the fee reimbursed. Send your refund request to:

MEDICAL/SWIM CHECKS

Medical and swim check will be scheduled at check-in. The swim check will determine all campers' swim skills. (There are three skill groupings: Non-Swimmer, Beginning Swimmer, and Swimmer. Have your swim suits available when you come to check-in.

Medical Forms & Evaluations – Every Scout and Leader going to camp MUST, upon Arrival, present a completed Class 1 medical record. Each Scout or Leader is given a recheck upon entering camp; Full examinations are not available at camp. Class 3 medical is required for those over 40 years of age.

The Camp Health Officer will be available for all emergencies. All treatments for minor injuries **Will be administered by the First Aid Officer.** Medical rechecks are performed at an appointed check in time before the Scouts are allowed to proceed to the lake for swim checks. Arrangements have been made with a nearby hospital to accommodate any cases needing hospitalization. The Camp Director, Unit Leader, and Camp Health Officer will make the decisions concerning these cases if and when they arrive. **HEALTH AND DISABILITY INSURANCE IS NOT FURNISHED AT CAMP.**

Be sure to get insurance information from your Scout's parents before you come to camp.

FOOD SERVICE

A very important element to a successful session at camp is a menu of well-balanced, appetizing meals. Rainbow Council meets these criteria by serving meals which exceed the Federal Child Nutritional Recommendations. Therefore, you can be assured that all meals at Rainbow Council Camp will continue to meet high expectations. We take great pride in our food service for both quality and quantity. Our expectations are higher than most camps and this is reflected in the positive comments made by campers and by the number of repeat campers we receive.

Individuals requiring special diets due to religious beliefs or medical reasons Must contact the Camp Director in writing at least two weeks prior to the beginning of their scheduled camp session.

All Scouts and Leaders are expected to be clean and neat at meals. Field Uniforms are expected at breakfast and dinner. Lunch meal attire is whatever the boys and leaders are wearing while in sessions. Swimming trunks and hats are not permitted to be worn in the camp dining hall.

*****Leaders are reminded that it is against BSA National Camping Standards as well as against current Illinois State Health Department rules to keep perishable food at individual campsites.*****

Arrangements can be made with the Dining Hall staff for the storage of limited amounts of perishable food items. **There will be no exceptions to this health and safety standard.** Failure to abide by this policy may result in forfeiture of the camping fees paid and a possible expulsion from our camp.

SPECIAL PROGRAM FEATURES

ORIENTATION

Each group, upon arrival will be assigned a campsite and a guide. The guide is responsible for assisting the group by giving a tour of the camp, helping the group set up their campsite, and guiding the group through the medical and swim checks. More than one group (Pack, Den, or patrol) may be assigned to the same campsite. We will not assign to any campsite more people than it will accommodate. *Units that wish to camp together should contact the camp leadership with that request prior to arrival at camp.*

DINNER ON ARRIVAL DAY

On the day of arrival a meal will be served from 5:30-6:30 pm. The style will be more on the picnic or on the go style to allow for eating in the Dining tent or taking it back with you to finish campsite set up.

OPENING NIGHT CAMPFIRE

The Camp Staff will organize the opening campfire. They will entertain the Scouts with songs, skits, jokes, stories, etc. Your group may want to have a quiet campfire at your campsite after the opening ceremony before they retire for the night.

FLAG CEREMONIES

Camp is the ideal location for boys to learn and practice flag-handling skills. The staff will perform the flag ceremony on the day of arrival. The campers will have the chance to do all other flag ceremonies. The staff is happy to assist the campers and their leaders with practicing and understanding the parts of the ceremony.

TRADING POST

The camp maintains a Trading Post for the convenience of the campers. The Trading Post carries items such as candy, ice cream soft drinks, craft items, and sundries. Scouts may also purchase equipment such as knives, compasses, canteens, camp hats and camp shirts. The Trading Post operates on cash only basis. The hours of operation will be posted. Past experience has proven that each Scout will spend approximately \$30.00 to \$35.00 during a session at camp.

QUARTERMASTER

Equipment items such as brooms, rakes, shovels, etc. may be checked out from the Quartermaster. Items must be returned in good condition by 10:00 a.m. on Sunday. Your unit will be charged an appraised value for all lost, stolen or broken items. A price list will be available in the Quartermaster's building and the Camp Office for Leaders to review.

WHAT EVERY PARENT SHOULD KNOW

We encourage you to Pack Smartly! Invite an experience Scout to help your Den or Scout Pack. Roads are subject to be closed due to weather events. We encourage you to pack your unit equipment and personal gear in a few vehicles as possible. Also as a reminder Scouts may also be walking to their site. The use of carts, wagons and other hauling devices might be a good idea. You may not get to drive to your site, be prepared to haul in your gear.

ITEMS TO LEAVE AT HOME:

MARK ALL EQUIPMENT AND GEAR

We suggest that each item of clothing and equipment be labeled with the Scout's name, address, and Pack number.

** National Standards require that each camper is provided with at least thirty (30) square feet of tent space for his person and gear. Please make sure your tents are adequately sized before coming to camp. Additional square footage can be in the form of a second "storage" tent, if necessary.*

PACK OR DEN EQUIPMENT

Equipment necessary for an enjoyable stay for you pack or den should include:

Resident Camp Tips

1. Resident camp is NOT an advancement mill where you pay a fee and get your advancements automatically. Instead, camp offers advancement as one portion of the overall program.
2. Your campsite is your home for the session so work at making it comfortable by bringing banners and flags to dress it up as well as lawn chairs and other "comfort enhancers".
3. You should schedule time for rest! That's right. Too often, you do not take time to sit and enjoy the beauty around you at camp. Don't keep such a pace that you miss the trees, the nature, and the clean, fresh air.
4. Top Packs show spirit--the Pack that comes to camp with ideas and spirit and challenges the other Packs make the rest of the camp come alive. Bring your Pack and Den cheer to camp and show everyone that you're number one.
5. **BE FLEXIBLE.** During each session, many Scouts attend camp, and while the staff is there to meet everyone's needs, we all must practice the Scout Law in camp when dealing with others.
6. Communicate. If you have a special need or want to do something spectacular, tell us about it, and we'll give it our best shot.
7. We want to make this the best camp in the state. If you have any suggestions, we'll gladly listen to you and your ideas.
8. Advise Scouts to leave valuables with a leader. Watches, spending money, etc. should not be left in the swimming areas or in an unattended campsite. Forewarned is forearmed!
9. Weather is one aspect that we cannot control. Please be prepared to carry (walking & carrying) in equipment if roads have to be closed due to inclement weather. The decisions will be made daily about road conditions by the Resident Camp Staff.

CAMP RULES:

The principles of the Scout Oath are the guiding principles of the Rainbow Council Camp program. The following rules have been established for the health, safety and protection of all Scouts and Leaders attending camp.

1. All firearms are to be left at home. The camp will provide BB guns and archery equipment at the field sports area. The use of personal equipment is strongly discouraged.
2. Alcoholic beverages illegal drugs and fireworks are not permitted in any Scout camp. Possession or use of them on Camp property will be cause to remove the person from camp with no refund of camp fees. A visit from the Sheriff would ruin anyone's week.
3. Self-contained stoves and lanterns may be used, but not within ten (10) feet of any structure, including tents.
4. A NO SMOKING policy is in effect in camp. There is one designed smoking area, during your stay. The BSA Policy is that you should never smoke in front of the boys while at ANY Scout activity.
5. Cash/Valuables are the responsibility of each Pack. Suggest that many valuables be left at home. It will help the Trading Post operation if you suggest that the Scouts only bring small denomination of bills to camp. Change is sometimes in short supply.
6. Damage to campsites and/or camp-owned equipment and buildings is not allowed. Campsites and/or camp-owned equipment used by a unit will be inspected by the Unit Leaders and the Staff guide when the unit checks in and when the unit checks out. Any damage other than ordinary wear will be charged to the unit.
7. Discipline and conduct of all campers is the responsibility of the unit leaders in camp with the Pack. This responsibility cannot be transferred to the Camp Staff. The Camp administration is ready and willing to help at any time in assisting unit leadership with problems which may arise. Unit Committees should make sure that their leadership understands their responsibility while they are in camp. Parents should also be made aware that the Camp Leadership has the authority of camp discipline.
10. Everyone who enters or leaves the camp during the camp session and after the unit has checked in MUST check with the Camp office and sign the "IN AND OUT LOG". Only when this procedure is followed do we know where to find you in case of an emergency.

11. All units are encouraged to bring their American and Pack flags to camp. Pack flags in camp help build spirit. Each unit will be given the opportunity to volunteer to conduct a camp-wide flag ceremony.
12. All Scouts camp in tents. Picnic tables are available for units. Latrine and washstands are available at each campsite.
13. **Units are expected to keep their latrine and campsite clean at all times.**
Your cooperation will help control flies, mosquitoes, and other pests. Please help keep the central camp area and all roadways and trails clean by having Scouts put candy wrappers, paper, bottles, etc. in the trash containers. Remind your Scouts that Scouts always leave areas better than they found them. All trash must be bagged. Trash bags are available through the Quartermaster. Full trash bags should be placed in the dumpsters and trash barrels in camp. It is the unit's responsibility to remove their trash from campsites.
14. No liquid fuel of any type may be stored in the campsites.
15. Sheath knives are not permitted in camp under any circumstances. This policy includes adults. Any Scout displaying a knife of any kind may be asked by Camp Staff to show his Whittlin' Chip. Care for verification of his knowledge of knife safety. Illegal knives will be collected and returned to a responsible adult at the end of the session.
16. Good Health and Safety practices will be expected at all times. Safety regulations as established by the National Camp Standards will be observed at all areas.
17. Transportation to and from camp are the responsibility of the individual units.
18. All motor vehicles must be parked in the parking lot. Unit trailers may be parked adjacent to the campsites. One vehicle will be permitted to take equipment to the campsite at check in time, if the road conditions allow.

OUR CAMP IS ONLY CERTIFIED SAFE WHEN ALL CAMPERS HONOR THE RULES.

General Precautions For West Nile Virus and Lyme Disease

The Grundy Health Department encourages everyone to take personal precautions against West Nile Virus (carried by Mosquitoes) and Lyme Disease (transmitted by ticks). Use an insect repellent containing DEET (N-diethyl-m-toluamide). The EPA (Environmental Protection Agency) has noted individuals of all ages (2 years and older can use DEET based repellents with confidence in any concentration as long as labeled directions are followed. DEET does not kill mosquitoes it simply repels them. DEET makes mosquitoes "take a time out for about 3 hours." Insect repellents, ex: Yard Guard, should never be applied to humans. The higher the percentage of DEET an insect repellent contains the longer it lasts. Other precautions to avoid mosquito bites and tick attachment is to wear long shirts and long pants. For Ticks, stay out of bushy over-grown shady areas, and for mosquitoes stay indoors at dusk and dawn. About 1/4 mile past the entrance to the Collins Power Station, turn left on to Winterbottom Road. You will be traveling south on Winterbottom Road for about 1 1/3 miles. Winterbottom ends at the entrance to RSR.

From Illinois Route 47: South of Morris and approximately 1/3 mile south of the Illinois River, turn left to go east onto Pine Bluff Road. Just south of the Collins Power Station, turn right to go south on Winterbottom Road. Winterbottom ends at the entrance to RSR.
