



ROLL BACK MALARIA IN THE WHO AFRICA REGION

. What is Roll Back Malaria (RBM)?

Roll Back Malaria, popularly known as RBM, is a global partnership initiated by the World Health Organization (WHO), United Nations Development Program (UNDP), United Nations Children's Education Fund (UNICEF) and the World Bank (WB) in 1998. It seeks to work with governments, other development agencies, Non Governmental Organizations (NGOs), and private sector companies to reduce the human and socio-economic costs of malaria.

2. What are the Interventions that can Roll Back Malaria?

The four major interventions that can roll back malaria are: (i) providing the right drugs at the right time; (ii) promoting insecticide treated mosquito nets; (iii) protecting pregnant women; and pre-empting epidemics. In this issue, we shall tackle "providing the right drugs at the right time".

3. Providing the right drugs at the right time

Malaria can kill a child within hours of the first fever, and in many areas, levels of infection are high and rising. Against a background of such intense threat, rapid access to effective anti-malarial drugs is a matter of life and death for millions of families. For decades Chloroquine (CQ) has been the drug in use but parasite resistance has now rendered CQ ineffective in most parts of Africa. Many countries have seen a significant rise in malaria deaths, and some have already turned to other low cost alternative Sulfadoxine-Pyrimethamine (SP). Already there are signs that SP, too, is losing its power. WHO currently recommends combination therapy with Artemisinin-based Combination Therapies (ACTs) for treatment of uncomplicated malaria in Africa. The combination drugs recommended based on scientific evidence and potential for wide-scale deployment are: (i) Artemether-lumefantrine (Coartem); (ii) Artesunate plus Amodiaquine; (iii) Artesunate plus SP; and (iv) Amodiaguine plus SP. Although the cost (\$0.70 - 2.8 per adult course) puts them beyond health budgets of most countries, some countries have begun to access funds from Global Funds on AIDS, Tuberculosis and Malaria (GFATM) to purchase commodities such as anti-malarial drugs. The funding and delivery of effective drugs, especially to the women and young children most at risk is now a matter of urgency across Africa. The map below provides information on prevalence and spread of CQ resistance in the WHO Africa Region.



APRIL FOOLS DAY

"FOOLS" IGNORED THE NEW CALENDAR

What is April Fools Day and how did it begin? Well, that is a very good question. The origin of this holiday is rather uncertain. However, the common belief holds that during the reformation of the calendar the date for the New Year was moved from April 1st to January 1st.

During that time in history there was no television and no radio so word spread slowly. There were also those who chose to simply ignore the change and those who merely forgot.
