## Leadership Is For You

### Leadership Development Committee

At each district workshop in the spring, a representative from the Leadership Development Committee will challenge leaders to reflect on their actions in the past and to plan for the future.

The challenge for the biennium is to educate state and chapter leaders so that they create a productive environment for members.

For the past century, Peter Drucker, who died at the age of 95 on November 11, 2005, was the leading management thinker for businesses and organizations such as schools (Thurm & Lublin, 2005).

In an examination of his theory, these specific principles apply to Alpha Eta State's organization and operation:

1. No organization can survive if it needs geniuses or superwomen to manage it. It must be organized so as to produce under leadership composed of average human beings. That is the reason Delta Kappa Gamma's founders set the organization upon committee structure or participatory management.
2. Organizations should articulate a clear purpose with specific, measurable goals. In recent bienniums, the state organization and all chapters developed a strategic plan. Currently, all committees are encouraged to state their objectives before the committee begins its work for the year. Management by objectives keeps leaders in step with the strategic plan.

3. Plans are only good intentions unless they immediately develop into hard work. Written plans are useless unless they become operational.
4. Leaders should follow effective action with quiet reflection. From the reflection will come even more effective action. In Delta Kappa Gamma this process includes assessment, both self-assessment and group assessment.
5. Non risk-takers generally make about the same number of mistakes (2) in a year as those who take risks. However, leaders who take risks move an organization forward.
6. The most important thing in communication is hearing what is NOT said. Good leaders listen to the spoken and unspoken word.
7. Time is the scarcest resource, and unless it is managed well, nothing else will be. The district workshops reach more members in a shorter period of time. However, they cannot be successful without the attendance of chapter officers and committee members.
8. Change is going to occur in the world and in Delta Kappa Gamma, so embrace the changes as positive. As the ethnicity

of teachers changes over the next decade, will the Society reflect those changes in membership in the organization?

Just as Peter Drucker affected leadership in organizations for a century, the committee expects to effect change for Alpha Eta State in this biennium. To meet this goal, however, each member must become an active leader in her role at the chapter or state level.

# HELP! EMERGENCY!

The Society's International Headquarters reports that the Emergency Fund needs the help of every chapter. The emergencies brought on by the hurricane disasters have depleted the Fund. Chapters, and individual members can replenish the Fund so that more "sisters" can be helped.

The Fund provides \$500 to each member who has suffered severe loss. Donations can be made through the local chapter or directly to the International office. Checks should be made out to "The Delta Kappa Gamma Emergency Fund" and sent to Donna Wiles, 1328 Whippoorwill Dr., West Columbia, SC 29169.

Over \$167,000 has been sent to victims of Katrina, Rita, and Wilma. Requests are still coming in, but the Fund is not sufficient to meet them.

The recipients are sincerely grateful. Some of the responses follow:

"After losing almost everything, it was such a wonderful surprise to receive this check in the mail. This makes me so proud to belong to this wonderful Society"--Texas.

"Though Hurricane Katrina ravaged our homes and ripped our household goods from underneath us, she has also taught us about the love and compassion of friends and strangers"--Mississippi.

"I have been a member since 1962 and never dreamed I would be applying for help--I know that this Society does care about me"--Mississippi.

## Biloxi Testimony

Diane Taylor of Alpha Theta responded to the need in Mississippi. The following narrative excerpts describe her experience:

"One week early in October, I went to Biloxi to help with Katrina relief. When we arrived, we set up a tent for sleeping in a city park. The area had been under eight feet of water, and the dirt kept yielding items such as broken glass.

"There were 100 to 150 volunteers working and living at the facility where I was. Some were there for months; some, for a few days. For this number there were only four commodes and six showers. Large generators were going 24 hours a day, so there was a steady hum. Ice was a luxury.

"My job was to register people to receive items from the mountains of donated stuff. Their stories brought tears to my eyes. We provided hot meals to anyone who came as well as staples.

"The van we drove to Biloxi developed a problem and needed a new alternator. A lady and I went off to get one. Going off to get the alternator meant two women over 50 rode to a neighboring town with two much younger men in a car with no back windshield. We rode 30 minutes or more to find an automotive store open. Many buildings were still standing but had nothing inside.

"One highlight of the trip was having dinner with a Vietnamese Catholic priest at a Chinese restaurant. The best part of this volunteer effort was meeting the people and the other volunteers from Canada, NY, NC, etc.. The worst part was the power struggle going on between organizations that were supposed to be there to help.

"After my naive thoughts before actually being there, I now believe there will be work to do for months, even years. In November my son returned from a similar trip. His group worked to tear down damaged houses. The effect on him is obvious. One cannot see that much destruction from wind and water without being affected.

"The need continues to be great. The Society needs to respond in any way possible to help."

# The Order of the Rose

### Q: What is the Order of the Rose?

A: The Order of the Rose gives recognition to persons who make a contribution of \$1000 to the Auld-Murdock Headquarters Fund.

### Q: Do you mean I have to “buy” myself an honor?

A: No, no, no. A contribution to the Headquarters Fund is interpreted as your way of saying, “this place is important to me, to my chapter, and to Alpha Eta State! I want to insure that it is kept in tip-top shape.”

### Q: What recognition is given to a donor?

A: An article about the person and her contributions to the Society is published in the *Digest*. In addition, the individual receives a certificate and has her name engraved on a plaque in the Headquarters Building.

### Q: Can a chapter receive the same recognition?

A: The honor is for individuals. However, chapters may participate by honoring one of their members who has made significant contributions to the Society at any level.

### Q: Must the full amount be paid in one contribution?

A: It certainly can be paid in full. Annual minimum contributions of \$100 may also be made. When the total is reached, the individual is recognized in the Order of the Rose.

### Q: How is a contribution made?

A: Contribute simply by sending a check made payable to Alpha Eta State to Donna Wiles, 1328 Whippoorwill Dr., West Columbia, SC 29169, earmarked for Order of Rose/Auld-Murdock Headquarters Fund.

The Alpha Eta State Executive Board will meet March 18, 2006, at the Embassy Suites in Columbia. The board meeting will begin at 10:30 a.m. with lunch at 12:30 p.m.

All Society members are welcome at this meeting. The voting members of the executive board are the elected state officers, past state presidents, chapter presidents, and district directors. Committee chairmen, ex-officio members without vote, will need to attend in order to give their annual reports, which should be no longer than three minutes. If a chapter president cannot attend she should have someone to represent her.

Chapter presidents, state committee chairmen, district directors, and state officers are reminded to write brief one page reports related to the year's work and send one copy to Linda Heckle, state executive secretary, by March 1 so the executive board packets can be prepared for distribution at the meeting.

The Alpha Eta State Executive Board shall "act in the interim between state conventions upon matters requiring immediate decisions" (*Alpha Eta State Bylaws*, Article VIII, Section 1.B.8.). If any member knows of business that falls under this category, she should notify the state president immediately.

Would you like to honor excellence that reflects the people, programs and projects of your chapter or of Alpha Eta State? If so, you are encouraged to apply for display space at the convention.

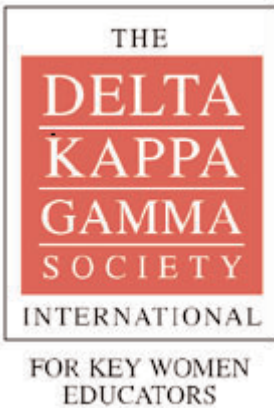
