Zoom Birding in South Africa

Purple punk Louries, Secretaries, Bustards, Rollers, and Bee Eaters. These and many other birds of Kruger National Park in South Africa will be on display in a slide presentation by avid birder and photographer Joe Conrad at the Minneapolis Audubon Chapter's meeting on February 5th.

Joe shot the photos digitally and his presentation will include discussing how to use a digital camera as a complement to binoculars, or even as a possible replacement in the quest for bird identification.

A highlight will be several photos showing Kruger Park's vulture culture—which ones are the biggest and baddest, or the most sophisticated? You will be surprised to learn the identity of the entrée upon which the vultures were feasting on the day he photographed five different species in one photo. (See Joe's vulture verse on page four.)

Other photos include African versions of goshawks, eagles, jacanas, herons, kingfishers, as well as birds strictly of the Old World species such as the sweet little Blue Waxbill; even a mammal or two might slip into the presentation.

A longtime canoeist, Joe has made a gradual transition to birding over the past 25 years. He has been on three photo safaris to Kruger with parties from the nonprofit group, Wilderness Inquiry. He is retired from teaching chemistry at the University of Wisconsin at River Falls. Joe's photography began with a Kodak Brownie and in the half century since has included 35 mm SLRs and recently moved from "Point and Shoot" to digital SLR.

Wild Ones 2008 Native Plant Expo

Through the Eyes of Nature: The Birds' View of Landscaping

Saturday, February 23rd, 8:30 – 4:30 Radisson Hotel Roseville 2540 Cleveland Ave N. Roseville, MN

The 2008 Expo focuses on attracting birds to your yard by landscaping with native plants. It's a day-long event featuring two nationally-noted wildlife authors, additional workshops, demonstrations, and an array of local exhibitors.

Morning keynote speaker, author Mariette Nowak, will discuss the subject of her new book, *Birdscaping in the Midwest: A Guide to Gardening with Native Plants to Attract Birds*.

The featured afternoon speaker is **Carrol Henderson** from the Minnesota Department of Natural Resources Non-Game Wildlife Program. Author of the classic, *Landscaping for Wildlife*, he will describe how migrating birds move through our region, how landscaping with native plants can provide them with food and shelter, and how reducing exterior lighting can aid their migration.

Additional presenters will address topics such as creating winter habitat for birds, planting bio-hedges, and introducing water features into your yard and gardens to attract birds. Over thirty local exhibitors will join us to discuss their efforts and interest in birding and native landscaping.

The Audubon Chapter of Minneapolis was saddened to hear of the passing of Bud Pyne in mid-November. Bud was president of the chapter in the mid 80's and was very active for many years. Our thoughts go out to his friends and family.

The 108th Christmas Bird Count was held December 15th, 2007. The weather was good and temperatures were moderate. Thirty-three participants included several first-timers. They drove 426 miles and walked 24 miles to observe 5,438 birds and 36 species. The total number of birds counted was down from last year, most likely due to the heavy snow layer. Look for the date of next year's Count!

Great Backyard Bird Count

On February 15- 18, Audubon and the Cornell Lab of Ornithology are having their 11th Annual Great Backyard Bird Count.

This is citizen science! You don't need to do anything to advance-register, just select a site (probably your own backyard) and count the number of birds you see. Note each species and the largest number you see at any one time. Then, at the end of the day, report your results via the internet at the GBBC website. Winter Birding

This may be a year to remember for seeing many of the northern birds that are infrequently seen in the metro area or in central Minnesota. There have been many reports of flocks of snow buntings seen in central Minnesota, so look for them in the open fields around the metro area this winter.

Look for boreal chickadees this winter in the Mille Lacs and McGregor areas as well as the North Shore. Also, check for black-backed and three-toed woodpeckers in those areas. There seems to be more reports of northern shrikes this year, too.

Keep those feeders stocked and you may see something unusual this winter!
