# March Program

The Audubon Chapter of Minneapolis' membership has been stable for the last five years. We draw a majority of the members from the near-Minneapolis suburbs, but we see very few minorities attending our programs. We have had three presenters this season from minority communities and will try to have more in the future. The rising percentage of minorities in the state indicates that Audubon needs to do more to get involved with its communities. It is our future! We need them [minorities] to accomplish our environmental

goals over the long haul.

The Chapter has begun a mentoring program at a school with a large minority enrollment. We need to expand this mentoring to other schools in the Minneapolis area. We believe this will provide the base for giving these children a contact with nature which we believe is vital—even in the inner city-if they are to grow up as



healthy and mentally- balanced individuals, and to pass onto them our goals for protecting habitat, birds, and other living creatures, including humans. We feel this will help us spread nature-nurturing (birding) from the children to their parents and ultimately to the children's children. This outreach will help to build the network needed to save the habitat so vital to our survival.

We need your help. We need to mentor more schools, and we would like you to volunteer to give presentations to a school about birds and their habitat, or just lead field trips for the children in the school.

Our goal is to have a network of school mentors helping teachers with the Audubon message of conserving and restoring natural ecosystems, focusing on birds and other wildlife and their habitats for the benefit of humanity and the earth's biological diversity. # **Designing a Duck Stamp**

Joe Hautman of Plymouth recently was named winner of his third Federal Duck Stamp contest with his exquisite painting of Northern Pintails. Joe will tell us all about it in his presentation titled, "Designing a Duck Stamp."

From an early age. Joe loved to draw and paint. He was exposed to the arts by his mother, Elaine, a trained artist. His father was an avid hunter and a collector of duck stamps. Joe's artistic interests took a backseat during his academic career as he studied physics at the University of Minnesota, and eventually earned a Ph.D. in Theoretical

At the urging of his younger brothers, Robert and Jim, both of whom had won Duck Stamp competitions. Joe also entered the Federal Duck Stamp contest. While working on postdoctoral research at the University of Pennsylvania, he painted a Spectacled Eider in his spare time and won the 1991 contest. This provided an incentive to turn professionally to painting.

In 2001 Joe won the federal contest for a second time with a painting of Black Scoters. After sitting out from the contest for the required three years, Joe entered the competition again and in 2007 he won the contest after an exciting three -way tie-breaking vote!

Joe now paints full time at his studio in Plymouth, Minnesota. His work features a variety of North American animals. as well as wildlife from around the world. He has designed conservation stamps for New Jersey, Connecticut, South Carolina, Texas and Minnesota. His artwork has also helped to raise conservation funds through projects with Ducks Unlimited, Delta Waterfowl, the United Nations, and many other conservation organizations. # Birds in Flight

Birds in Flight is Carrol Henderson's first book not published by the Minnesota DNR. Being a retired scientist, I found the book to be a very good read for the nonscientist with enough technical information to keep me interested.

His photos of birds demonstrating the principles of flight are outstanding. It left me wanting more of them, but I understand the need to limit the size of the book to make it publishable at a reasonable price. His pictures of feathers, wings and tails were so informative that it left one wanting to get out there with binoculars to observe birds flying, landing and taking off. The explanations of why a loon does the belly landing and how a large bird like the Great Blue Heron can land in a tree were very informative.

My quibble with the book is the delay I had to accept before I got to the real subject matter in chapter two. Not that the first chapter was uninteresting but in my mind it should have been an epilogue. It would have given the reader that little extra that one desires after reading a good book.
