ENHANCEMENT PROJECTS CONTINUE **Computer lab Dream Soon to be Reality**

Ever since the celebration of the 100th year of existence of St. Joseph High School in 1997 the Alumni body has been contributing to the restoration of their alma mater to its former glory. The contributions to the physical enhancement of the school building and it's surroundings thus far have included the complete renovation of the electrical and plumbing systems of the school building, the securing of the library, the completion of the fencing of the compound and the restoration of the school grounds. The works to date have totaled approximately G\$6.5 million.

This effort to improve the quality of education delivered at St. Joseph High continues. In August of 2003 work was completed on the rebuilding of the northern portion of the fencing of the school's compound. Also, over the past months work commenced on the refurbishing of the Food and Nutrition Laboratory and great strides were made towards the establishment of a computer laboratory within the school.

Fence

The reconstruction of the fence was completed to the tune of almost G\$2.9

million and was financed by the alumni body, both local and overseas. The bulk of the funds, US\$10,000 was contributed by the US chapter. The Canadian chapter contributed US\$5,000 and the local chapter G\$50,000. The staff and students of the school have expressed their appreciation for the added security the fence now provides.

Food and Nutrition Laboratory

The Food and Nutrition Laboratory has gone through a first phase of renovations in which its interior was given a facelift and the counters, cupboards and drawers were repaired. This project was completed at a cost of G\$250,000 and was funded by Banks DIH through the school and the local alumni association. Banks DIH provided the school with G\$150,000 and the local alumni the remainder. The local alumni have promised a further \$100,000 towards the replacing of the stoves in the laboratory.

Computer Laboratory

THE WORK OF SHARON FRAITES

Sharon Fraites (Tulloch), one of Guyana's top fabric and garment designers, says that her involvement in the craft had very humble beginnings. While attending St. Joseph High in the 1970s she never placed much emphasis on art. Her encouragement to enter into the craft came from a friend residing in Trinidad who persuaded her to begin designing thighs and t-shirts for adults. Being married and a housewife at the time she started painting designs onto garments for her family and close friends.

As her skills in the craft developed she decided to venture out to a wider client base and participated in Guyexpo. For this exhibition she created several adult and children pieces utilising local cotton and cotton twill fabric. Her designs were well received, especially the children pieces, which were inspired by storybook characters. This exposure resulted in many persons placing orders for pieces of her work. Many persons began to bring their outfits for her to add her touch.

With more experience and a steadily growing client base Sharon expanded her operations hiring a dressmaker so as to give persons a wider choice and started her adult line. She called her establishment **Cotton Creations**.

Over the years she has participated in many exhibitions and shows for charity as well as for fundraising. Under her belt she has the first, second and third runners-up prizes in the Junior category of the Mother and Daughter pageant. Cotton Creations also featured in the Passion and Purity show in which most of Guyana's top designers participated. She has never taken the opportunity to be a part of any show or exhibition overseas, "Maybe later," she says "not right now." She is comfortable serving her local clients, some of whom sometimes send pieces of her work overseas. Sharon also contributes to the staging of the Miss St. Joseph High School Pageant.

Sharon says she loves putting her clients in clothes in which they are comfortable and appreciates their honesty when it comes to what they think about her work. She tries her best to please them and to ensure that they are satisfied. "It is not an easy task", she says. Her designs are simple and not loud and

the styles are realistic and can be easily and comfortably worn. Her favourite designs are those of Amerindian motifs.

She operates out of a front room in her home at 55 New Garden Street Queenstown and dreams to have a more spacious place with a display area for her to exhibit her work. She also hopes to be able to offer her clients a cup of coffee or tea or a glass of drink and a snack while they wait. Working from home is sometimes stressful with her cute little blond haired, brown-eyed son,

The Historical Success of St. Joseph High School

Part 1 - 1897 to 1959

Reprinted from the Reunion 2003 Magazine

"The Sisters shall feel convinced that no work of charity can be more productive of good to the society or more conducive to the happiness of the poor than the careful instruction of women."

This was the conviction that led the Sisters of Mercy, a community of Roman Catholic nuns, to establish St. Joseph's Mercy High School in 1897, three years after they launched their mission in Guyana.

The School began with secondary education classes given to a few girls in the Sisters' Community Room at Dettering Hall, a former Dutch residence, located in the Charlestown ward of Georgetown. In 1899, it became a Boarding School, with Mother Columbia, a trained dramatist, as its first principal. She served for twenty-three years (1897-1920), and, during her tenure, the school produced some of the best dramatic performances in the country.

She was succeeded by Guyanese-born Sister Gabriel Fernandes, who engineered the expansion of the school with the construction of a new two-storied building at the corner of Charles and Homes Streets in 1925. The new building brought space for more classrooms and a separate Drama hall, where many excellent performances were staged.

To cope with the rapid growth of the School, the Sisters appealed to the Mercy Center in the United States for help, and, in 1935, Sisters Mary Consolata Muldowney, Austin and Clarita were the first American Sisters to join the staff at St. Joseph's. At the same time, the Boarding facility was closed to make room for the increased number of day students.

In 1938, under the direction of Sister Mary Elizabeth Robinson, a commercial (business) department was added. The demand for this specialty grew so rapidly that an annex was built in 1939 to accommodate these students. The new three-storied structure also accommodated an Infant School department, which admitted both boys and girls. By 1939, St. Joseph High School was recognized by the University of London as a secondary school.

In 1944, the celebration the Sisters celebrated their fiftieth anniversary since

their arrival in Guyana, and this event was made memorable with the award of the coveted British Guiana Scholarship to a St. Joseph High School student, Elsa Gouvvia.

As the demand for more classes grew, more expansion took place at the school. In 1950, an Art department was introduced. With all these developments, the School did not receive any financial aid from the government. One of its main source of fund was the income generated from its annual "Tour Around the World" fair held around mid-year.

At this fair, cultural displays and tastes of various countries, such as Ireland, England, Spain, India and China, were presented.

Another important milestone in the School's history was the establishment of the Old Girl's Association in 1953. The three-fold mission of the organization was:

- To promote a bond of friendship among its members and loyalty to the School;
- To help in the progress of their Alma Mater by providing scholarships among other things;

- To provide for the spiritual and social aspect of its members.

Among the many activities organize by the Association were weekend spiritual retreats, garden parties and the publication of magazines. Funds were also raised for the School's Building Fund. In 1956, the organization granted its first award. This was given to the School's best all-round student, and won by Josphine DeAbreu, a Third Form student at the time. The Association also presented a Public Address system to the school, which was especially welcomed for Assembly.

After thirty-five years of dedicated service, Sister Gabriel retired in 1954. She was succeeded by Sister Mary Consolata Muldowney.

During Sr. Consolata's tenure at the helm, a Board of Governors for the School was established; this was in 1955. Its first members were Sisters Consolata and Elizabeth Robinson, Patricia O'Connor, Aldora D'Ornellos, Celestine DeFreitas and Carlos Gomes. During this same year, Home Economics classes were introduced under the direction of Sister Margaretta Phillips, and at this juncture, enrollment

computer laboratory with in the school was prepared in August of last year. The proposed facility will house twenty workstations in an air-conditioned environment and is estimated to cost approximately G\$6 million. The alumni body, local and overseas, and the school have pledged to cooperate on the establishment of the facility.

Locally, fund raising has commenced with the school and the local alumni association staging two Miss St. Joseph High School Pageants, one in 2003 and another this year. A donation box has also been setup in the school.

During efforts to secure sponsorship for this years pageant copies of the proposal for the project were sent to local companies. A few promising responses were received. The most promising response was

received from Demerara Distiller Limited (DDL). The company has shown an interest in funding the project in its entirety. Already official of the company have visited the school and have looked at the proposed location of the laboratory and have prepared detailed estimates which are being looked at by the company.

DDL has promised to deliver final word on how it intends to go about the project shortly. It is hoped that it will be completed by the end of this year.

In anticipation of the establishment of the facility the school has secured the services of a competent Information Technology teacher who commenced classes in the just concluded school year. The classes thus far have been purely theoretical but arrangements are being put in place for the commencement of the teaching of practical aspects of the subject until the laboratory is completed.

Life Skills Education

Character Building - Thought Power

Excerpts from an Essay written by philosopher Ralph Waldo Trine in 1899.

UNCONSCIOUSLY we are forming habits every moment of our lives. Some are habits of a desirable nature; some are those of a most undesirable nature. Some, though not so bad in themselves, are exceedingly bad in their cumulative effects, and cause us at times much loss, much pain and anguish, while their opposites would, on the contrary, bring as much peace and joy, as well as a continually increasing power. Have we it within our power to determine at all times what types of habits shall take form in our lives? In other words, is habit-forming, character-building, a matter of mere chance, or have we it within our own control? We have, entirely and absolutely. "I will be what I will to be," can be said and should be said by every human soul.

After this has been bravely and determinedly said, and not only said, but fully inwardly realized, something yet remains. Something remains to be said regarding the great law underlying habit-forming, character-building; for there is a simple, natural, and thoroughly scientific method that all should know. A method whereby old, undesirable, earth-binding habits can be broken, and new, desirable, heaven lifting habits can be acquired, a method whereby life in part or in its totality can be changed, provided one is sufficiently in earnest to know and, knowing it, to apply the law.

Thought is the force underlying all. And what do we mean by this? Simply this: Your every act - every conscious act - is preceded by a thought. Your dominating

thoughts determine your dominating actions. The acts repeated our own hands to determine exactly what thoughts we entertain. In the realm of our own minds we have absolute control, or we should have, and if at any time we have not, then there is a method by which we can gain control, and in the realm of the mind become thorough masters. In order to get to the very foundation of the matter, let us look to this for a moment. For if thought is always parent to our acts, habits, character, life, then it is first necessary that we know fully how to control our thoughts.

Here let us refer to that law of the mind which is the same as is the law in Connection with the reflex nerve system of the body, the law which says that whenever one does a certain thing in a certain way it is easier to do the same thing in the same way the next time, and still easier the next, and the next, and the next, until in time it comes to pass that no effort is required, or no effort worth speaking of; but on the opposite would require the effort. The mind carries with it the power that perpetuates its own type of thought, the same as the body carries with it through the reflex nerve system the power which perpetuates and makes continually easier its own particular acts. Thus a simple effort to control one's thoughts, a simple setting about it, even if at first failure is the result, and even if for a time failure seems to be about the only result, will in time, sooner or later,

bring him to the point of easy, full, and complete control. Each one, then, can grow the power of determining, controlling his thought, the power of determining what types of thought he shall and what types he shall not entertain. For let us never part in mind with this fact, that every earnest effort along any line makes the end aimed at just a little easier for each succeeding effort, even if, as has been said, apparent failure is the result of the earlier efforts. This is a case where even failure is success, for the failure is not in the effort, and every earnest effort adds an increment of power that will eventually accomplish the end aimed at. We can, then, gain the full and complete power of determining what character, what type of thoughts we entertain.

And here we must say a word regarding a certain great law that we may call the "law of indirectness." A thought can be put out of the mind easier and more

Ms. Sobers attended West Ruimveldt Primary and then East Ruimveldt Secondary Schools. While attending secondary school she was selected to attend training to become a Librarian. She attended Critchlow Labour College from where she graduated with a distinction in Industrial Relations. Following up on her training received while at secondary school, she attended a Ministry of Education organized training program aimed at training librarians for schools throughout Guyana. Upon completion of this program Ms. Sobers was placed at North Georgetown Secondary School where she gave nine years of service as Librarian before being transferred to St. Joseph High in 1994 to serve in the same capacity. Ms. Sobers has been serving SJH in a multifaceted way ever since.

Ms. Sobers says it has been a pleasure working with the Staff and Students at the school. She recognizes that there is a family like closeness within the institution and has always felt like an integral part of this family.

As the Librarian she enjoys assisting the students with research for their assignments, especially in her area of training, Social Studies. During the examination and registration periods she assists in the School's office. Ms. Sobers has also given her services to St. Joseph High in the preparation of students for participation in Impromptu Speaking, Dramatic Poetry and Elocution competitions both internal

There is almost never a SJH fund raiser in which Ms. Sobers does not play an integral part, as she was being interviewed for this article she was distributing tickets for the school's Bar-B-Que. She contributes greatly to staging of the school's pageant, encouraging the girls to participate and assisting in their preparation for the event, and is instrumental in the organization of aspects of the school's fair, notably the fashion show.

Ms. Sobers is the biological mother of two SJH alumni, Raynard and Rovain, but is also like a mother to many other students, past and present, of the institution. Some students, especially the females, are like her own kids to her and she does her best in guiding and advising them. She recounted one incident in which she had to counsel a student who was in a habit of going home very late in the evening and eventually moved from their parents' home. Ms. Sobers said she spoke with the Student and encourage them to do what was right. Today with a proud smile she reported that the student has returned home and shows great progress both at school and at home.

She says, "With children you do not criticize and condemn them, you talk with them and encourage them to change and then ask how they find it and you will know if they agree with you or not. If they don't agree with you try another angle but do not ridicule them. Parent also need to play their part and not leave it all to the teachers when the children come to school."

At home Raynard, the elder of her two sons, is a Peer Educator attached to Population Services International (PSI).

For him it is a pleasure to educate his peers about HIV/AIDS. He also acts in productions at the National Cultural Center. He however has been involved in a road accident and has a cast on his leg for some 4 months now. Rovain who has just completed his CXC examinations would like to become an accountant.

Even with all of the challenges she faces Ms. Sobers could not think of a bad day at St. Joseph. She has seen the school go through a lot of changes, one being the changing of three head teachers. For the Library she says it is in need of updated books and a computer with Internet access so that online research can be done. This she thinks will be of good use for both teachers and students.

With Ms. Dianne, as she is referred to by many students, around SJH is definitely a home away from home for many students. Her warm personality invites the best of those she interacts with.

successfully, not by dwelling upon it, not by, attempting to put it out directly, but by throwing the mind on to some other object by putting some other object of thought into the mind. This may be, for example, the ideal of full and perfect self mastery, or it may be something of a nature entirely distinct from the thought which presents itself, something to which the mind goes easily and naturally. This will in time become the absorbing thought in the mind, and the danger is past. This same course of action repeated will gradually grow the power of putting more readily out of mind the thought of drink as it presents itself, and will gradually grow the power of putting into the mind those objects of thought one most desires. The result will be that as time passes the thought of drink will present itself less and less, and when it does present itself it can be put out of the mind more easily each succeeding time, until the time

comes when it can be put out without difficulty, and eventually the time will come when the thought will enter the mind no more at all.

There is nothing more true in connection with human life than that we grow into the likeness of those things we contemplate. Literally and scientifically and necessarily true is it that "as a man thinketh in his heart, so is he." The "is" part is his character. His character is the sum total of his habits. His habits have been formed by his conscious acts; but every conscious act is, as we have found, preceded by a thought. And so we have it - thought on the one hand, character, life, destiny on the other. And simple it becomes when we bear in mind that it is simply the thought of the present moment, and the next moment when it is upon us, and then the next, and so on through all time.

had risen to about 620 students.

By this time, the Preparatory section was relocated to another building under the new name, Stella Maris. This made way for further development at St. Joseph High, and, in 1957, a Science department was added, with Sister Mary Emerentia Bowyer in charge. The main subjects taught were Biology and Health Education.

Towards the end of the decade, the Charlestown district was rezoned as an industrial site. This meant that the School had to be relocated. It was moved to Woolford Avenue, in the Thomas' Lands section, starting a new era for St. Joseph High School.

Constitution Watch

Committee

19. *The President, or in his/her absence, Vice-President, or failing them any member of the committee elected to the chair, shall preside at all meetings of the committee or the association, and shall regulate the proceedings. Where the decision on any motion or measure rests on votes being taken, and there is an equality of votes, he/she shall have a second casting vote.*

20. *If any member of the committee is absent from three consecutive meetings of the committee without being excused by them, or is absent from the country for more than six (6) months, or resigns and his/her resignation is accepted by the committee, his/her seat shall become vacant. The secretary shall report to the committee any such vacancy, and the committee shall have the power, subject to rule 17, to appoint any member of the association to such vacancy.*

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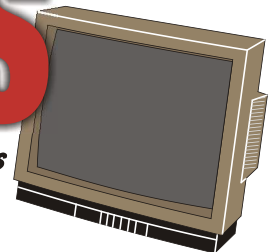
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
