## Tsunami Relief Project organized by the Colombo Malay Cricket Club (CMCC)

#### SUBMITTED BY MELATI WIJEWARDENE ON BEHALF OF HER MOTHER MARINA LYE

On 20<sup>th</sup> Feb. a group of us (15 ladies and 10 gents) from CMCC travelled to Hambantota via Ratnapura where we were warmly received by the President and members of the Ruhunu Malay Association. There, the ladies formed into groups of three and, armed with a female guide from the Ruhunu Malay Association, went to meet the widows affected by the recent Tsunami. Each group had a questionnaire to record details of the victims, their lost husbands and children, and their needs. Gift packs including cash were presented to each widow.

Based on the responses in the questionnaires it was decided to provide the following:

(a) Long term productivity assistance like **micro projects** to commence self-employment in sewing, preparing and marketing of home made products, etc.

(b) To start a **foster parent** scheme for children for education or up to employment stage.

#### Proposed relief projects for the victims at Hambantota

1) Women in Hiddha – After the four month period we intend getting all these women into one forum to discuss proposed plans for micro projects, and this would assist in the maintenance of the children.

2) Fishing – being the livelihood in the affected areas, we intend assisting in reviving this industry

3) Foster Parents – would be responsible to provide for education and other means that may be required from time to time until they get married or gain employment.

4) Funds - through donors and fund raising projects.

The total cost of the project would be 5.7 million (and the foster parents approx. Rs.5.0 million being a long term project costing Rs.60,000- monthly and assistance to be provided for 8 yrs in average has been taken into account).

On 20th March we made a second trip to Hambantota, this time via Galle. Enroute we placed an order at Matara for the manufacture of three fishing nets. On reaching Hambantota we had an interview with the fishermen, collected the details of each fisherman and their needs, and selected three of the most deserving who would receive the fishing nets on our next visit.

We then proceeded to Kirinda where we visited a **temporary housing project** of hundred dwellings made of timber and provided with electricity, water, common toilets and a few items of basic furniture. Here we met 10 widows and presented them with gift parcels including cash.

We also interviewed two children who had lost their fathers. Brig. Bohoran of the CMCC and another donor agreed to foster them, pledging to visit them every month and support them financially and otherwise till they gain employment or get married. These children are aged between six and eight years.

## Other projects carried out by Sri Lanka Malay Confederation (SLAMAC)

(There are nearly 84 Malay orphans in Hambantota and Kirinda)

- Sponsorship of 17 orphans by the Malaysian High Commissioner. All 17 are attending school and are looked after by relatives.
- A further number of orphans will be sponsored by SLAMAC via the Aalul Mahfil Association. Each orphan is to be given Rs.3,500 each initially and a further Rs.3,500 per family for 6 months.
- Assistance for further families will be sponsored in due course as more funds are donated by different organisations.
- Any organisation can now sponsor any number of orphans through SLAMAC for any period selected by them.

## HAMBANTOTA

The Malay Community in Sri Lanka and abroad have focused their attention on Hambantota, a littoral town located in the southern region of Sri Lanka. Hambantota was one of the many coastal towns that was affected by the tsunami.

Renowned for its salt pans, where a majority of Malays, beginning from their forefathers, had found employment, Hambantota suffered heavy casualties with a death toll of nearly 4500: 361 injured, 903 missing and 2234 families displaced. In addition 2303 homes completely damaged, 1744 houses partly damaged and 2 hotels, the Oasis and Peacock Beach Hotel, placed out of operation (statistics as at 23/1/05).

Malay Organisations in Sri Lanka, London, Canada and Australia are very concerned and perturbed by this calamity and have rendered a great deal of relief measures. Sri Lankan Australian Malay Association (SLAMA) in Sydney Australia has launched a "Tsunami Fund" and although SLAMA has a small membership around 60 families, it has been able to collect a tidy sum of money, which would be distributed among all those families who are in dire straits. The organisations in Sri Lanka are now involved in rehabilitation work.

Reverting to history, it is revealed that the Malays from the Indonesian Archipelago were the first in the Malay world to set foot on Sri Lankan soil. Their maritime contact gave rise to the port settlement of Hambantota when they were engaged in a flourishing spice trade with Arab merchants in East Africa and Madagascar. It is of historical importance to know that the Indonesian Mariners and Sailors on their return journey home on completion of their bartering and sale of spices at East Africa and Madagascar, they made it a regular practice to break journey at a cove bordering an inhabited coastal town. They grounded their Sampans in this cove and went ashore to replenish their stock of water and food. Some of the members of the crew remained behind in this town, which was named SAMPANTOTA. The word "SAMPAN" is a Chinese name for a boat/outrigger, which the Malay seafarers use very commonly. The word "TOTA" is a Sinhalese name for a Port. With frequent visits and passage of time, SAMPANTOTA was changed to its present name HAMBANTOTA.

The Dutch under their rule in Ceylon, brought in a group of Ambones from Central Malacca in East Indonesia. They belonged to a seafaring race who were masters of the sea. They were settled in Hambantota with their families. Lord Frederick North, the first British Governor of Ceylon in 1798, formed 2 Regimental Companies from the Ceylon Rifle Regiment, consisting of infirmed and invalid soldiers and transferred them to the convalescent camps in Hambantota. No sooner the soldiers were pronounced fit, they were sent to MAHAGAMPATU to develop the salt pans in this village. Two other settlements were opened, one in KIRINDE and the other in PALATUPANA and the Malays were deployed for work in the 2 salt pans in these 2 villages. Almost at the same time, Malay political exiles were also sent to Hambantota from Colombo to join their Malay comrades who were already there.

Malays who were not employed on the salt pans, followed agricultural pursuits, farming and fishing, while their womenfolk engaged themselves in rattan weaving, turning out dried fish and dried meat (Deng-Deng). They also turned out delicacies such as Dodhol, Cheena-Kuwe, Curd and Jaggery.

#### THE LATE MORANO BASIM AMIT



"WHO SEEKS FOR HEAVEN ABOVE TO SAVE HIS SOUL MAY HELP THE PATH BUT WILL NOT REACH THE GOAL, WHILE HE WHO WALKS IN LOVE MAY WANDER FAR, YET GOD WILL BRING HIM WHERE THE BLESSED ARE."

In the wake of the world's worst natural disaster, when Sri Lanka and many other Asian countries lay shattered to their core, an urgent message was received from Colombo, that Morano Amit, his wife and two daughters were among the many thousands who had fallen victims to the disastrous Tsunami tidal wave. The news was unbelievable and it took sometime for me to accept the position that tragedy had struck an innocent and peace-loving family. There are times in life when one feels bereft, dumbfounded and bewildered - this was how I felt.

The late Morano Amit was the eldest of three children of the late T.N.Y. Amit, formerly of George Stuart & Co Ltd. and Shireen Jaro Amit of Maharagama. He was 57 years old at the time of death.

An old boy of Carey College, Morano was a quiet lad, well disciplined and soft spoken. He had very few friends who shared these rare qualities. He was popular among his close relatives who treasured his friendship and honesty.

Leaving school, his instinct prompted him to seek employment so that he could contribute to the progress of his family. With an excellent command of the English language and a working knowledge of the official language, Morano accepted a secretarial appointment that enabled him to work full-time in the Supreme Court of Sri Lanka. He then found overseas employment and on completion of his tour of duty, returned to Sri Lanka and took up a permanent job in keeping with his years of experience. He joined the House of Parliament as a Hansard Reporter in 1977 and by year 2003, was elevated to the position of Editor. In the words of the Secretary General, I quote "His long years of experience had given him a good grasp of the practices and procedures of the Parliament, so much so that he hardly, if ever, needed my guidance in editing the speeches of the members of Parliament". The members of the entire Editorial staff held him in high esteem.

After an exhaustive search that lasted almost two weeks after the disaster, only Morano's body was found. Janaza took place on 8 January, 2005 at the Jawatte Muslim Burial Grounds, Colombo.

Morano is no more. He was a tower of strength to his family. He will be missed.

## **VETERAN SRI LANKAN MALAYS**

#### THE LATE DR. A. R. DEANE

## "Who can say that a life so rich in memories was incomplete"

The late Dr. Abdul Rasheed Deane has been described and accepted by the community as a dedicated Medical Practitioner, a sportsman, a devoted husband and father. He belonged to a distinguished Malay family. His father, the late A.A. Deane held a senior and coveted position of Chief Accountant in H.M. Customs, Colombo, during the colonial regime. He compiled the Jubilee Book of the Colombo Malay Cricket Club in 1924.

A product of Royal College and the Colombo Medical College, as a student Dr. Deane displayed a high intellect and a powerful retentive memory. He represented his Alma Mater in Cricket in the years 1936 and 1937.

On completing his MBBS and internship in government hospitals he commenced his medical practice at the Wattala Nursing Home, and later functioned as the Medical Officer of the Colombo Commercial Company, Hunupitiya. After some time he moved his residence over to Kompaniveediya where he established a Medical Clinic and Dispensary and attended to the medical needs of the residents of Kampong Kartel, the majority of whom were from the Malay community.

Like his grandfather and father, Dr. Deane identified himself in the activities of the Colombo Malay Cricket Club and the All Ceylon Malay Association. There were occasions when at 16 years he was called upon to play for the Malay Cricket team whenever there was a shortage of regular players.

In 1948 as a member of the Malay Cricket team he toured South India under the Captaincy of B.J.H. Bahar (snr.). He captained the C.M.C.C. Cricket team in the years 1957 and 1958 and was elected President of the C.M.C.C. in 1965 and 1966. After the formal opening of the new cricket grounds at Padang on 23<sup>rd</sup> Dec. 1961, a "home-and-home" cricket match was played between the "Past" and "Present" to mark the occasion. The "Past" team was captained by Dr. Deane and the "Present" team by Fareed Sabar. The highlight of the day's play was when Dr. Deane hit the first six and a boundary in his classic knock of 62 runs. For nearly 5 years, Dr. Deane was away in England, where he served as a Medical Officer in CELL BARNES Hospital, London. His patients, who came under his care were very appreciative of his medical attention and were impressed by his calm composure and patience. He was a popular figure among the staff of the Malaysian High Commission and the Indonesian Embassy and attended to their medical needs whenever necessary.

He had a heart that never hardened and a touch that never hurt. In appreciation of his many contributions and services to the C.M.C.C., SLMA and SLMA Rupee Fund, his portrait along with his grandfather's were unveiled in the pavilion of the C.M.C.C. on 12<sup>th</sup> Dec. 2003.
