- 1880 Alexander von Winiwarter (impacted choledocholithiasis)
- 1887 Monastryski (malignant obstruction)
- 1890 Ludwig Courvoisier (cholecystojejunostomy)
- 1909 Robert Dahl (hepaticojejunostomy)

ROUX-EN-Y BILIARY ENTERIC DRAINGE

- 1. Choledocholithiasis (Stones impacted in the ampulla)
- 2. Bile Duct Injury
- 3. Choledochal cysts
- 4. Locally advanced unresectable perihilar tumors
- 5. Distal cholangiocarcinoma (periampullary tumor)


Palliative Treatments

Biliary Stenting


Endoscopic or percutaneous transhepatic (unable or difficulty with the stent, dislodgement or blockage, recurrent obstruction, cholangitis)


Surgical Bypass

Cholecystojejunostomy Choledochojejunostomy Hepaticojejunostomy









Gastric outflow obstruction

up to one third of patients with unresectable tumors develop obstructive symptoms prior to death

Prophylactic gastrojejunostomy does not add to the morbidity or mortality for palliative surgery

Laparoscopic Cholecystojejunostomy combined with Gastrojejunostomy






Laparoscopic Choledochojejunostomy combined with Gastrojejunostomy
