My dad stood his watch in the jungles of 'Nam And now it is my turn and so, here I am.

I've not seen my own son in more than a while, But my wife sends me pictures, he's sure got her smile

Then he bent and he carefully pulled from his bag, The red white and blue... an American flag.

"I can live through the cold and the being alone, Away from my family, my house and my home, I can stand at my post through the rain and the sleet, I can sleep in a foxhole with little to eat, I can carry the weight of killing another or lay down my life with my sisters and brothers who stand at the front against any and all, to insure for all time that this flag will not fall."

"So go back inside," he said, "harbor no fright Your family is waiting and I'll be all right." "But isn't there something I can do, at the least, "Give you money," I asked, "or prepare you a feast? It seems all too little for all that you've done, For being away from your wife and your son."

For when we come home, either standing or dead,

### A SIMPLE, BLESSED EXAMPLE

In formally beatifying Mother Teresa, Pope John Paul II has bestowed the Church's formal recognition on one who in her years ministered to the destitute and multi-handicapped. By extension, he has also blessed all in this world who knew her or even enjoyed the blessing of a casual meeting with this amazing woman. To the former, she ministered to body and soul; to the latter, she elevated and inspired the soul and heart.

Blessed Teresa was remarkable for her faith in humanity and her respect for human life. No person was too destitute, too sick or disabled, too abandoned to escape he-r notice. In fact, it was their seemingly hopeless condition that drew her to the needy in the first place.

She began on the streets of Calcutta, but her ministry soon spread to the ghettos everywhere. To visit one of her hostels in person was to come face-to-face with human grief and human suffering in shocking proportions. But it was also to stand side-by-side with the most caring, the most unbelievably caring of persons.

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The Sisters of the Missionaries of Charity, the religious order that Blessed Teresa founded, mirror her concern in a wonderful, dare we say, almost miraculous manner. People look for the miracles of Mother Teresa to support her candidacy for sainthood. They need only look into the, eyes of her Sisters, the remarkable. women who are continuing her work right here in Brooklyn and throughout the world.

Or perhaps they can observe the inevitable evolution of those who visit one of her facilities. They come as visitors, even tourists. But they leave transformed by the experience in ways they cannot begin to describe. They have experienced a bit of heaven here on earth the wretched and the needy being transformed by angels.

Beatification is a formal Church procedure, complete with pomp and pageantry as only the Church can do it. In many ways, such ceremony is strangely out of tune with the simple virtue of the Sister being honored in this case. Yet it is appropriate that as we honor this special life on this special occasion, we draw attention to it as well, for it serves as an example for us all.

### MAY the EUCHARIST ALWAYS BE the CENTER of YOUR LIFE

VATICAN CITY, OCT 9, 2004 (VIS) - Today the Pope received a group of young people from the diocese of Rome who are participating in a mission, aimed at their peers, in preparation for the Year of the Eucharist, entitled "Jesus downtown." The youths are also taking part in a meeting of representatives of European youth groups of Eucharistic adoration.

These pastoral initiatives in which young people from Europe and the United States are participating, said the Holy Father, "introduce us in this special time of grace for the entire Church" to the Year of the Eucharist.

"Eucharist and mission are two inseparable realities. ... Authentic celebration and adoration of the Eucharist that does not lead to mission does not exist. At the same time, mission assumes another essential Eucharistic characteristic: union of hearts."

John Paul II expressed his hope to the youths that "this pastoral experience, which is an authentic school of communion and new evangelization, will continue and expand. I encourage you to continue so that the creativity and generosity that you demonstrate in

these days may become a stimulus for the entire Church of Rome to keep its missionary spirit alive."

The Pope gave the young people two instructions. "In the first place," he said, "love the Eucharist. Never get tired of celebrating and adoring the Eucharist, together with the entire Christian community, especially on Sunday. Know how to put it at the center of your personal and community life, so that communion with Christ may help you to carry out your courageous choices. In the second place, have missionary passion. Do not be afraid to bear witness to hope ... which has a specific name: Jesus Christ!"

"In order to facilitate young people's encounter with true Eucharistic spirituality, do not cease forming yourselves in the school of listening to the Word of God, prayer, and celebrating the sacraments. Always remember that the first place of evangelization is the human person. ... In this sense, I encourage the diocesan service for the youth ministry to study new proposals to create true schools of evangelization for young people."

The Holy Father thanked the young people "for what you are and for all that you do for Christ and the Church. I assure you that I remember you during Mass and Eucharistic adoration, something which I have done since I was young. I want you to know that I have always obtained great fruits, not only for me but also for all those whom Divine Mercy has entrusted to me."

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### YEAR of the EUCHARIST: SUGGESTIONS and PROPOSALS

VATICAN CITY, OCT 14, 2004 (VIS) - The Congregation for Divine Worship and the Discipline of Sacraments today published a document entitled "The Year of the Eucharist: Suggestions and Proposals," in answer to a idea put forth by Pope John Paul in his October 7 Apostolic Letter "Mane nobiscum Domine." Today's document, published in Italian, is expected to be available shortly in other major languages.

In Number 29 of "Mane nobiscum Domine," the Holy Father wrote:

"There is room here for any number of initiatives, according to the judgement of the Pastors of the particular Churches. The Congregation for Divine Worship and the Discipline of the Sacraments will not fail to provide some helpful suggestions and proposals. I do not ask, however, for anything extraordinary, but rather that every initiative be marked by a profound interiority. If the only result of this Year were the revival in all Christian communities of the celebration of Sunday Mass and an increase in Eucharistic worship outside Mass, this Year of grace would be abundantly successful. At the same time, it is good to aim high, and not to be content with mediocrity, since we know we can always count on God's help."

The text is divided into an Introduction, a Summary of the five Chapters (Frame of Reference, Worship Contexts, Lines of Eucharistic Spirituality, Pastoral Initiatives and Commitments and Cultural Paths), a list of documents and abbreviations used, the five Chapters and a Conclusion.

The Introduction notes that "barely a year after the conclusion of the Year of the Rosary, there is a new initiative of the Holy Father: The Year of the Eucharist from October 2004 to October 2005. There is continuity between these two initiatives and they are, in fact, within the framework of pastoral indications that the Pope gave to the Church with the Apostolic Letter 'Novo millennio ineuente', placing the face of Christ at the center of ecclesial commitments in the wake of Vatican Council II and the Great Jubilee."

"Now," continues the Introduction, "the Year of the Eucharist ... offers us an important pastoral occasion for the entire Christian community to be further sensitized to make this wonderful Sacrifice and Sacrament the heart of its life.

"The Holy Father left it up to the particular Churches to prepare initiatives for this Year. He did, however, ask the Congregation for Divine Worship and the Discipline of Sacraments to offer 'suggestions and proposals' that could be useful for everyone, pastors and pastoral workers at every level, who is called to make a contribution.

"Thus the nature of this handbook. It does not pretend to be exhaustive, but rather limits itself to give, with a simple style, some working suggestions."

The congregation indicates a series of suggestions on the parochial and diocesan level in order to begin the Year of the Eucharist. For example, it encourages the preparation of documents - especially where the dioceses cannot do so - that emphasize the Year of the Eucharist and promote reflection by priests and faithful on the doctrinal and pastoral problems in their respective countries (lack of priests, low Sunday Mass attendance, abandoning Eucharistic adoration); they also suggest promoting national Eucharistic congresses and inviting universities, faculties and seminaries to explore this theme.

As to dioceses, the document encourages knowledge of the saints who have a special relationship with the diocese and who have been distinguished by love for the Eucharist. Increasing perpetual adoration of the Blessed Sacrament in churches and chapels, especially at a time when it is convenient for parishioners, is emphasized. In addition, the congregation suggests organizing Eucharistic adoration for young people around Palm Sunday. It also proposes dedicating space to the theme of the Eucharist in diocesan magazines, internet sites, as well as on local radio and television stations.

The text recalls the Pope's invitation to make every effort to make sure that Sunday Mass occupies the central place in the parish. In addition, it highlights the importance of teaching the faithful the proper behavior when entering a church, helping them to prepare themselves interiorly during mass, especially in the most important moments and educating them on exterior participation as well. Parishes, continues the text, must promote Eucharistic worship and personal and community prayer before the Blessed Sacrament, namely visiting the Blessed Sacrament, adoration and Eucharistic benediction and spiritual assistance for those who are in irregular situations, and who cannot receive communion although they participate in Mass.

It is suggested that monasteries, religious communities and institutes organize mediation on the quality of Eucharistic celebration in community, fidelity to liturgical norms and personal Eucharistic devotion, as well as provide for the possibility of increasing adoration hours before the Blessed Sacrament.

Lastly, the document emphasizes that in seminaries and houses of formation a certain familiarity with Latin and Gregorian chant is necessary in order to pray and sing in Latin. Also, it asks that the tabernacle be conveniently located in a place conducive to private prayer.

In the Conclusion, the text affirms that "the success of this Year undoubtedly depends on the depth of our prayer. We are invited to celebrate the Eucharist, to receive it and to adore it with the faith of the saints. ... This special year must help us to encounter Jesus in the Eucharist and to live by Him."

### JOHN PAUL II INAUGURATES the YEAR of the EUCHARIST

VATICAN CITY, OCT 17, 2004 (VIS) - With a solemn Mass celebrated in Saint Peter's Basilica, John Paul II early this evening opened the Year of the Eucharist, which will end in October 2005. The inauguration took place concomitantly with the closing of the 48th International Eucharistic Congress in Guadalajara, Mexico.

Following Mass, which was presided over by Cardinal Secretary of State Angelo Sodano and several other members of the College of Cardinals, there was the exposition and adoration of the Blessed Sacrament.

Via television linkup with Guadalajara, the Pope sent a Message to the closing ceremony of the Eucharistic congress. He said that "the theme of the congress, 'The Eucharist; Light and Life of the New Millennium', invites us to consider the Eucharistic mystery not only in itself but also in relationship to the problems of our times."

"The human heart needs light, as it is weighed down by sin, often disoriented and tired, tried by sufferings of every type. The world needs light in the difficult search for a peace that seems so distant, at the beginning of a millennium upset and humiliated by violence, by terrorism and by war."

John Paul II underscored that life is the greatest human aspiration, adding that "threatening shadows weigh on this universal longing, the shadows of a culture that denies respect for life in every stage; the shadow of an indifference that send countless people to destinies of hunger and underdevelopment: the shadow of scientific research that often aims to serve the egoism of the strongest."

"We must all feel called," he affirmed, "by the needs of so many of our brothers and sisters," without forgetting that nourishing ourselves with the Body of Christ "means welcoming life itself from God, opening ourselves to the logic of love and sharing."

The Holy Father invites the faithful to ask, as did the disciples of Emmaus, "the divine Wayfarer, Who knows our hearts, not to leave us as prisoners of evening shadows. Sustain us in our fatigue, pardons our sins, orient our steps to the path of good. ... Bless all of mankind!"

"In the Eucharist You made yourself 'the remedy for immortality': give us delight in a full life that makes us walk on this earth as trusting and joyous pilgrims, always looking to the goal, the end of the life that has no end. Stay with us, Lord. Stay with us!"

The Pope concluded by announcing that the next International Eucharistic Congress will be held in Ouebec, Canada in 2008.

### ANNA KATHARINA EMMERICK, WHO LIVED HER OWN PASSION

### Pope Raises German Nun and Mystic to the Altar

Anna Katharina Emmerick, the newly beatified Augustinian nun, endured long physical sufferings. Her reputation, too, suffered for years after her death.

Emmerick, whose writings inspired Mel Gibson in the making of "The Passion of the Christ," had nine siblings.

She was baptized on Sept. 8, 1774, the day of her birth in a modest farm in the village of Flamske, in Coesfeld, in the Diocese of Muenster, in what is now northwestern Germany.

By the time she was 4 years old, she had frequent visions of the history of salvation. In 1802, after many difficulties due to the family's poverty and opposition to her choice of the religious life, she joined the Canonesses Regular of Saint Augustine, in the Agnetenberg convent in Duelmen.

She made her religious vows the following year. She participated in community life with great earnestness, although "the cloistered life was quite hard" because the other "canonesses did not fail to point out her low social status," according to the postulator of her cause of beatification, Andrea Ambrosi.

Moreover, the religious' health "began to decline rapidly," he told Vatican Radio.

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"Ever since she was little she suffered from rickets which became so accentuated once she was in the convent, that she spent years in bed," Ambrosi said. In fact, the biography issued by the Holy See emphasizes the great pains Emmerick suffered.

When in 1811 the authorities suppressed the convent of Agnetenburg -- it had been influenced by secularism -- the future blessed was forced to leave the area.

Father Lambert, a French refugee priest living in Duelmen, took her in as a housekeeper. From 1813 onward, sickness immobilized her, so her younger sister Gertrude took her place as housekeeper.

"By the end of 1812, when supernatural gifts were already manifested in her, she had the added phenomenon" of "the appearance of the stigmata," postulator Ambrosi noted.

"At the beginning she did everything she could to hide them, but then her case became known and everyone wanted to see her, not only because of the stigmata, but because of her goodness and her gift to penetrate the souls that suffered most, those that were most lacerated, leading them to peace," Ambrosi said.

Last July, Cardinal José Saraiva Martins, prefect of the Congregation for Sainthood Causes, publicly read the decree of recognition of a miracle attributed to Emmerick's intercession.

"She bore the stigmata of the Lord's passion and received extraordinary charisms that she used to console numerous visitors," the cardinal said in the presence of John Paul II. "She carried out her great, fruitful apostolate from her bed."

From 1812 onward, Emmerick's only nourishment was the Eucharist. She had to endure three exhaustive investigations by the diocese, Napoleon Bonaparte's police, and the authorities.

During the last years of her life, she lived every day the preaching and passion of Jesus. She died on Feb. 9, 1824, consumed by her illnesses and penances.

Emmerick "lived perfectly attuned to the mystery of the life, passion and death of Jesus. Her stigmata is a very clear testimony of her existential union with Jesus," Ambrosi said on Vatican Radio. "Her willingness to suffer had no other motive than her love for the crucifix and concern for her neighbor."

Emmerick, who was forced from the cloister because of the Napoleonic invasion, was a stigmatized invalid. She tried to write in her Low German dialect the daily visions of the supernatural which she herself thought were indescribable.

On learning this, Clemens Brentano, a notable German writer, met the ex-nun, was converted, and remained at the foot of her sickbed writing down the visionary's accounts from 1818 to 1824.

The result of his work is "The Bitter Passion of Our Lord Jesus Christ." Brentano died before finishing the visions of the "Life of Mary." Subsequently, various specialists edited the "Diaries" and compiled, each in his own way, Emmerick's purported visions on the Church, the Old Testament, Jesus' public life and the nascent Church.

Shortly after the German mystic's death "her fame for sanctity was so alive among all the population and also the clergy" of the Muenster Diocese, that there was an intense "desire to promote her cause of beatification," postulator Ambrosi explained.

However, obstacles arose because of the difficult historical and religious times Germany was going through. There was also a lack of clarity in the nun's writings, some texts "bordering on the limit of 'orthodox' Catholicism," Ambrosi said.

The Holy Office intervened several times to block the cause and asked for further opinions from theologians, the postulator added. After "manipulations" of Emmerick's revelations by Brentano were identified, "the cause took on a faster pace," he said.

At the end of the 19th century, Emmerick was declared venerable. Her process of beatification was resumed in 1972. The heroic degree of her virtues was declared in 2001.

Her life was characterized by profound union with Christ, and an ardent devotion to the Blessed Virgin Mary, the Holy See says in its biography.

Ambrosi added that the new blessed can serve as a model for the faithful today in her commitment to "the work of salvation through faith and love."

### PARTICIPATION in POLITICAL LIFE IS PROPER to the LAITY

VATICAN CITY, OCT 8, 2004 (VIS) - Yesterday afternoon, Cardinal Camillo Ruini, president of the Italian Episcopal Conference, read the Pope's message to participants in the 44th Social Week of Italian Catholics which is taking place from October 7 to 10 in Bologna. More than one thousand delegates

from all over Italy who represent dioceses, associations and movements, are participating in the gathering.

Referring to the meeting's theme, "Democracy: New Scenarios, New Powers," the Holy Father highlights the "risks and threats, for authentic democracy, that come from certain philosophical currents, anthropological visions or political ideas with ideological prejudices. For example, the tendency to think that relativism is a way of thinking that responds better to democratic political forms still exists, as if knowing the truth and adhering to it were an impediment. In reality," he continued, "often people are afraid of the truth because they do not know it. The truth as Christ revealed it is a guarantee of genuine and complete liberty for the person."

John Paul II writes that "if political action is not addressed with a higher ethical understanding, illuminated by an integral vision of man and society, it will end up being subject to inadequate ends, if not illicit ones. The truth, however, is the best antidote against ideological fanaticism in the scientific, political and even religious context."

"As experts in social disciplines and as Christians, you are called ... to indicate new paths and new solutions in order to address the urgent problems of the modern world in the best way. Reflection on the democratic system cannot be limited to only considering political structures and institutions, it must also consider the problems posed by developments in science and technology, in the economy and in finance, as well as new laws for governing international organizations, the questions that come from progressive and rapid development in communications, in order to create a model of complete and authentic democracy."

The Pope emphasized the need for Catholics to commit themselves "to making civil society lively and dynamic by promoting the family, associations, volunteer work, etc, and by opposing improper limits and conditions imposed by the economic or political order; also they must consider once again the importance of dedication to public and institutional roles, in environments where significant collective decisions are made, and in politics, in the highest sense of the word, as desired by so many today."

"We cannot forget," he concludes, "that knowing and putting into practice the social doctrine of the Church are characteristics of the vocation of lay people, and therefore, also their participation in the political life of the country, according to the methods and instruments of democratic systems. Some are also called to develop a special service to the civil

community, directly assuming institutional role in politics."

### **REFLECTION on the MESSAGE of** 10/25/2004

### May Jesus be in the heart of your family

In this message, our Heavenly Mother is addressing the families. Nobody else has such an experience and such virtues of the family life. Mary was a girl, promised in marriage and married to Joseph, virgin and mother, Mother of the Son of God and widow after the death of Joseph. She knew and experienced all the joys and all the sorrows of family life, exaltations and anguishes, fears and death, until the most painful tragedy of her crucified Son. She experienced the glory of Easter with her risen Son and finally the heavenly crown. She began as a humble servant and she finished as Queen of Heaven.

For her, this celestial glory is not a title of honour: she is coming, she is appearing, she is taking care of us, her children, who are still on the way towards the final goal and the glorification. She is speaking to us, she is inviting us, she is advising us and teaching us. The words of Mary are clear and simple and they relate to our everyday life, our relations in the family, where human life is generated and educated. Mary, our Mother, is concerned about families, parents and children. No one is closer to their children than the parents. Their love of the children urges them to accomplish their first and most important duty: the education of the children. This duty takes precedence over all the professional and official occupations, over any career and social advancement. Saint Paul says: "But if any provide not for his own, and specially for those of his own house, he hath denied the faith, and is worse than an infidel." (Tim 5,8) Mary is our model of education and of the family life. In her heart, she is carrying the treasure, which she wants to transmit to us. The Gospel says to us: "But Mary kept all these things, and pondered them in her heart." (Lk 2,19) The same Gospel repeats that she "kept all these sayings in her heart." (Lk 2,51) In Mary, we find the splendid treasure of the wisdom of God which wants to be given to us and to our

families. Seen from outside, the human education that Mary gave was so ordinary that nobody in Nazareth could expect that her Son was the Messiah, that he was God. From outside, Mary was as ordinary as her messages, which contain the divine life that is offered to us. Seen from inside, the education that Mary gave was extraordinary in what is ordinary, perfect in every way and behaviour, because she was aware of the fact that she was humanly educating the Most Holy One. For such an education, it was necessary to have a perfect heart and a harmonious soul, which did not lack to the Immaculate full of grace.

Mary calls us to holiness. Holiness is what is extraordinary in the ordinary human life. It is well known that it is not so much the specialized teaching and knowledge, but the exemplary behaviour of the parents that educate the children. We find specialists in pedagogy who failed to educate their own offspring, as well as illiterate mothers who offered a splendid education to their children. A mother educates more through her being and her goodness than through her specialized knowledge.

Mary invites us to renew the prayer; the prayer will renew our hearts and our families. Jesus is standing at the door and he wishes to enter and eat with us. The family, which prays, will be able to hear when he is knocking. Let us not allow to anything else but Jesus to be at the centre of our families.

# A REFLECTION from FATHER ED CHALMERS on OUR LADY'S MESSAGE of OCTOBER 25, 2004

"Dear children! This is a time of grace for the family and, therefore, I call you to renew prayer." Again, Our Lady begins Her monthly message with a very simple, but most profound statement that should touch our hearts in a serious way. During these days, when folks have many questions regarding the

meaning of their personal lives that are often overburdened by their immoral actions and the activities of others, the people of God (which includes all men and women) have been given a profound gift from the Eternal Father: "a time of grace for the family." I wonder how do we react to these beautiful words of our dear Blessed Mother? Are we ready to move beyond the selfishness, greed, revenge, and lust that our society promotes? In this message of October 25, 2004, Our Lady is again calling us to conversion. We have been called to pray, to bring Jesus into our lives, and to become holy. For most, these requests are more than a significant challenge that involve a radical change in the way in which we live.

Again, may we reflect upon this first sentence of Our Lady's message of October 25, 2004? "This is a time of grace for the family and, therefore, I call you to renew prayer." Month after month, Our Lady continues to challenge Her, "little children," to pray and become people of prayer. Are we ready to embrace prayer with the heart? We must remember that it is only through prayer that we become those devoted servants of God that we have been called to be. Prayer is a beautiful starting point that can lead to the Sacraments where we can be one with Jesus. If any believer can develop a serious devotion to the Eucharist and to the Sacrament of Penance, he or she will begin to become one with the person of Jesus. Now, let us listen to the words of Our Lady in the second sentence of Her message of October 25, 2004. "May Jesus be in the heart of your families." I wonder if Jesus is in the heart of most of our families?

As we experience the reality of daily living, may we embrace the love, mercy, and compassion of Jesus. We can begin this task by contemplating and meditating upon the Sacred Mysteries of the Holy Rosary. Read the passages from the Gospels that describe the important events of Jesus' life on this earth. In this way, we can become one with little Jesus, the teaching and preaching Jesus, the suffering Jesus, the dying Jesus, and the resurrected Jesus. Very carefully, listen to the Gospel readings proclaimed at Mass. Also spend time on your own reading and studying the words of Jesus found in Matthew, Mark, Luke and John. As one comes to a better understanding of the message of Jesus, the opportunity to bring, "Jesus in the heart of your family," will become attainable.

"In prayer, learn to love everything that is holy. Imitate the lives of saints so that they may be an incentive and teachers on the way of holiness." These next two sentences of Our Lady's message of October 25, 2004 speak to the serious need that all

Christian believers have to love holiness while becoming holy themselves. For the person of faith, being holy is very important. It is only when we become holy that we can fully embrace the person of Jesus Christ. Again, as one continues his or her journey to the Lord, he or she must acquire the inner strength to embrace holiness.

To accomplish the serious challenge of being holy that comes before each human being, one must seek out the inspiration and discernment of the Holy Spirit. May we remember that the Holy Spirit is the personification of the love that God the Father and Jesus have for each other. During these days, as one attempts to reject sin in his or her life, he or she needs that special grace that can come to us from the Holy Spirit; as we pray to Him to come to us with His gifts, and the virtues that come from these gifts. Also, may we accept Our Lady's call to, "Imitate the lives of saints." Read about the saints and pray to them. Know that they will pray for us in a profound way before the throne of God, when we ask through prayer for their intercession. Most importantly, may we be willing to be faithful to God in a most serious way as the saints were when they lived in the world.

"May every family become a witness of love in this world without prayer and peace." In this sentence of Her message of October 25, 2004, Our Lady has requested each family to become witnesses of love. Are we ready to work for God and Our Lady? It cannot happen on our own. It will never be possible through pride, ego, anger and revenge. However, by being a witness of God's love, we can begin to bring people to God. At times, this process may be slow, but we must be filled with zeal never being overwhelmed by our own lack of faith or a lack in faith in others. Again, this task is never about you or me. It is about God's way to purify our souls and the souls of others. This process must include Our Lady's humility, gentleness, joy, hope, faith, unconditional love, and total trust in abandonment to the will of God. The time is now is become one with the Eternal Father, Jesus, the Holy Spirit and Our Lady. Please, reject the excuses that prohibit us from being God's devoted servants. Do not be concerned with what others think. On the other hand, be most aware of God's call to you to help in His work of converting sinners and saving souls.

I hope you are all well. Give my best to all of your families. As we pray for each other, may we be filled with joy while contemplating and reflecting about God's love for us. Our triune God is so good, and Our Lady's motherly love comes into our hearts as a most previous gift. We are so blessed. May we be

forever grateful to God the Father, Jesus, and the Holy Spirit, our Triune God for everything that we have, most especially their unconditional love. May Almighty God, the Father, the Son and the Holy Spirit come upon you and remain with you, forever and ever.

### FAITH ACCORDING to the MODEL of SWEDISH TABLE

When someone expresses an opinion or wants to say something very important, it sometimes happens to him to add: "But are you taking me seriously?" It is quite legitimate; especially as we are all more and more invaded by information, exhortations and directives that are not always put into practice. In the inflation of words, the importance of the contents seems to decrease. In the superabundance of proposals, we take for ourselves the right to select what appears important and useful for our personal life. We choose what we like. In other words, it is a life according to the rule of offer, demand, and free choice. It is the logic of the market.

This same mentality introduced itself into the life of faith. The faithful seem to choose the elements and the contents, which appear reachable and acceptable to them, while forgetting the fundamental significance of the faith as a gift, the faith that implies the need for believing in an integral way and the need of putting into practice of all that we believe. This approach of faith could be called "a life according to the model of the Swedish table". What does it mean? In all that is proposed of the mystery of Salvation and of the sacraments, the believer chooses only what he likes, which leads to all kinds of paradoxes: a believer who calls himself a Catholic will perhaps go every Sunday for Mass, but will not take his marriage seriously; he will speak in favour of life, but will proceed to the abortions; he will ask for the protection of God, but will mistreat his family or his subordinates, etc.

To be a Catholic means to belong to somebody completely. To be a Catholic implies the obligation to believe completely and wholly all the truths that Jesus Christ gives us through the Church, which he founded and which he makes alive. Our first obligation is thus to believe and to give testimony of what we believe, but completely. The Scriptures tell us that we should not omit or modify even one iota. Faith is a serious

thing. It requires of us to live all that Jesus lived, and all that has been transmitted to the apostles. To be a Catholic does not only mean to belong to a group or to an organization. To be a Catholic means to be written in the palms of the hands of Jesus Christ, and to put Jesus Christ at the first place in our life.

On this way, Our Lady is our best teacher. She believed completely. She did not choose what should come and how that should happen. She listened and she served. She is the expression of the first true Christian relation to God.

### "THE WALL of LOVE" VISITS MEDJUGORJE

About 60 members of the humanitarian association "Bedem ljubavi" ("The wall of love") from Varazdin, Croatia came on pilgrimage to Medjugorje on October 6, at the occasion of the 13<sup>th</sup> anniversary of its foundation. The theme of this one-day long pilgrimage was "On the paths of friendship, of peace and of love." They climbed the Apparition Hill and visited other prayer places. In the Adoration chapel, they had a thanksgiving mass presided by Father Mario Knezovic.

### 1900 KILOMETRES on BICYCLE for AN ORPHANAGE in UGANDA

In order to help the construction of the orphanage "Kumi" in the diocese Soroti in Uganda, Alois Gerding from Senden (Germany) drove 1900 kilometres from Munster to Medjugorje.

Together with friends, especially the Eink family, Alois and his wife Elisabeth are materially supporting several African priests and their social and humanitarian work. The orphanage "Kumi", which is led by Father Charles Osire, will take care of 200 orphans.

Therefore, we kindly ask all Organizers of pilgrimages, Prayer Groups and Centers for Peace to publish this information as widely as possible by all means at their disposal, so that as many priests as possible may participate. In as much as it is possible, we also kindly ask you to financially assist the priests who would like to come but do not have the necessary funds for such a journey. We thank you in advance and pray for God's blessing and the blessing of the Queen of Peace upon you and your work.

The lecturer of this seminar is Doctor Father Zvjezdan Linić, OFM, born in 1941 in Svilno near the Shrine of Our Lady of Graces of Trsat (Croatia). He became a Franciscan in 1958 and was ordained a priest in 1967. He studied in Samobor, Zagreb, Paris and Innsbruck where he obtained a doctorate in liturgical theology in 1970.

His did his pastoral service among the Croatian workers in foreign countries (in Innsbruck and in Paris) as well as in Croatia (Trsat, Karlovac, Novi Sad, Osijek, then in Zagreb), between 1981 and 1997. Since 1997, he is a director of the House of the Encounters called "Tabor", near the Franciscan monastery in Samobor, where he organizes and leads retreats and recollections.

Most of the priestly and pastoral life of Father Zvjezdan is dedicated to young people and the Franciscan secular Order. Through the sacraments of Christian initiation, he helped a great number of young people to know Christ the Saviour and to enter into the Church. On several occasions, he taught

theology. He is giving retreats for priests, religious and laity. He is particularly known as organizer of seminars of Christian initiation and seminars for healing and liberation.

### TO INVITE: SAINTS and SEEKERS

This is the fifth and final reflection by Sister Diana Rawlings, ASC on the five Pastoral Priorities (to pray, to evangelize, to experience, to mentor and to invite) that emerged from the Continental Congress on Vocations in North America.

A friend of mine and his wife celebrated their 50th wedding anniversary recently. My friend told me that the anniversary was approaching and that their children intended to host a party for them. When I hadn't received an invitation I wasn't too surprised because I figured they were only inviting members of their rather large family and the oldest of friends. Much to my surprise, a week before the celebration my friend called to ask if I would be able to attend. He apologized for the late invitation. Two factors led to his waiting to attend to me. One, the room where the reception would be held is rather small and he needed to know if there would be space. Secondly, he knows me as part of a group of friends. There wouldn't be room for all of us so he had to discern whom to invite. I suppose I could have been offended to be on the "second tier" of invitees but I was not. I knew that the invitation was heartfelt and sincere. The timing of the invitation didn't affect that. I gladly attended the event and had a great time.

This experience is a reminder that sending an invitation can be a complicated matter. Receiving an invitation requires grace as well. My Congregation, the Adorers of the Blood of Christ, was active in the Third Continental Congress on Vocations to Ordained Ministry and Consecrated Life in North America in 2002. The final priority for action of the Congress was "to invite" persons to pursue their Christian vocation. Helping someone to receive God's invitation to pursue their true vocation involves several dimensions that I would like to reflect on.

The first is "sowing." None of us lives in a vacuum. Some of us may have a longstanding and strong inner concept of who we are and what we are called to do in our lives, but virtually all of us discover our life calling through "seeds" sown by someone who knows and loves us. Each of us has a responsibility to be an instrument of God by helping our brothers and sisters to contemplate how they might serve God with their lives. This isn't a matter of pressuring someone into a particular vocation. This is about sowing some ideas that will germinate as God intends.

Secondly, we all need someone to accompany or guide us as we seek God's will for their lives. The role of the guide isn't to provide answers it is to provide the seeker with support and encouragement. This demands that the guide be open and trustworthy. God fully respects the freedom of the person discerning a vocation and the guide must do so as well.

A third dimension is education. I do not mean filling a person with information. I mean the more profound sense of education as drawing out the person's deepest truth and helping them externalize it. This self-knowledge then must be placed in the context of God's mysterious plan for us all. To perceive God's plan, the seeker must have a vibrant relationship with Jesus that allows him or her to encounter Jesus in a real way.

Allied to education is formation. Very often the process of realizing God's call crystallizes through one or two "peak experience" moments when the presence of the Lord is particularly strong and God's will seems clear. These experiences form a vocation. They often call a person to go beyond previous limits and to contemplate a new way of being. The hallmark of a divine invitation is this calling of an individual beyond the known and expected.

The final dimension of pursuing an invitation from God is discernment or choosing. God's vocational invitation is not a passing matter. It is a life long and life changing commitment. It is not a calling to the individual in isolation. God's call to each person is in service to the whole of our Church. The acceptance of

God's invitation is not made in an instant; it is a process that takes time and is best done with the assistance of others.

We celebrate All Saints day this week. Each saint was a person like you or me who at some point in their life became aware of God's call to them. Like us they struggled to understand the nature and meaning of God's call to them; some attempted to run away from God's call. All, eventually, committed their lives wholly to God's will for them.

God is calling the next generation of saints. As in ages past, God makes use of us the members of the Church to be God's voice and to be guides for those being called. In a sense, each of us is an invitation from God to those whom God is calling. Some of us with titles like "vocation director" or "formation director" are perceived to be "formal inviters". Others of us are "informal". In either case, a heartfelt invitation is not likely to be refused.

The Adorers of the Blood of Christ is an international congregation founded in Italy by Saint Maria De Mattias. Some 1,850 Sisters now minister in 27 nations on all the continents in the areas of education, health care, spiritual development and social justice.

Adorers came to the United States in 1870, settling first in Illinois, then expanding to Kansas and Pennsylvania. Nearly 425 ASC sisters minister in 17 of the United States and in Korea, Bolivia, Guatemala and Rome, making it the largest of the international congregation's nine provinces. U.S. Province headquarters are in Saint Louis, Mo.

### **CELIBACY**

The practice of perfect continence by priests and bishops meant to foster single-minded devotion to God and service in the ministry. According to the long-standing discipline of the Latin Church, the rule of celibacy forbids marriage by priests and bishops, and it normally excludes married persons from ordination. Married men may be ordained to the permanent diaconate, but they may not contact a second marriage after the death of their spouses; unmarried men may not marry after ordination to the diaconate. Under a recent pastoral provision for former Anglican clergy who have been approved for ordination in the Roman Catholic Church, those who are married prior to reception into the Church and ordination are permitted to remain married.

You can find maps to the churches in addition to the times of Holy Mass celebrations.

The practice and discipline are held to be warranted by Christ Himself (Mt 19:11-12) and encouraged by Saint Paul (1Cor 7:32). The earliest formulation of this discipline occurred at the Council of Elvira (A.D. 306), although evidence has recently been offered that suggest that the discipline may be of apostolic authority. Subsequent conciliar and papal enactments reinforced the discipline in the Western Church. The Eastern Church permits deacons and priests who are married before ordination to remain so; celibacy is required of bishops, and of unmarried deacons and priests after ordination.

### MARY, MOTHER of VOCATIONS

When Mary told the angel at the Annunciation, "Behold, I am the Handmaid of the Lord; let it be done to me according to your word," she became the patroness of every priest and religious until the end of time. Her acceptance of God's invitation to become His Mother made her the Mother of all vocations to the priesthood and religious life.

When she conceived Jesus Christ, she brought into the world the one from whom every vocation is derived. Except for Him, no one would be called, and except for His call, no one could respond. Mary is, therefore, Mother of Vocations because she is the Mother of the Great High Priest who calls others to share in His priesthood, and she is Mother of the First Religious who invites others to follow in His footsteps.

Mary is Mother of Vocations also by her example. It is by imitating her practice of faith, hope and charity that men and women are inspired to give themselves to her Son in the priesthood or the lifetime practice of the counsels. Only believers have a vocation; only those who trust implicitly in God's promises respond to God's call; and above all only those who love God in others deeply are preserved in priestly or religious commitment. In all of these, Mary is their model, and the more devoted they are to her, the more secure is their consecration.

Finally, Mary is the Mother of Vocations by her heavenly intercession at the Throne of God. It is through her maternal prayers that Christ gives certain people the grace to give themselves entirely to His Service. She obtains from Him the grace for them to be called; but she also tells them, as she told the servants at Cana, to be sure to do whatever He tells you.

There is no more effective way of fostering vocations than asking the Mother of Jesus to ask her Son to extend the invitation. And there is no more effective way of remaining firm in the priesthood and the religious state than to beg the same Mother for the grace of perseverance.

"Mary, Mother of Vocations, pray for us," should be our daily invocation.

### MARIAN COMMUNITY "OASIS of PEACE"

#### A BRIEF PRESENTATION

We are a contemplative community of celibate brothers and sisters and of Priests living together in communities, each called "Oasis of Peace", to which consecrated secular members are aggregated as well: both lay persons and priests living outside the Community but consecrated with vows. Married couples who live our spirit and charism in the marital state are also aggregated to us.

We share together a consecrated life of simplicity, of prayer, of work, and of study. We are consecrated to the Lord through Mary with vows of poverty, chastity, obedience, and our primary vow "to be peace" and to intercede for peace in the Church and in the world, peculiar to our community.

Our history as an Ecclesial Family of Consecrated Life began in 1985 when the original members, having encountered Our Lady Queen of Peace, in Medjugorje, with the gift of conversion and prayer felt a deep desire to answer the call of Our Lady to be instruments and witnesses of peace in the world. They committed themselves together to a consecrated life with vows, with the aim of cooperating with Mary to extend and to share in humility the path of peace with those who are earnestly in search of peace.

Juridically the Community was constituted on March 25, 1987 and the first house was opened at Priabona (Vicenza) on May 18 of the same year. The first ecclesial recognition was on December 25, 1990 in the Diocese of Sabina-Poggio Mirteto and since December 25, 1995, juridically, we are a "public association of the faithful" in view of being erected as an Institute of Consecrated Life of diocesan right within a short period of time. The process has already begun by the competent ministry of the Holy See.

At present (2002) there are approximately 120 internal members - Brothers and Sisters. The Lord has

already granted us the gift of our first 12 priestly ordinations within our Community, while other Brothers are preparing for the priesthood studying and being formed in one of the Pontifical Roman Universities. Various Sisters also attend the faculties of Theology, Philosophy, and other Sciences at the University, so as to be able to cooperate in the formation of the members of our Ecclesial Family.

Our Ecclesial Family also includes married couples from Italy, Germany, and Brasil who are aggregated to but not living in the Community, and who also live our charism. Many other families are also asking to be part of our Community with the goal of sanctifying marriage and family life. Already they have committed themselves to the necessary formation.

Likewise the number of Consecrated Secular members is also increasing. In the light of the charism of "being peace" they strive to be a sanctifying presence in the secular world.

The Community is Catholic, and from the beginning has been international. Most of the members of the Community are Italians but there are also members from: Germany, Belgium, France, Austria, Slovenia, Switzerland, Spain, Ireland, USA, Canada, Panama, New Zealand, Mauritius, Korea, Brazil, Croatia, Bosnia-Herzegovina, Cameroons, The Czechoslovakian Republic and Romania, Argentina and Poland. The official languages of the Community are Italian and English.

At present we have houses in ten different countries around the world.

#### **HOW WE LIVE**

The celibate internal Brothers and Sisters share the experience of community life, while the Consecrated Secular members live our spirituality while remaining in their daily environment of life and work. Similarly, the married couples live our spirituality in their families with a rhythm of life adapted to the marital state.

The rhythm of our daily life is cadenced by community prayer - the Holy Mass, the chanting of the Divine Office, the Holy Rosary in its entirety, spontaneous prayer of praise, adoration of the Cross - and personal prayer, in adoration before the Most Blessed Sacrament continuously exposed, both day and night, in our houses.

In our Communities, it is important to conserve the climate of silence and of recollection in order to favor the spirit of continual prayer, and also as an act of perpetual adoration of the Most Blessed Sacrament. Indeed, we consider our Oasis of Peace to be an expanded Eucharistic Tabernacle. Every day there are

also periods of time for community recreation and relaxation.

As Mary asks us, and as practiced by the first Christians, we too have a special love for fasting on bread and water on Wednesdays and Fridays of every week, except on particular feast days.

We do not carry out paid work activities external to the Community, but, rather living according to the Gospel in total faith and trust in Divine Providence. We have a special love for work in our Community, both material and intellectual, seeing it as an extension of prayer of the climate of contemplation.

In addition to the ordinary work of the household, of agriculture, and of artistry (music, iconography, etc.), the principal task asked of us by the charism of our vocation is that of Hospitality; accompanying in a walk of peace and of healing all those who come to us afflicted by spiritual poverty of various kinds.

#### WHAT WE PROPOSE

As at the beginning of the Church, the Apostles and other disciples gathered together in prayer with Mary in the Cenacle and with Her awaited the gift of the Holy Spirit. Similarly we desire to serve the Ecclesial Community reliving the experience of the Cenacle guided by Mary, awaiting a new outpouring of the Holy Spirit for a renewed Pentecost.

We desire to collaborate with Mary in the battle against the evil one and with Her to implore the gift of Peace from the Lord. That is the spiritual renewal of the Church for the conversion and reconciliation with God of many hearts which are without peace. Indeed, peace is a gift from God which is to be implored, suffered, and humbly shared.

Therefore the ministries of our Community are:

Intercession: the continual supplicating of God through prayer and through the offering of one's own life to be seech from Him the gift of peace.

Expiation: we have a responsibility towards the world to be saved. We wish to carry one another's burdens, taking upon ourselves the load of sins and illnesses, both our own and those of others. We associate ourselves with Jesus and His Mother, through a life of simplicity, penitence and offering.

Hospitality: Mary invites us to take the path of peace, and we desire to share this path with those who sincerely seek to live the Gospel of peace. And to those who suffer due to being far from God.

Our Community is not cloistered but open to accept guests to share fully our family life.

We are open to accepting invitations outside the community to share our personal testimonies, and also organizing moments of evangelization through popular missions in parishes. Our Ecclesial Family also feels called to an ever-increasing involvement in the ecumenical movement; in prayer and in action. Our ecumenical outlook is directed especially towards the venerable Churches of the Orient.

Indeed, we desire to participate not only in the spiritual renewal of the Church, but also in the cultural renewal of society itself. We offer environments of personal and community life in which the Divine may lead to a recovery of the natural rhythms and values. We desire a society in which faith becomes life and becomes culture (social relationships, work, and sexuality). We propose a healthier modality and style of life, in which the global dimension of a person can be recuperated according to his true origin, restoring his harmony and peace with God, with mankind, and with all creation.

# THE PRO-CHOICE MOVEMENT IS LITERALLY KILLING ITSELF VIA ABORTION

We've all seen the fabulously popular and ubiquitous Frank Capra flick, "It's a Wonderful Life." We know the bitter-sweet post-war tale of how the lives of the people of Bedford Falls were touched by George Bailey, and how different things would have been if he had never existed.

It's a great lesson in the principle that absences have consequences. Thirty-one years after Roe v. Wade it's impossible to imagine what life would be like if those 40 million people were among us today. But odds are they would have been very much like us -- going to school, getting jobs, raising families. And voting.

Their missing votes is what Wall Street Journal reporter James Taranto calls the "Roe effect."

The Roe Effect theorizes that "pro-choice" women are more likely to have abortions than pro-life women, and that children tend to espouse the views of their parents. Thus, there are fewer and fewer children growing up to become "pro-choice" adults -- and this, according to the theory, has political ramifications.

Larry Eastland, discussing the Roe Effect recently in The American Spectator, said the children who were aborted instead of born in any given year can be considered "Missing Voters" 18 years later, the year they would have reached voting age. He calculated that abortions from 1973 to 1982 resulted in approximately 13 million Missing Voters in the 2000 election.

Even taking into account the fact that not all possible voters become actual voters in any given election, the closeness of the last election can leave no doubt about the significance of millions of missing votes.

Now skip ahead four years. A whole new group of young people has reached voting age since the last election, but missing among them are those who were aborted from 1982 to 1986. Thus, the total number of Missing Voters in the upcoming election will be 19 million.

"Like an avalanche that picks up speed, mass, and power as it thunders down a mountain," Eastland wrote, "the number of Missing Voters from abortion changes the landscape of politics."

But can we know how they would have voted? No, of course not. Still, as a general proposition, children tend to absorb the values of their parents, including their political views, and tend to develop the same lifestyle as their family. So if pro-lifers beget pro-lifers, then pro-choicers beget pro-choicers -- unless they abort them instead.

A recent Wirthlin Worldwide survey found that, of the Americans who call themselves politically "conservative," 25% are having abortions. In contrast, 40% of self-described political "liberals" are having abortions. As Eastland wrote, "Liberals have been remarkably blind to the fact that every day the abortions they advocate dramatically decrease their power to do so."

It's the classic Pyrrhic victory.

Catholics have sometimes been accused of promoting large families as a means of gaining social or political control -- a claim which is absurd on its face. But if the Roe Effect is true, then it's not a stretch to say that the "pro-choice" movement is quite literally killing itself.

One of God's main jobs is making people. He makes them to replace the ones that die, so there will be enough people to take care of things on earth.

I feel spiritually close to all their families and while I ask the Lord to relieve their sorrow, I ask him to grant peace to the world.
